

GENE PENDLETON

Gene Pendleton was a 5 year varsity member of the Monticello Trojan basketball team that won 129 games and made an incredible 4 state tournament appearances. Gene helped lead the Trojans to the quarterfinals in 1958, semifinals in 1959, and a state runner-up finish in 1960 where he was selected to the all-tournament team. While playing in an impressive 10 state tournament games, he currently ranks 15th all time with 157 points scored and 7th all time with 74 field goals made.

Gene was a 4 year starter at Monticello where he was known for his long range shooting and his intense defense. Many times he was given the assignment of shutting down the opposing team's best player and succeeded. Over his amazing career, Gene scored a total 2,010 points, average 15.8ppg with a single game high of 40 points. His senior season saw Pendleton selected 1st team all state and chosen to play in the East/West All-Star game and the Kentucky/Indiana All-Star game. He was also selected to the all district and all region teams for 3 consecutive years and has been inducted in to the Monticello High School and 12th Region Hall of Fames.

Gene began his college basketball career at the University of Tennessee where he averaged 18ppg for the freshman team. He later transferred to Murray State University where he was a 3 year starter and helped lead the Racers to an OVC Conference Championship and NCAA tournament berth in 1964. At Murray, Gene had a career average of 10ppg with a single game high of 36 points and is currently a co-record holder of 17 field goals in a single game. For his professional career, Gene taught health and physical education, while coaching basketball and tennis.

Gene lettered 5 years in Varsity Basketball. During his 5 years playing Trojan Basketball, his compiled teams' records were an outstanding 129 wins against 38 losses. This is a 77% winning percentage. Because of these outstanding teams, Gene played in 4 State Tournaments. He became a fixture in the Sweet 16 Tourney in the late 50s and was one of the leaders of the 1959 team and the 1960 State Runner Up Team.

His State Tournament stats include:

1. Ranked 11th in State Tournament scoring with 157 points
2. Ranked 5th in the number of Field Goals made with 74

Other accolades that Gene won while in High School include:

- 1958 (Sophomore Year) - All District, All Region
- 1959 (Junior Year) - All District, All Region, Honorable Mention All State
- 1960 (Senior Year) - All District, All Region, 1st Team All State, All State Tournament Team, Kentucky All Star Team

Also, in 1960, Gene tied for 5th place in Pre Season voting in a coaches poll in the "Best Player in the State of KY" according to the Courier-Journal.

Gene scored 2,010 points in his high school career. He had a game high of 40 points. He scored 31 points in the first round State Tourney play against the team entering the tourney with the best record (30-1) - Campbell County. His coach, Joe Harper, who is a KHSAA Hall of Fame inductee, regarded Gene Pendleton as one of the best players he had the privilege of coaching.

Gene earned a basketball scholarship to the University of Tennessee. He attended college there but later transferred to Murray State University. He was a 3 year starter for the Racers. He tied a school record with 17 field goals in 1 game. He participated in the NCAA Tournament in 1964. In 1965, he was a member of the OVC Tournament Team.

Gene is a member of the Charter Class of the Monticello High School Athletic Hall of Fame.

He is also a member of the 12th region Basketball Hall of Fame.

Gene taught in the Webster County School System from which he recently retired.

From 1955 to 1960 Monticello High School was a mainstay at the Sweet 16 State Basketball Tournament. The Trojans played 167 basketball games during this period and won 129 of them. KHSAA Hall of Fame Coach Joe Harper celebrated three consecutive trips to Louisville and the State Tournament.

Without a doubt, Coach Harper's expertise played a major role. Many coaches will say that they are only as good as their players. Mr. Harper stated numerous times that he had some very good talent while at Monticello, but two of the very best were Gene Pendleton and Don Frye. In fact, Don Frye was rated as the #1 player in the state in 1960 while Gene Pendleton was rated #5.

To Whom It May Concern:

I take great pride in asking you to please give consideration to selecting Gene Pendleton to be a member of the Dawahares/KHSAA Hall of Fame.

I had the great good fortune to see Gene play when I was in grade school. Four years after I graduated from high school I became Jumpin' Joe Harper's scorekeeper and remained so for another 15 seasons. When Joe retired and Rodney Woods replaced him in 1986 I assumed the same duties for Rodney Woods. Throughout the late sixties, seventies and eighties I attended the State Tournament religiously. Thus fifty years of being exposed to the very best of Kentucky high school basketball has enabled me to see some of the very best coaching, teams & players.

Gene Pendleton was lean but strong, quick, and could jump well at a young age. Because he matured early and was 6'2" he played primarily forward at the varsity level from when he first played (8th grader) through his junior season. He was starting as a freshman, averaging 15.0 ppg. As a sophomore he averaged 16.2 ppg and had totaled almost 1,000 points through his sophomore season (986).

His sophomore year saw MHS win the District and Region, returning the State Tournament (losing to Gene Rhode's St. X squad who won that year) - Gene had previously been to the State with MHS when he was an eighth grader.

That set the stage for Gene and his teammates to begin a truly memorable run by Monticello, one that would see them sweep the District and Region for three consecutive seasons and come within one game of winning it all Gene's senior season - a truly miraculous three year run by a school with less than 150 students in their top four grades.

Gene ended up scoring 2,001 points despite sharing MHS's offensive duties with another All State player playing right along side him (Don Frye).

After Gene's junior season, Coach Harper decided that it would be to Gene and the team's best interests if he switched Gene to playing guard, feeling it would give the team greater flexibility and would create more defensive pressure out front since Gene was such an outstanding defensive player. He accepted the change without hesitation and it ended up opening the door to collegiate coaches accepting Gene's qualifications even more readily.

His senior season, Gene was chosen as the number five player in the state in the Courier-Journal's coaches' pre-season poll and the team was also chosen number one. Coach Harper ramped his regular season schedule up to match expectations by adding Male and Seneca, playing in the A.I.T. as well as playing Pikeville in a specially scheduled triple-header at Memorial Coliseum (with the winner to receive that season's LIT bid).

MHS ended the regular season with only three losses: Ashland, 70-66 (Larry Conley would lead them to the State Championship the following season), Pikeville (45-44) and Seneca, 52-51 (with Mike Redd & George Unseld). The week of the Region Don Frye came down with a virus which resulted in Coach Harper resting him whenever possible which put more of the team's fate on Gene's shoulders.

Despite the necessary part-time absence of the team's primary offensive go-to guy (Frye) MHS rolled through the Region and the first three games of the State Tournament. Gene averaged 19 PPG scoring 133 points in the Region & State and Monticello ended up losing to Louisville Flaget, 65-56, in the Championship Game.

Gene was named All Tournament at the State, was placed on every All State team named thereafter and played in the East-West All-Star game that summer.. He received a scholarship from Tennessee, but ended up transferring to Murray where he enjoyed a very successful career.

Gene Pendleton had a truly magnificent high school basketball career, best exemplified by his having led his team to 3 District Titles, 3 Regional Titles and a fourth place and runners-up finish at the State Tournament. The fact that his totals of 157 points (15th) and 74 field goals (7th) in the State Tournament are still among the top twenty all-time almost a half a century later says a great deal about what he accomplished.

What Gene Pendleton, his teammates and Joe Harper accomplished from 1957-58 through 1959-60 created a legend that is not only revered in Wayne County, but throughout much of Kentucky whenever you speak to someone who remembers Kentucky high school basketball back then.

I strongly encourage you to give Mr. Pendleton his due. Even though it has been 46 years since he graduated from high school he & his team's accomplishments have not dimmed.

Gene received a scholarship from Murray State University. He was an outstanding player on the college level.

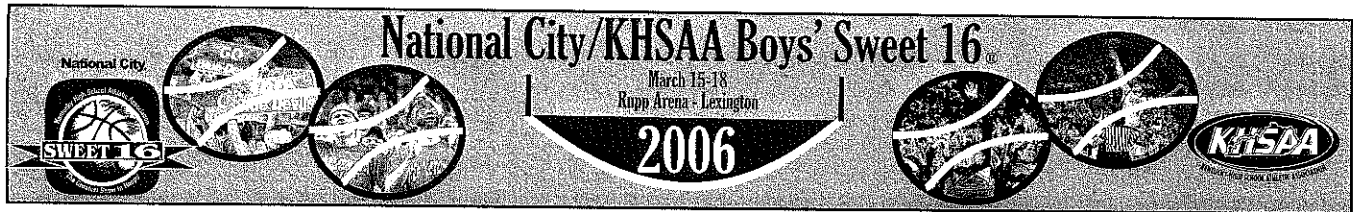
Monticello High School has a rich history in basketball tradition. Gene Pendleton along with Don Frye and Coach Joe Harper produced one of the best teams in the school history.

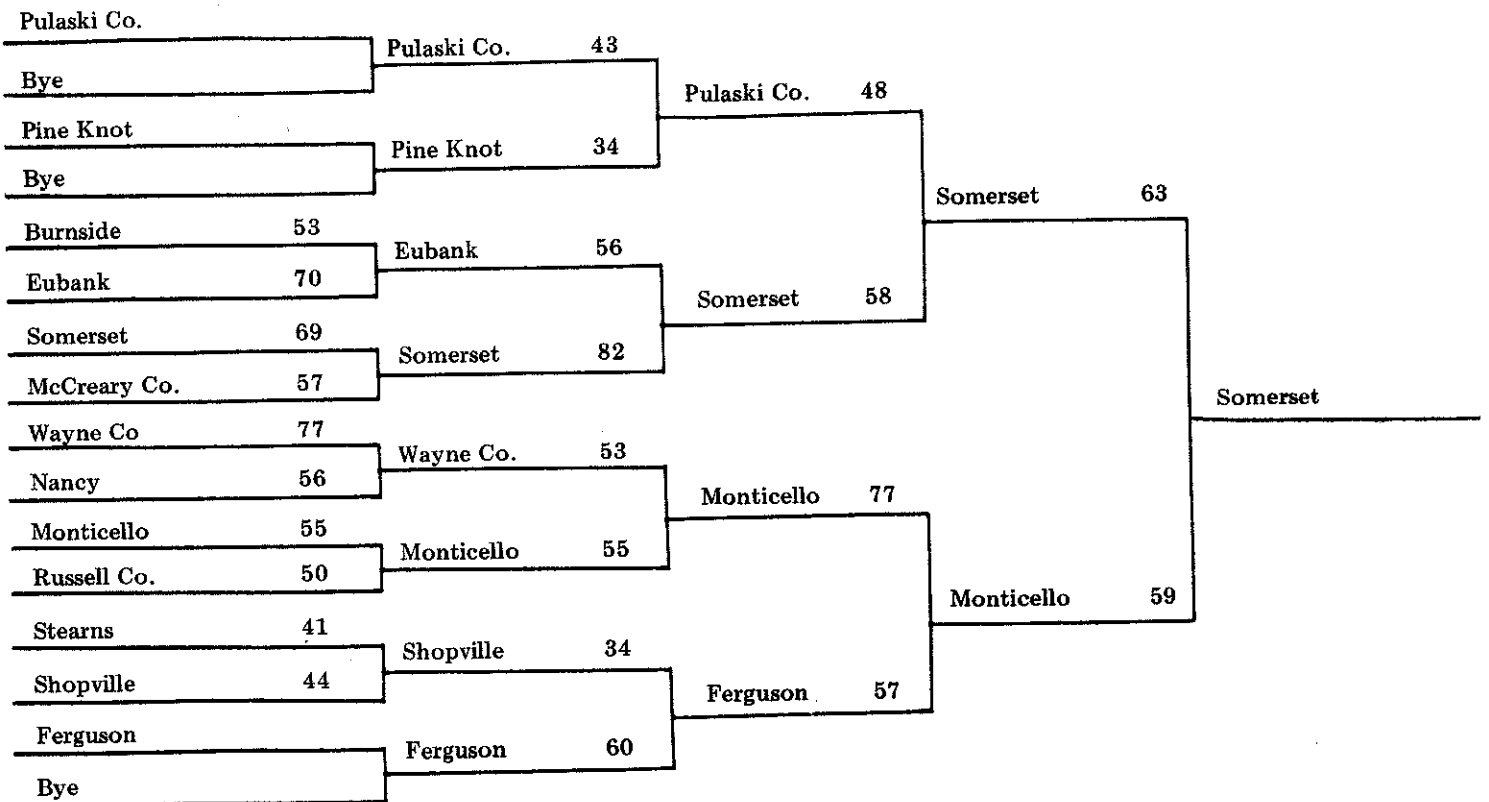
This team had well balanced scoring as four starters had averages in double figures. Ralph Hurst and Bobby Morris made both the All-District and All-Region teams.

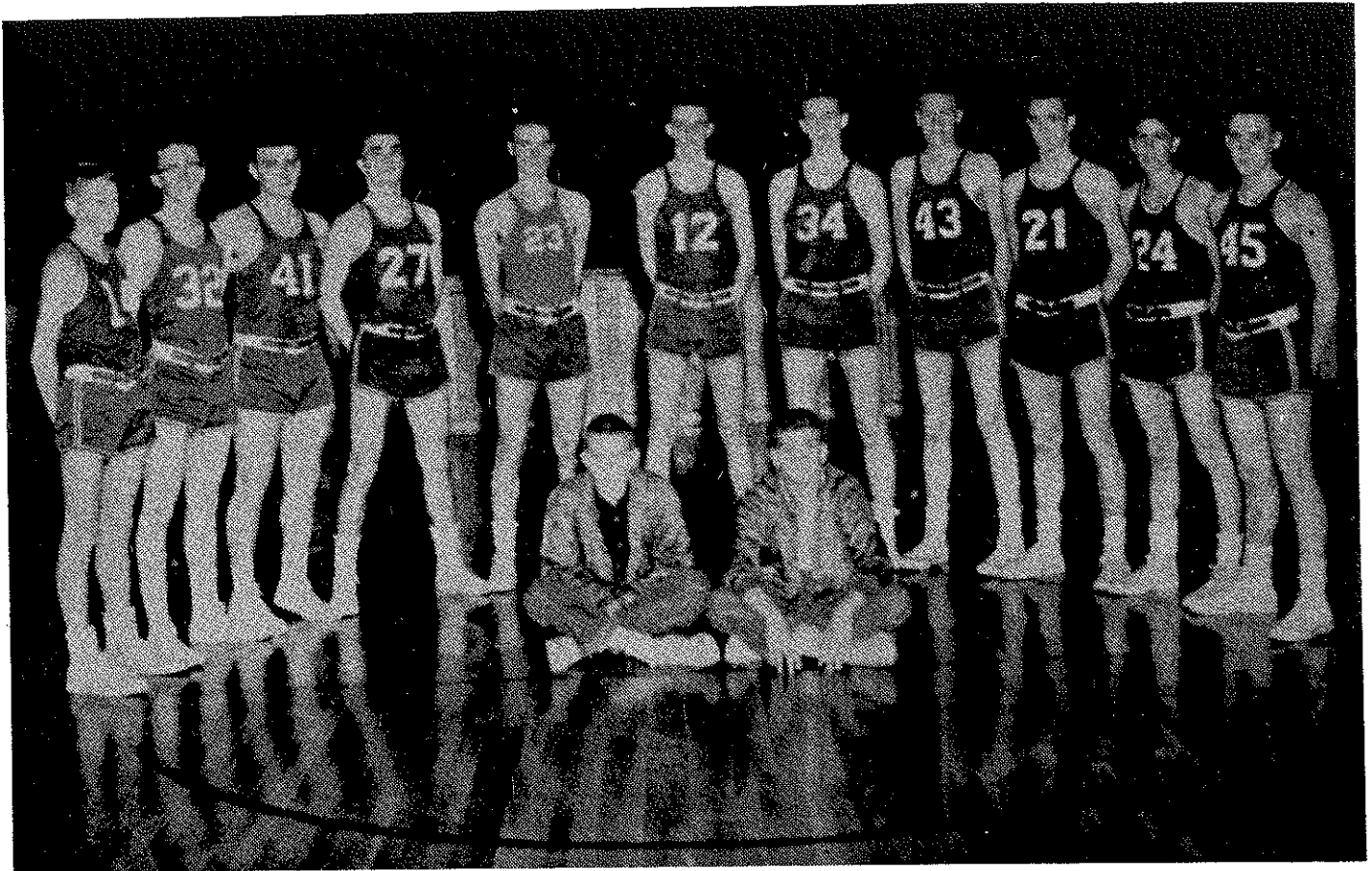

With only one starter gone, the Trojans were expected to be tough this year. Although one fan told us that the games started with the ball being tossed up in the air, the referee blowing his whistle and a foul on Fred Frye, Fred set a record for shooting 207 free throws. He also made 151 of these, good enough for second place on the Most Made list. Gene Pendleton scored enough points by season's end to put himself within a game or two of scoring 1,000 points. Sophomore Don Frye became the team's third leading scorer, while Aaron Stringer and Larry Ledbetter scored 214 points each. The Trojans finished the season with a fine 20 - 6 won - lost record. Like last year, two of these losses were to Lily.

In the District Tournament MHS led off with a victory over Wayne County. The loss to Somerset in last year's Tournament was avenged in the second game. They then beat Russell County to win the District.

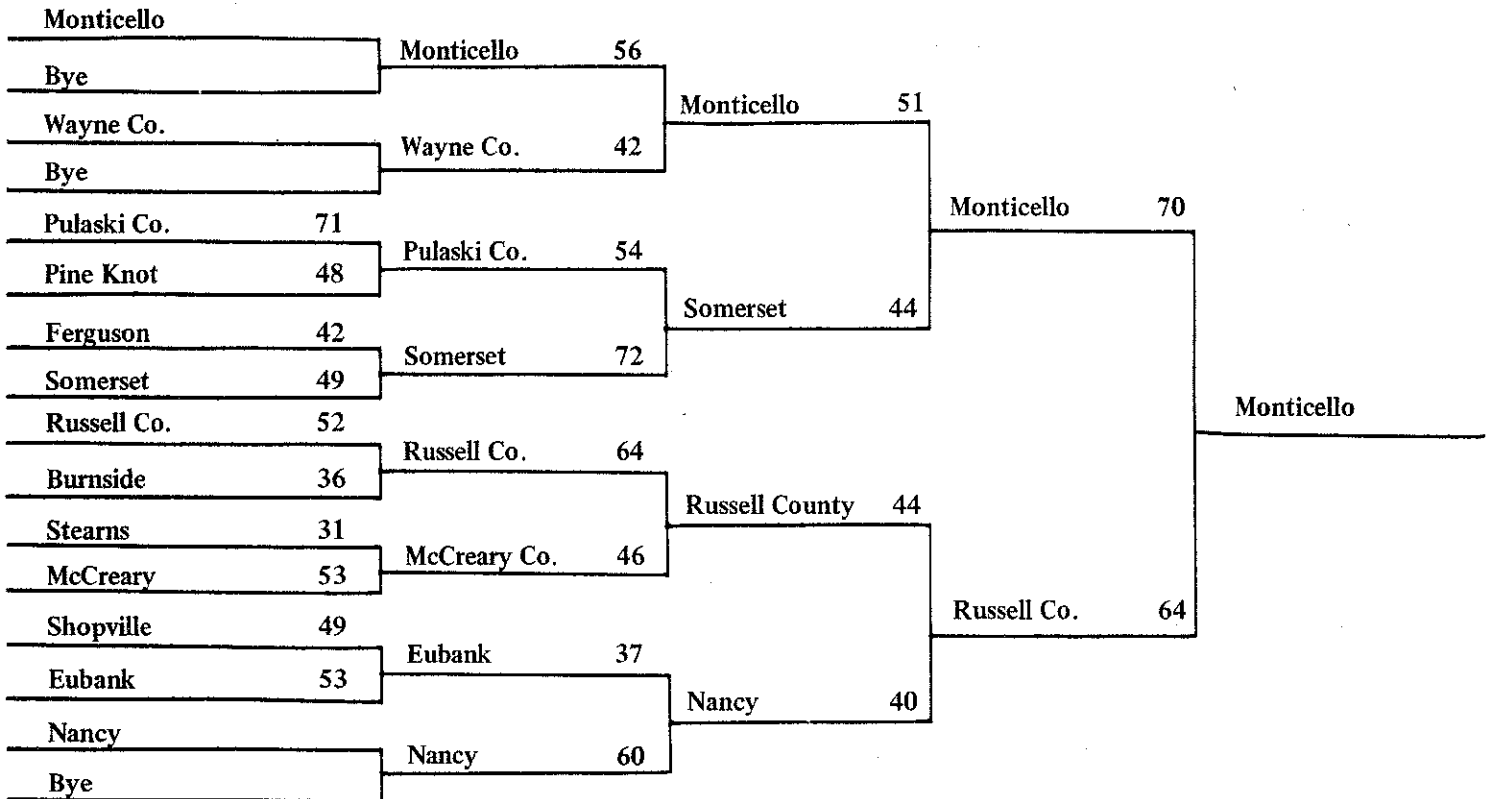
The Trojans put Mt. Vernon and Parksville out of the Regional Tournament, only to wind up in the finals against Lily. Fred Frye tossed in 18 free throws, 38 points, in all as MHS won 84 - 73.

MHS faced Hodgenville in the opening round of the State Tournament. Fred Frye made 30 points, while Don made 15. MHS won 67 - 61. The Trojans then eliminated Clay County, as Gene Pendleton scored a game high 17. In a game that was much closer than the score indicates MHS lost to the eventual Champion St. Xavier. With only 46 seconds to play, MHS was down by 3 points but lost by 10 points, 58 - 48. Clark County then beat MHS in the Consolation Game and the Trojans settled for 4th place. Fred Frye was named to the All-State Tournament Team. This team finished with a final record of 30 - 8, and is one of the best teams in MHS history. Nearly 250 cars met this team at Burnside. At a short program Mayor R. G. Breeding presented this team with a key to the City before an overflow crowd.

The Trojans were returning all but two players, Tommy Jones and Billy Foister, from last year's squad. The Trojans had been to the State Tournament the past two years and three out of the last four. In a preseason poll, Monticello was named as the best team in the state, while Don Frye was named as the best player in the state. Jeff Mullins, later an outstanding professional player, along with his team, Lafayette were named to the number two spot.

It appeared that the poll was accurate, as Monticello ripped off 22 wins, while losing three. The three losses were close, with a total of 6 points being the difference. Ashland handed the Trojans their worse loss, a 4 point decision in the Ashland Invitational. MHS lost a one point decision, 45 - 44, to Pikeville in a triple header in U.K.'s Memorial Coliseum. The winner was to be invited to the prestigious L.I.T. Seneca handed MHS their only loss at home, 52 - 51.

The Trojans were led by three seniors, often called the "Big Three". These were Kay Morris, Don Frye and Gene Pendleton. These three combined to average 52 points a game, with any one being capable of scoring 30 or more in a game. Junior Peyton and Butch Kennedy were the other two starters. Paul Frye earned a starting position later in the year. In the District Tournament, MHS whipped Nancy 75 - 36, Russell County 77 - 46 and met Wayne County in the finals. MHS won, as Don scored 40. In the regional MHS put away Hustonville 64 - 47 and Hazel Green 70 - 61. MHS and Wayne County met again, this time for the Regional Championship. The Trojans came away with an 82 - 63 victory and their third straight championship. Gene Pendleton was going to his fourth state tournament as a player, probably a state record.

MHS defeated first round opponent Campbellsville 76 - 59 as Pendleton scored 31. Don Frye had the flu. He was rested the first half of the Bell County game and Monticello won 69 - 65. Owensboro was thought to be tougher, and Don played, as Monticello won 61 - 56. Monticello was now in the finals of the State Tournament. Louisville Flaget was the opponent and was definitely a good team. They had been rated high all year. Monticello may have won if they could have handled the full court press Flaget employed the latter part of the game. The press resulted into several turnovers and easy baskets for Flaget. Monticello lost by nine, 65 - 56. Don and Gene both made the All Tournament Team. All the Trojans returned home heroes.

Henderson Eads, Jr. played in this State Tournament making him and his father Henderson Eads the only father and son at Monticello High School to play in the State Tournament.

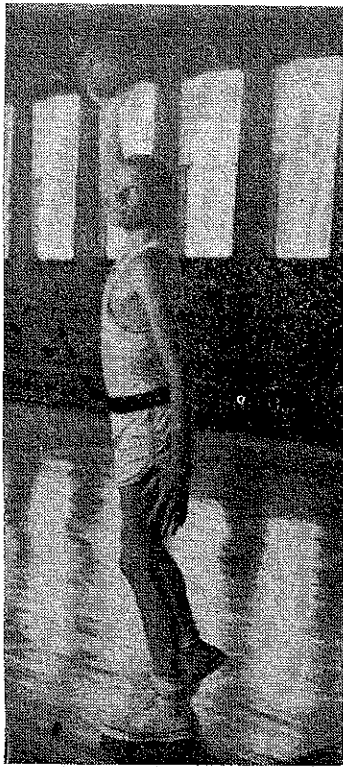

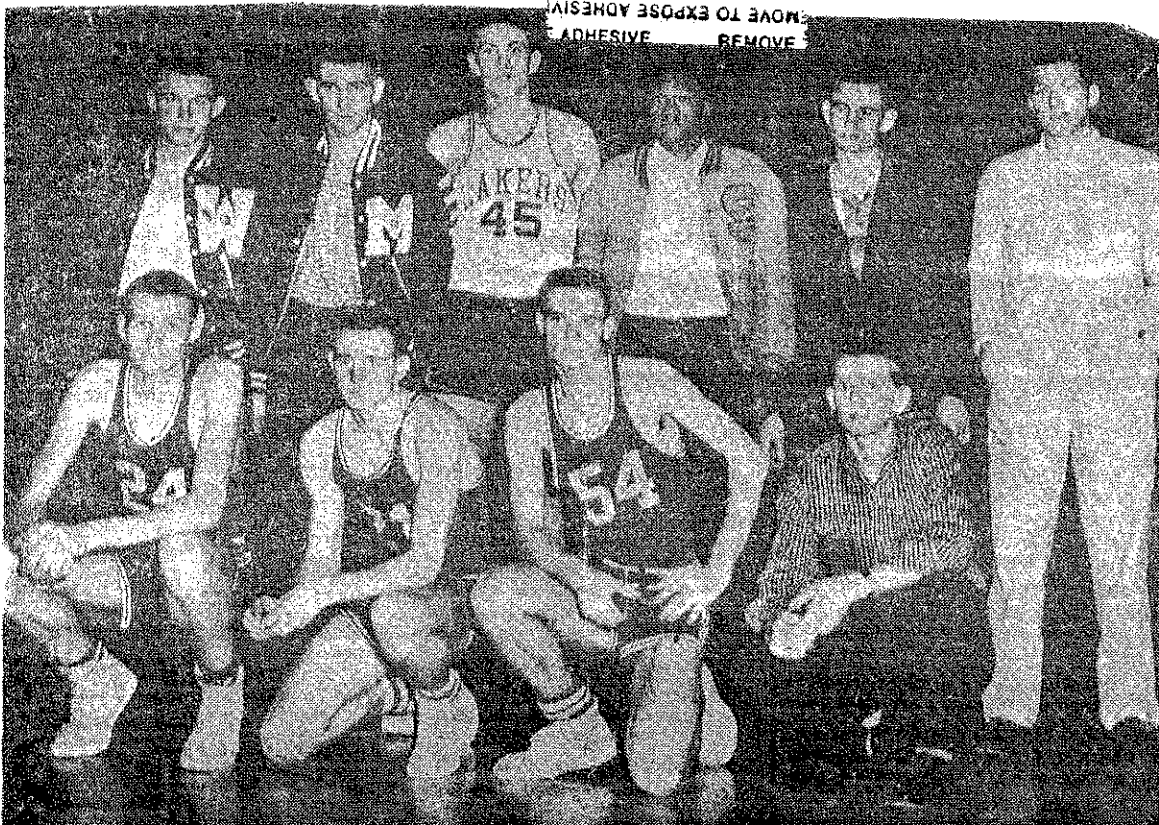

in the Region final, it will be the fourth State Tournament appearance—almost certainly a state record. He was on the team as an eighth grader in 1956.

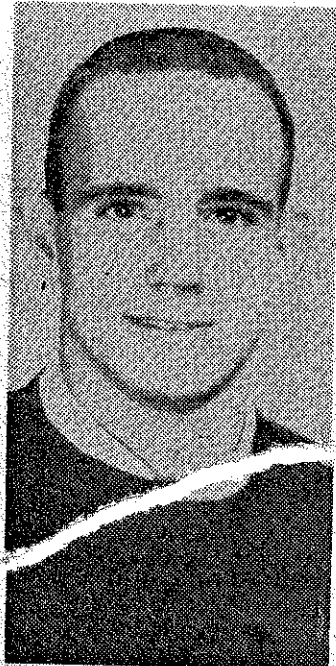

Mainstays of this year's squad are Pendleton, a 6-2 senior; Don Frye, a 6-4 senior; Kay Morris, a 6-3 senior, and Junior Peyton, a 6-2 junior. Paul Frye, Don's brother and a 5-9 junior, just recently earned himself a starting berth.

The two Fries, incidentally, are brothers of Fred Frye, star of the 1958 team and an All-State Tournament choice, and Thurston Frye, who went on to Bethel Junior College and now plays for Pfeiffer College in North Carolina.

Harper was himself a great guard while playing for Eastern Kentucky. His only prior coaching experience before coming to Monticello was at Broadhead, a small school also in the 12th Region.

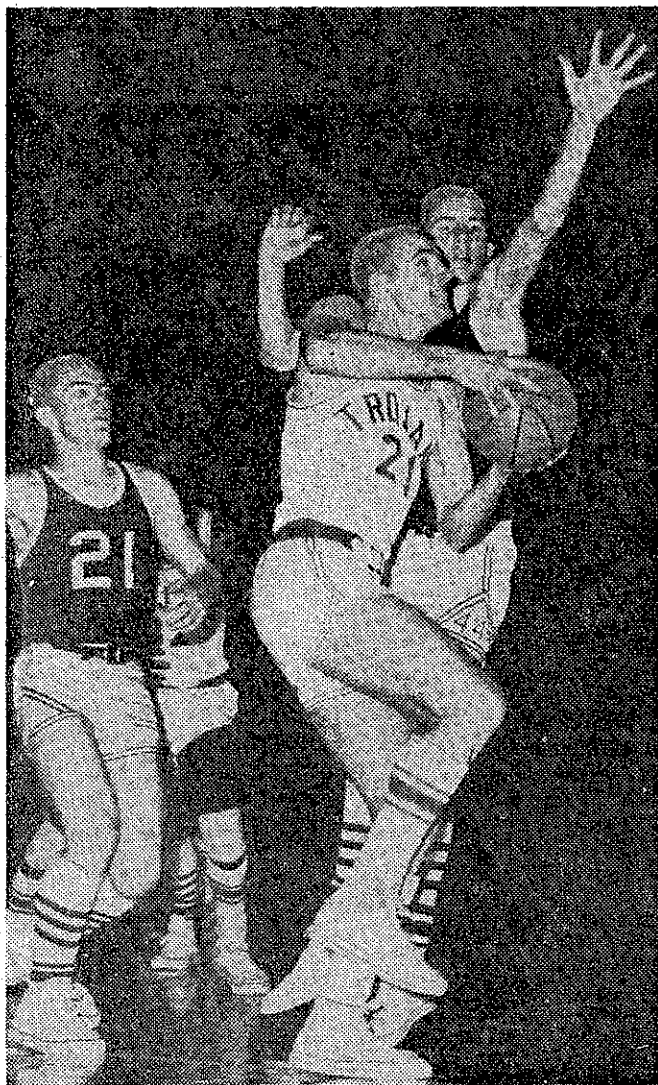

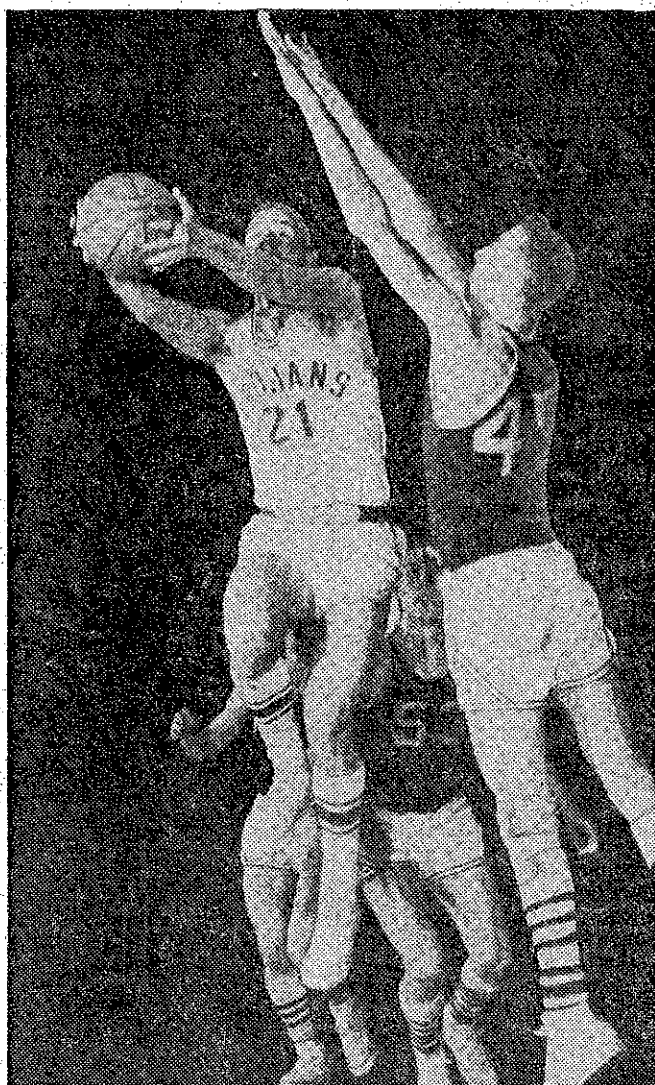

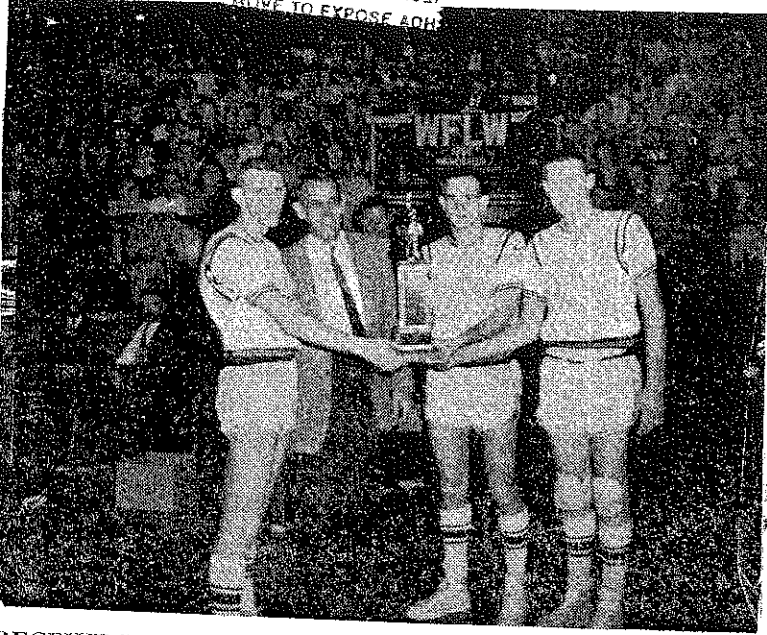

Trivette plans to start Wheelwright's Bobby Vicars and Ishmael at forwards, Pikeville's Don Ratliff at center, and Har-

per and Pendleton at guards. His subs will be Paul Sester of Meade Memorial, Cecil Tuttle of Hazel Green, Roy Ware of Camargo, Bob Rose of Clark County and Weems.

Watson is sure of four of his starters: Deeken and Madisonville's Doug Walsh at forwards, Butler's Bill Akridge at center, and Finnegan at guard. Either Charles Marshall of Henderson Douglass or Walter Gee of Hopkinsville Attucks will man the other guard post.

Backing them will be David Yewell of Owensboro, Billy Briscoe of Anderson, Larry Stewart of Hickman County and Jim Ricketts of Manual.

Indiana Starters Taller For 1st All-Star Game

Indiana's All-Stars will have a distinct height advantage when they lineup for the opening tipoff against the Kentucky All-Stars tomorrow night at Butler Fieldhouse in Indianapolis.

Kentucky coach Gene Rhodes has picked a starting unit that excludes the two tallest players on his squad.

The Kentucky starters will be Jeff Mullins (6-3½) of Lexington Lafayette and Darel Carrier (6-3) of Bristow at forward, Ted Deeken (6-4) of Louisville Flaget at center, and Gene Pendleton (6-2) of Monticello and Tommy Finnegan (6-2) of Flaget at guard.

THAT MEANS THREE Indiana starters will be taller than Kentucky's biggest man, Deeken, and another Hoosier will match Deeken's height.

Indiana's opening lineup, determined by votes of sports writers and broadcasters rather than by coach Angus Nicolson, will consist of forwards Ron Bonham (6-5) of Muncie Central and Ron Divjak (6-5 of East Chicago Washington, center Mickey Reeves (6-7) of Bloomington, and guards Buster Briley (6-4) of Madison and T. C. Williams (6-1) of Fort Wayne Central.

Hoosier starters average a shade under 6-4 and Kentucky's a little less than 6-3.

If Rhodes finds more size is necessary, he can call on 6-7 William Smothers of Lexington Dunbar and 6-5 Charley Ishmael of Mt. Sterling.

In fact, the extent to which Rhodes is counting on Smothers was indicated when the young coach called Smothers "possibly the key man" on his team.

"IF WE GET a real good job on the boards from Smothers, as we have every right to expect from a player his size, it would make our chances a lot brighter," Rhodes commented.

Rhodes said, however, that Deeken had earned the starting nod over Smothers by his outstanding play in practice.

"Although we'll be sacrificing some size by starting Deeken, he has real good moves in the pivot, he's smart and he helps our attack operate smoothly," Rhodes pointed out.

Rhodes admitted the Kentuckians have a wealth of fine shooters but expressed concern over a lack of team speed.

"We don't have a real speed merchant on the squad, and that could hurt us because I

know Indiana has two or three boys who can really move," Rhodes said.

Although acknowledging any of his players is capable of having a good night, Rhodes didn't hesitate in naming Mullins and Finnegan as likely to give Indiana the most trouble.

"THEY'RE BOTH tremendous players," Rhodes enthused. "Mullins can do everything, and Finnegan is about as fine a shooter as you'll ever see."

Mullins, considered by some to be the best player ever to come out of Lexington, averaged 26.1 points last season, and Finnegan led Flaget to the state championship by averaging 20.4.

Carrier is another sharpshooter, and his scoring average of 31.2 for the 1959-60 campaign is the highest on the squad.

Kentucky appears to have a potent bench with Cecil Clair of Breathitt County, who averaged 27.6 last season, Tommy

Harper of Clark County, who averaged 25.7, and Larry Holt of Louisville Central, whose 21.6 average was best in the city.

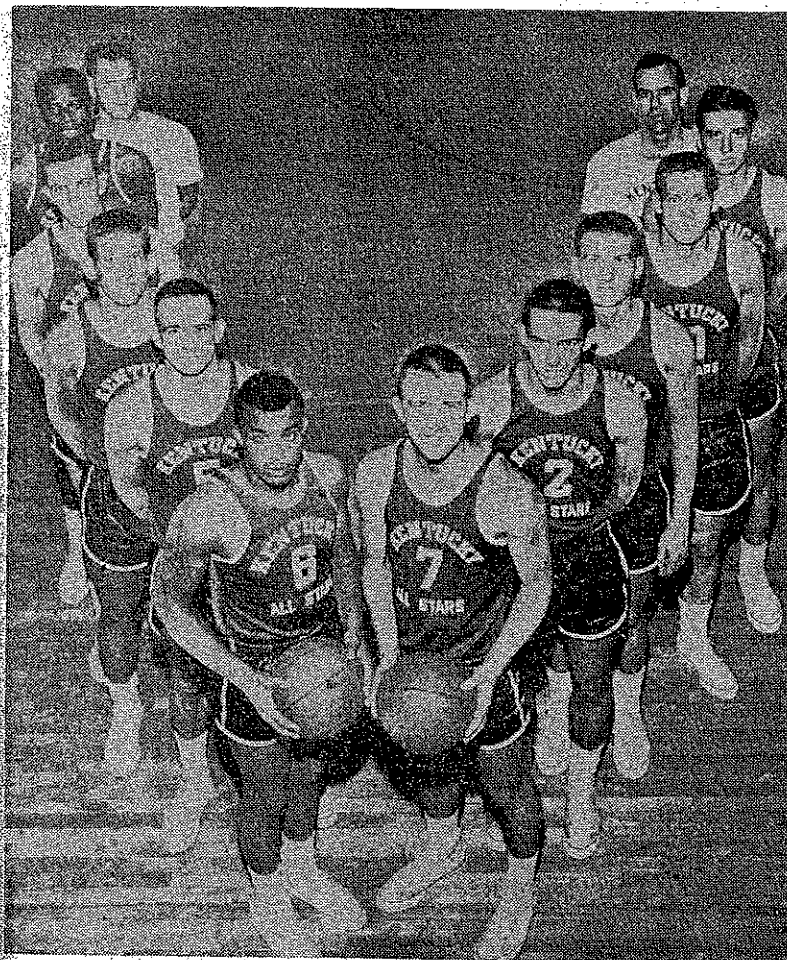
INDIANA'S most celebrated players are Bonham, a husky 200-pounder who averaged 28 points last season, and the lanky Briley, a sensational long-range bomber who had a 29.1 average.

Another high scoring Hoosier is 6-5½ Jeff Blue who averaged 27.6 for Little Bainsbridge.

Although Indiana leads Kentucky 18-5 in victories since the All-Star series was begun in 1940, Kentucky has managed an even break in the last six games.

Tomorrow night's game will begin at 8:30, as will the rematch a week from tomorrow at Freedom Hall.

Both games will be broadcast over WHAS.

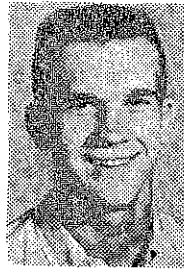

A boy who was switched from forward to guard and then became an All-Stater is the latest addition to the Kentucky high-school All-star basketball team.

The boy is Gene Pendleton of Monticello, who seems to have acquired a habit of doing the unusual.

Until last season, Pendleton had played forward at Monticello ever since he first made the team as an eighth-grader. Then Coach Joe Harper switched Pendleton to guard, partly because he wanted to prepare Gene for college.

There was another reason, too, Harper admits.

"Gene could do the job better than anyone else we had," the coach said.

Transition Easy

The transition was easy for a boy of Pendleton's ability. It was so easy, in fact, that Gene wound up making The Courier-Journal's All-State team and then earning the No. 5 spot on the Kentucky All-Star team for its annual two-game series with the elite of Indiana's graduating players.

The first game is scheduled June 18 at Butler Fieldhouse in Indianapolis and the second comes off June 25 here at Freedom Hall. As in the past,

both contests will benefit the blind.

Previously selected to the Kentucky team were Jeff Mullins of Lexington Lafayette, 6-4 guard; Tommy Finnegan of state champion Flaget, 6-2 forward; Darel Carrier of Bristol, 6-3 guard, and William Smothers of Lexington Dunbar, 6-7 center.

Make no mistake about it, Harper did not err in switching Pendleton to a guard position. Gene closed his scholastic career with his best season. That's ample evidence.

Pendleton averaged 17.0 points a game as Monticello rolled up a 32-4 record, only to lose to Flaget 65-56 in the final of the State Tournament at Freedom Hall. More than that, Gene carried the offensive burden in the early games of the tournament while high-scoring center Don Frye was fighting off a virus attack.

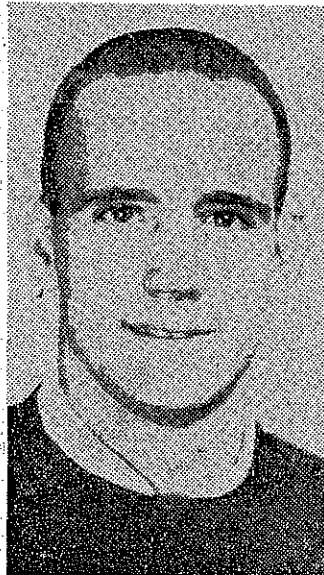
Pendleton, 6-2 and 178 pounds, averaged 17.2 in four tournament games. He pitched in 73 points, most of them on long shots.

Morehead, Ky. — Junior guard Harold Sergent of Morehead State College whipped in 32 points last night to tie Darel Carrier of Western for the individual scoring crown of the Ohio Valley Conference.

Sergent had 32 points with 10 minutes left in the game but went scoreless the rest of the way as league champion Murray came from behind to earn an 89-84 basketball victory before 2,500 fans.

Sergent, last year's scoring champion with a 20.4 average, and Carrier each finished with 546 points in 21 games, a 26-point average.

Murray Blitzes Western 77-68 To Nail Ohio Valley Tourney

Racers' Fast Breaks, Zones Sink Hilltoppers

Murray's resourceful Racers uncoiled their fast break and frustrated Western with a variety of zone defenses to derail the Hilltopper basketball express 77-68 last night in the Ohio Valley Holiday Tournament final.

The victory, achieved before 2,500 fans in Convention Center, gave cagey Cal Luther round one in what promises to be a lively duel with the young Hilltoppers of coach Johnny Oldham. It was simply a conquest of experience over youth.

At least 10 of Murray's 33 field goals came from fast-breaking guards Bennie Goheen and Gene Pendleton. The Racers "blitzed" them the moment Western put the ball on the board . . . a daring gamble but one that paid rich dividends as Murray held a slim 46-43 edge in rebounds.

Haskins Most Outstanding

So the fast breaks by Goheen and Pendleton combined with the blocking-out success of Stewart Johnson and John Namciu to squeeze every point possible out of Murray's multiple zones.

In defeat, Clem Haskins—voted the tourney's most outstanding player—led all scorers with 22 points to break the O.V.C. record. He wound up with 70 in three games to surpass the 67 of Bob Lavoy of Western in 1950.

Actually, Western broke the records but Murray took home the coveted trophy. The Hilltoppers erased team marks in scoring (250) and free throws (76). Haskins broke the free throw attempts mark of 38 set by Howie Crittenden of Murray in 1955 when he hit 30 of 40.

And the Toppers ducked under the fewest personals record of 51 set by Morehead in 1949 when they were called on only 46 fouls. The only record for Murray was a big one, field goals, as the Racers finished with 100, eight more than Eastern in 1951.

Pendleton and Johnson each scored 18 points to head Murray's balance attack. Namciu, with only five points in the second half, had 13. Goheen, with 11 in the same half, had 16.

echoed his thoughts, saying, "I haven't seen anyone anywhere like Clem."

Although the game does not count in conference standings, Namciu and Johnson said Murray was fired up. "I've never really been up for any game like I was for this one," Namciu admitted.

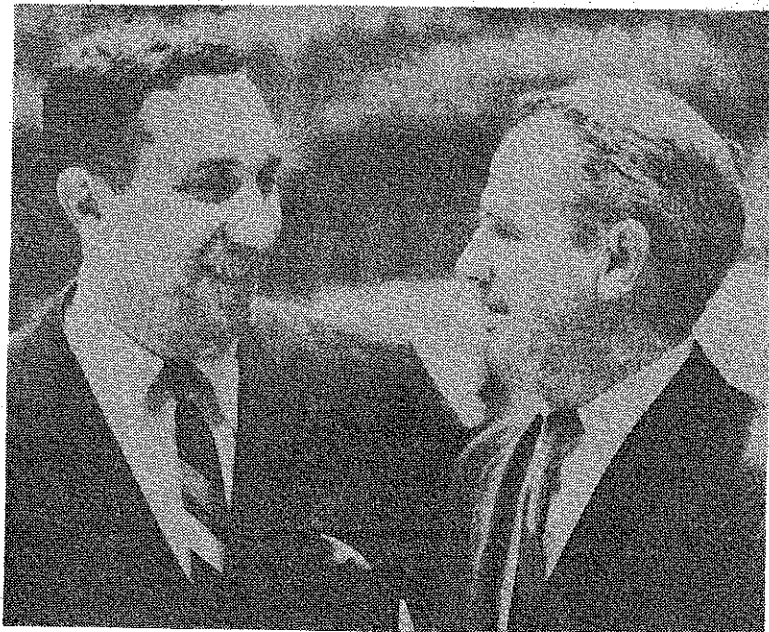

Even At Sailboating

All Luther Wants Is To Win

In the last two years, 38-year-old Cal Luther has "arrived" as a championship state college basketball coach and launched a new hobby as a sailboater.

The Murray coach caused some consternation among the sportsmanlike sailboating set at Kentucky Lake because he sails like he coaches—to win. He bought a Y-Flyer and raced everything in sight, then entered a championship race long before any other beginner would have dared.

An overzealous start caused him to destroy the chances of

the defending national champion, who wound up in the also-ran class with Luther.

If Persistence Pays Off . . .

But if Luther shows the same persistence about sailing that he has in coaching, he may yet turn out to be one of the leading Y-Flyer pilots in this part of the country.

It took Luther a while—six years to be exact—to hit the jackpot as a coach at Murray, but now that he has made the grade he plans to stay on top.

He picked up another championship trophy last night at

Convention Center when his smartly-drilled Thoroughbreds downed Western 77-68 in the final of the Ohio Valley Conference's first Christmas tournament. Last year, he led Murray to its first O.V.C. championship in 13 years and that stilled most of his critics. The way his team has started this season, winning eight of its first 10 games, he figures to hush up any remaining dissidents.

When Luther's team loses, he snarls at those around him and is about as friendly as a hungry bear. He paces the streets alone far into the night

and replies to questions in monosyllables.

Talkative Last Night

When his team wins, the fiercely competitive Georgia native—with a Milwaukee accent which stems from his northern upbringing—is talkative, boisterous and exuberant.

The intense University of Illinois graduate was all that in Murray's whooping dressing room last night.

"Take the week off," he yelled above the din. "Report

And they said that winning the O.V.C. tournament will help the rest of the way, even though they will be the No. 1 target for the rest of the league.

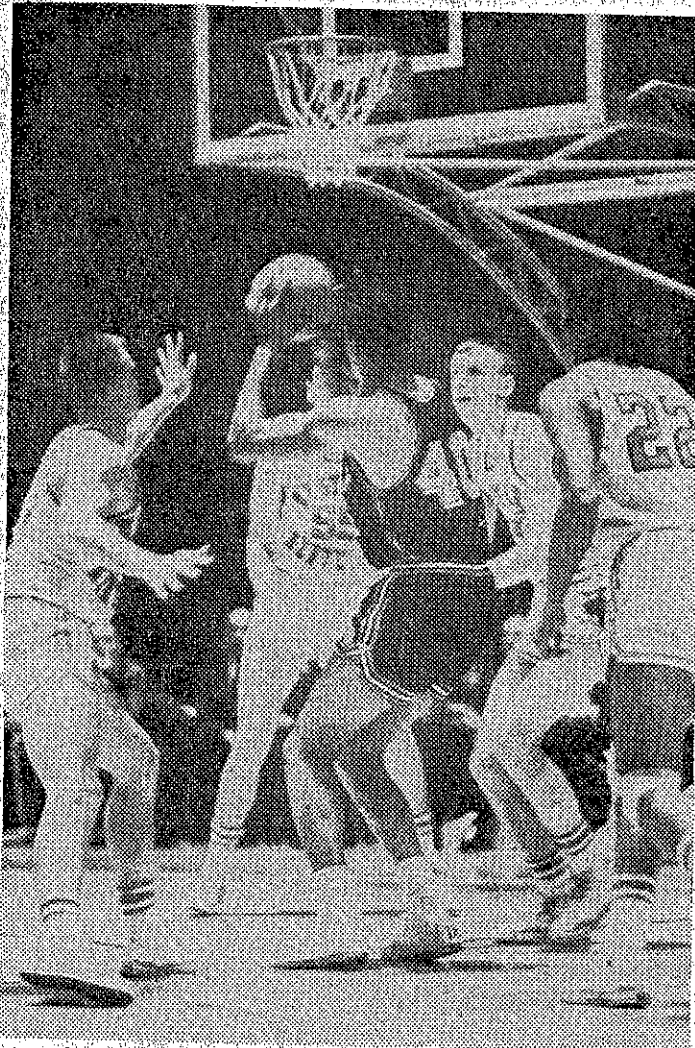
"It's going to be rough because everyone is going to be waiting for us," said senior forward John Namciu, "but we know we'll have to be ready and this shows us what we can do if we work."

In his last two games as a Thoroughbred, Gene Pendleton put on a show that many fans will long remember.

In the Western game Gene allowed Clem Haskins to score only five points against his defensive tactics, three of these from the foul line.

Against Morehead he allowed Harold Sargent to score only three points against him, all of these from the charity stripe.

Gene has done an outstanding job in his three years as a starter for the Racers. My congratulations on a job well done, and I'm sure that the students of Murray will have nothing but praise for his ability as an all-round player.

The Thoroughbred's victory over Morehead in their last game of the season gave Murray State the best regular season record since 1943.

The Racers ended at 9-5 in the OVC, good for third place, back of champion Eastern and second place Western.

In non-conference games the Racers won seven and lost two. Bradley beat them by two points at Bradley and Arizona State beat them by 11 in the finals of the Sun Devil Classic.

The Racers were unbeaten at home this season and over the last two seasons have put together a home winning streak of 16 games.

One school record, field-goal accuracy, was set by team: 837 of 1,821 attempts for a .459 percentage. Bennie Goheen also set a new individual record for field-goal accuracy, hitting on 111 of 210 attempts for .529.

Stewart Johnson and John Namcui both scored 520 points for the season for 20-point averages. Only five Murray players have scored more points in a single season.

Namcui hit 176 of 228 free throws for a .772 percentage, tops for the team. His total for both free throws made and attempted ranks fifth highest in Murray's history.

Johnson scored 210 field goals

and Herb McPherson 198 to rank fifth and seventh in that department of Murray's all-time records. Namcui's 172 field goals puts him in tenth place.

Johnson led the team in rebounding with 367 for an average of 14.1. His total ranks third in all-time records.

The season was the sixth straight winning one for Coach Cal Luther who has won 96 games and lost 79 in the seven years he has coached the Racers.
