









Somerset Team Discovers That Football Can Be Fun

"We let 'em rest a little bit," head coach Jerry Johns said yesterday. "They've earned it."

Such are the rewards of winning, which Somerset did last Friday in upending heavily favored Lexington Henry Clay

Two weeks ago, however, the sounds heard on the Somerset practice field were those of leather-popping, helmetcracking drills. It wasn't much fun - not after the Class AA team had dropped a season-opening game to pre-season Class A state favorite Frankfort by a 31-0

'We Tackled and Blocked Poorly'

"We were all disappointed after the Frankfort game," Johns said yesterday by telephone. "After that, we worked real hard, hitting on Monday and Tuesday. We just went back to fundamentals. We tackled and blocked poorly in the first game.

"I didn't think that we were as bad as we looked against Frankfort," Johns added.

Somerset got in the win column in game No. 2, whipping Campbellsville 20-7. And by beating Henry Clay, Somerset threw the race wide open in the Second Region's Second District.

This Friday, Danville plays Lexington Lafayette and Richmond Madison takes on Henry Clay in district action. Somer-set will get down to some more serious preparations in practice for Friday's nonchampionship game at Millersburg Military Institute.

Johns has built virtually his whole of-fensive attack around "four or five good running backs."

Halfback Jeff Perkins is Somerset's most dependable rusher, Fullback Jimmy Mounce is a threat, too, as Henry Clay learned on the second play from scrimmage when the 180-pound senior raced 55 yards for a touchdown.

Halfbacks Bob Bates, Rodney Price and Jeff Cruse are other outstanding

"Perkins has real fine speed," said Johns. "He got us out of holes several times when we needed it."












"Dave has the ability to think out a play and contain it real well," Johns said.






