Purcell's skills showed as youth

Bennie Purcell knew early that his son had the ability to be a tennis prodigy. Mel Purcell's exceptional hand-eye coordination was noticed at about age 5, and after playing enough junior tennis and being coached by his Hall of Fame father, Purcell played in his first Kentucky High School Athletic Association state tennis tournament as a fifth grader.

He won two state doubles titles with his brother before he was in high school, and a singles title his senior year.

Add in a more-than successful college career, professional career and now coaching career, and one can see why Purcell was named to the 2010 KHSAA Hall of Fame.

"I'm psyched about it," Purcell said. "I always loved high school tennis. I was playing from third grade on. I'm pretty passionate about this game and appreciate them giving me this award before I turn 70."

At 49, Purcell is one of the younger members inducted into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. But that seems to be part of his style, according to father Bennie, who was coaching tennis at Murray State during Mel's youth.

"When he was 14 or 15 he could beat most of my players," Bennie Purcell said. "By the time he was 16, he could beat all of them."

As a seventh and eighth grader, Mel won the state doubles title both years with his brother, Del, who was then a junior and senior.

"I was the little guy running around and Del supplied the power," Mel Purcell said. "He joked he would beat me up if I missed the return."

Purcell played tennis at Memphis State University and then transferred to Tennessee, where he won a Southeastern Conference title in both singles and doubles and the NCAA doubles championship in 1980.

He played professionally through the 1980s and was ranked in the top 30 for the first five years of his career, earning the 1981 Rookie of the Year. Purcell's shining moment came in 1983 where he reached the quarterfinals at Wimbledon.

Purcell currently coaches tennis at Murray State, and has won two Ohio Valley Conference team titles.

While Purcell's later achievements have given him enough conversation matter for years, he remembers his high school exploits, and failures, just as vividly. He remembers exact

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scores of matches and opponents, especially the name of his arch nemesis, St. Xavier's Mark Buechler, who beat Purcell his sophomore and junior years for the singles title. But after Buechler had graduated and Purcell spent time in California improving his game, Purcell won the elusive singles title his senior year.

"If I had lost that, that's just something hollow," Purcell said. "You had three runners up. Then that wouldn't be worth an induction."

Even though Purcell is now in two halls of fame (he's also in the Intercollegiate Tennis Association Hall of Fame) with success coming out of his ears, his daddy is proud of something else.

"The thing I like about him was that he was able to accomplish what he did and he didn't get the big head with what he accomplished," Bennie Purcell said.
