
I would like to take this opportunity to recommend Ralph Richardson for membership in the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame.

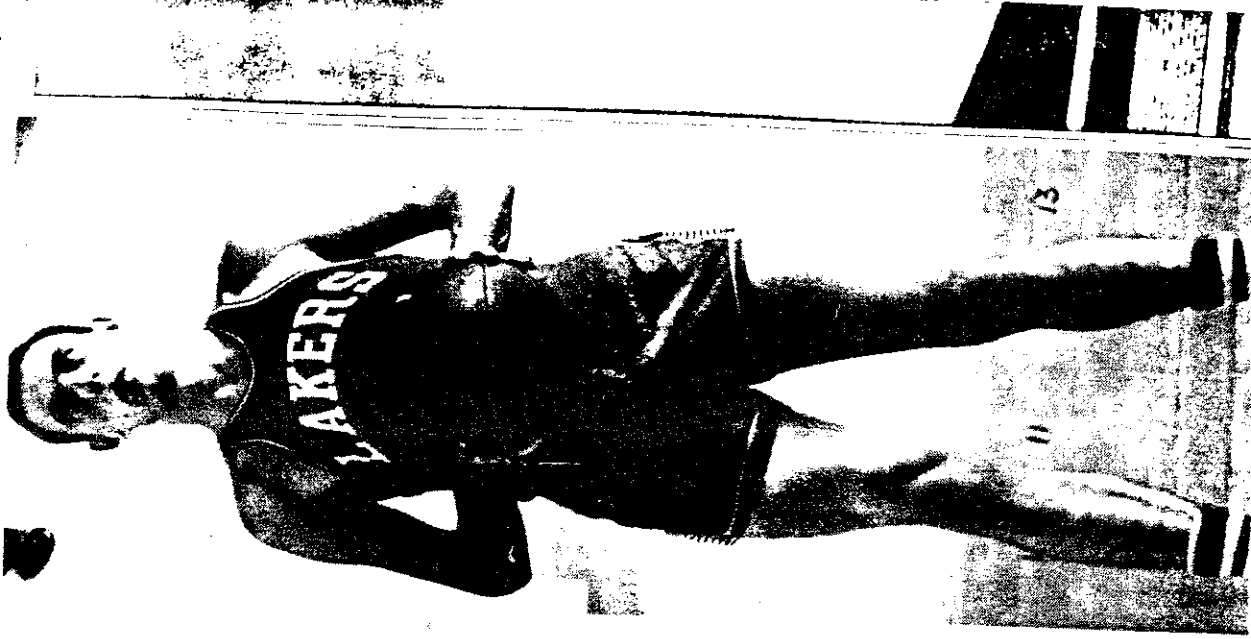

Davieess Co., Russell Co., Dunbar, Earlington Capture L.I.T. Openers

With the opening-day preliminaries over, here's the Louisville Invitational Tournament in a nutshell:

Today's power-packed quarter-finals will find host Male tangling with No. 9-ranked Earlington at 3 p.m. and No. 1 Davieess County meeting No. 4 Central at 4:30. In tonight's games, No. 18 Manual will play No. 23 Russell County at 7:30 and No. 3 Lexington Dunbar will go against No. 5 St. Xavier at 9:15.

It was a short L.I.T. for Flaget, Ahrens, Atherton and Shawnee. They fell victims to visiting teams yesterday.

Davieess County mowed down Flaget 86-56, Earlington whipped Ahrens 73-40, Russell County outlasted pesky Atherton 67-60, and Dunbar ousted Shawnee 53-46.

Davieess County, making Dr. Likkenhous look good, was clearly the class of the first round. A big, good-shooting club, the Panthers won with ease over a better than average Flaget.

But, good as the Panthers were, they had to share the spotlight with the two All-Staters in the tourney, Russell County's 6-7 Ralph Richardson and Earlington's 6-8 Harry Todd.

Richardson joined some exclusive company with a 38-point performance, tying him with Berea's Don Mills and Central City's Corky Withrow for the most points ever scored in an

L.I.T. game. Mills and Withrow set the record in 1955. Todd also had a good day, pitching in 34.

DUNBAR 53-46—The Lexington club had one of its worst shooting games and it's a good thing for Shawnee that it did. For the Indians, too, were far below par. Even so, they made a run at Dunbar in the last quarter, getting within nine points midway of the period

before closing the gap to the final margin.

A frigid second quarter that saw Jerry Keiffner's Indians make only one field goal—and that a "gift" when a Dunbar player was charged with jumping above the basket while a Shawnee shot, one that was short, was in the air.

The Indians didn't score during the first six minutes and 15 seconds of the quarter. Dunbar, meanwhile, pitched in 12 to go on top 25-9. S. T. Roach's Bear-

cats kept out of trouble in the third period began to wilt in the last stanza but had enough left to hold on.

Berry Stars

With Faurest Coogle leading the Shawnee attack, the Indians cut a 14-point deficit down to nine—at 45-37—but the Dunbar bellcow, center Julius Berry, rose to the occasion and quickly made two field goals to stem the uprising.

Coogle led all scorers with 21 points; edging Dunbar's Robert Jackson, who had 20. Berry added 15.

Dunbar hit 19 of 53 shots for 35.3 per cent; Shawnee 15 of 50 for 30.0.

DAVIEESS CO. 86-56 —Buck Snyder's top-ranked Panthers, even though they made many errors, simply shot too well and had too much height for Paulie Miller's Braves. And it didn't help Flaget's cause when Bob

Noonan had his worst shooting game of the season.

Big Don Crosley, a 6-7 center; forward Ronnie Wells and class forward Bobby Rascoe, a 6-3 operator who made the all-tourney team in last year's State Tournament, led the winners' onslaught.

They scored a total of 66 points and controlled both boards. Crosley led with 29 points, matching the anthers' highest total this season. Rascoe had scored 29 against Russell County. Wells chipped in with 23 points and Rascoe got 14.

Davieess County erased an early Flaget edge and spurted late in the opening period to take a 21-9 lead and was never headed. In the last four minutes of the first quarter, Wells scored eight of the Panthers' 13 points.

Noonan, who entered the game as Louisville's highest scorer, got only 14 yesterday. Gary Steiger, Mickey Clark and Norman Gruneisen each tallied 10.

Davieess Co., getting most of its shots near the basket, hit 35 of 69 for 50.7 per cent. Flaget had a percentage of 31.5 on 24 of 76.

EARLINGTON 73-40 —In a game that was somewhat less than thrilling, Jim Larmouth's Earlington gang jumped into an 8-0 advantage, increased it to 40-20 at halftime and 53-34 at the end of third period.

As usual, Todd was the game's dominant figure, tossing in 12 field goals and 10 free throws.

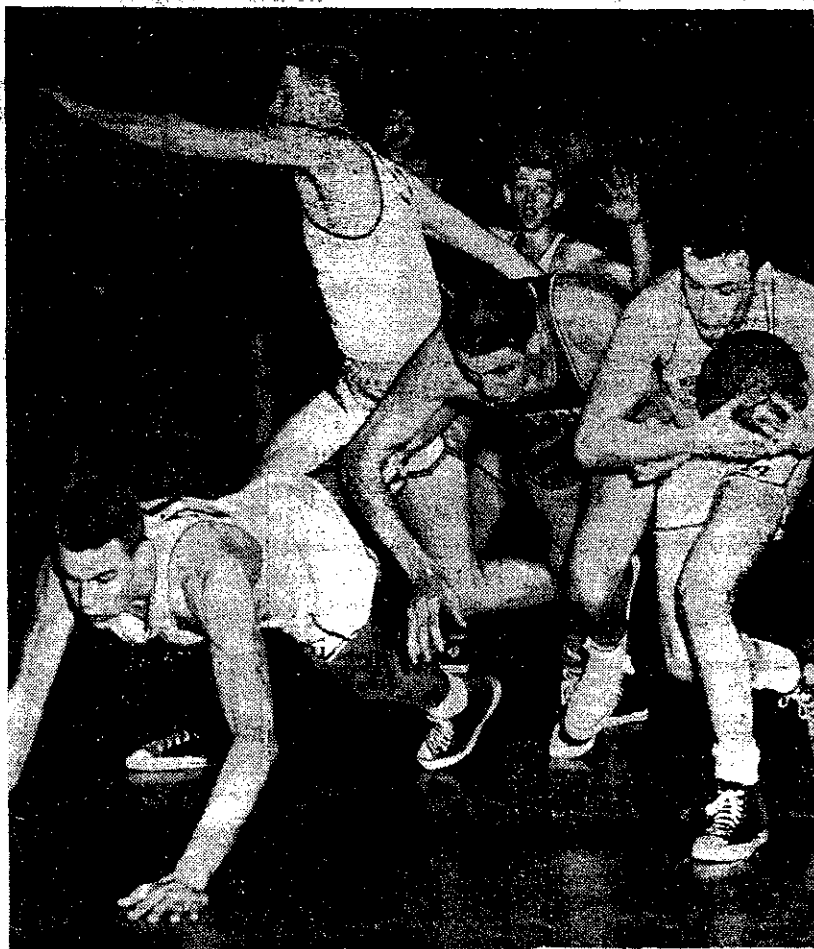

is Gain Semis 1st Time; Male, Manual vs. St. X.

It's a tough league this season, this Louisville league.

For the first time in history, four City teams have fought their way into the semi-finals of the talent-loaded Louisville Invitational Tournament at Male High gym.

The conquerors are Central, Male, Manual and St. Xavier.

At 11:30 this morning, defending champion Central will face Male, the "ugly duckling" of the quarter-finals—the Bulldogs were the only quarter-finalist not ranked among the top 25 in the state. Then, at 1 p.m., St. Xavier will battle Manual. The winners will clash at 8 tonight for the title.

"Sophomore Day" was observed during yesterday's session, Central's Larry Holt and Male's Everett Stallworth starring.

Torrid shooting, No. 4-rated Central, which seems to reach the heights in the L.I.T., made the biggest splash when the Yellowjackets turned No. 1-ranked Daviess County every way but loose en route to an 81-58 victory. It was Daviess County's first loss in 17 games. Holt drilled home 13 of 20 shots and scored 29 points.

Male's young Purples, with Stallworth out-scoring 6-3 All-State Harry Todd, ousted No. 9 Earlinton 66-52.

In the night session, Russell County's magnificent Ralph Richardson, also an All-Stater, broke the L.I.T. single-game scoring record when he piled up 40 points, but Manual's big Crimsons won out 72-67. In the nightcap, a smooth St. Xavier team, ranked No. 5, eliminated No. 3 Lexington Dunbar 57-50. Capacity crowds of 3,800 saw both sessions.

The 6-7 Richardson Thursday night tied Corky Withrow and Don Mills for the L.I.T. record with 38 points. Withrow, from Central City, and Mills, from Berea, set the record in 1955.

Tonight will mark only the fourth time in the 11-year history of the tourney that City teams have wound up in the championship game. Male and Flaget made it in '50 and '53 (Male won both times) and Central whipped Manual last year.

MALE 66-52 — Guy Strong's well-prepared Bulldogs got a death grip on Earlinton early and never let go. Using a half-court press early in the game and then a zone designed to stop Todd, Male outplayed the Yellowjackets all the way.

CENTRAL 81-58 — Making a determined bid for the state's No. 1 ranking, W. L. Kean's Yellowjackets hit 50 per cent of their shots, 35 of 70. Under that sort of barrage, Daviess County never had a chance. Central led at the quarter stops 19-13, 45-33 and 62-41.

MANUAL 72-67 — The victory was Manual's, but it was Richardson, a hard-working jumping-jack, who commanded the spotlight. It'll be a long time before L.I.T. fans forget him. Russell County's strategy was

simple—the Lakers threw the ball to Richardson under the basket and he usually scored or was fouled.

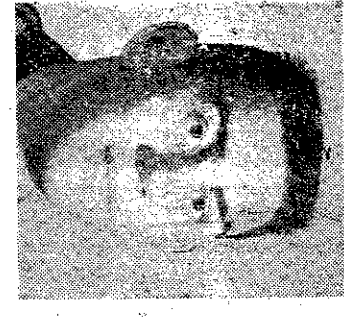

Lickert, Turner, Richardson, Jones, Stacey on '57 All-State

Tall, talented and versatile. Those words aptly describe the 10 boys who have been named to The Courier-Journal's 14th annual All-State basketball team.

Billy Ray Lickert, who led Lafayette's Generals to the state championship, is honorary captain of the team because he polled the most votes from the All-State Board of coaches, writers, officials and sportsmen.

And Lickert is a good example of the "tall, talented and versatile." He is 6-3, has been called by college coaches as one of Kentucky's finest ever, and he can play any position with almost equal ability.

The Lafayette star is one of three repeaters on the team. Harry Todd, Earrington's 6-8 junior sensation, and Newport Public's John Turner also made the team for the second year in a row.

Others honored with berths on the state's most exclusive team are Flat Gap's Charlie Osborne, Maysville's Bobby Jones, Newport Public's John Turner, and Eastern's David Eakins.

David Eakins, Eastern's first Negro ever to make the team. Todd and Richardson are the only underclassmen; both are juniors.

Highlighting the talented ten: BILL LICKERT—He is the fourth Lafayette All-Stater. Others were Bob Minter (50), Vernon Hutton (33-34) and Bill Florence (34). Ralph Carlisle, Kentucky. If not there, it'll be Lickert who coached all of them, says Lickert can do more things well than any of them, and is the best.

Lickert averaged 24.4 points per game, yet wasn't a "shot gun" and played but little more than half of 10 games. He's had numerous offers—both from college basketball teams and pro-

essional baseball clubs. He's a star pitcher and catcher. But he'll probably follow in the footsteps of Hutton and enroll at Kentucky. If not there, it'll be either pro baseball or a college with a good baseball program.

HARRY TODD—The Earrington standout, biggest player on the team at 6-8, was runner-up to Lickert in the voting. State Tournament fans were denied a chance to see him for the second straight year when his team lost out to South Hopkins. He averaged 30.7 points and 20 rebounds a game this season and now has a career total of 2,605 points. (Wayland's Kelly Coleman holds the state record of 4,263.)

Although he has another year, college scouts already are flocking around him. Coached by Jim Lammouth, he's the only Earrington All-Stater in history.

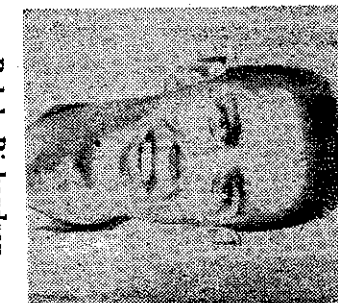

South Hopkins Is Drawn

A Madri Gras atmosphere continued to hover over basketball-loving fans in Russell County, even as late this week as Wednesday afternoon.

Just ask any Russell Countian and he'll tell you why all the celebrating—of course, he'll reply, it's only natural... the boys won the Regional Tournament... we're going to the State.

BY THE BOYS, as any typical local man will verify, are the Lakers of Russell County High. The tournament they won, which everybody around here already knows all about, was the 12th Region at Somerset last Saturday night where they emerged victorious over a fighting team from Junction City 68 to 62. And by going to the State is meant they are numbered among the "Sweet Sixteen"—16 Regional winners—and will vie with them in the

State Tournament at Louisville, which began Wednesday night. The Lakers' first game is Thursday morning, at 10:45, against a formidable opponent known as South Hopkins and, from the looks of things to date, at least two-thirds of the county will be in attendance at that game.

Saturday night's tug-of-war for the championship of the 12th at Somerset had all the earmarks of a Frank Merriwell or Ozark like story—for after trailing most of the way, and behind even 10 points early in the fourth quarter, the Lakers snatched the game from the fire with an almost Superman effort.

THE JUNCTION CITY crew was hot, and appeared like a new sotppe-up engine in the game's very beginning, as they swept through the first quarter like the wind to wind-up on the long end of the score 20 to 15.

Russell fans sighed, but felt confident, as the young giants lined-up for the second round of the battle. As the leave-ho commenced, it was at once evident that the Junction City boys were not nearly out of gas—for they

continued to pump in baskets from all over the court, and the Russell fans' sighing-ease had now turned to alarm. The half ended with the opponents ahead six points—36-30.

Puzzled local fans milled in corridors at half-time, and there was one question on the lips of everyone, concerning their favored Lakers:

"What's wrong?"

But there were no ready answers, other than the fact that several players had been ailing. Still there was hope.

BUT THIS SLIM measure of optimism completely vanished among the most ardent when Junction City continued its Goliath-like swath of point-gathering into the third quarter, and went 10 in the lead on more than one occasion.

The Lakers were now certainly the underdogs, and they looked it. But somehow they managed to scrape themselves together and cut the lead to four as the quarter ended 48-44.

A few hopefuls still held to the theory, "they'll come out of it, yet," even when Junction City commenced another onslaught of point-making in the fourth. The lead again climbed to ten. But one of the players who had literally been smothering Russell County's high scorer, big 6-6 Richardson, fouled out.

Now it was time for the Lakers to make their move. Time was

called. Instructions were given and plans laid.

THEY GOT the ball. Richardson was under the goal. Roy tossed the ball—ante-over it went to the big center, Richardson. He clutched it—then dropped it in easily. The crowd went wild.

Junction City threw the ball in, but lost it within seconds to the crazed Russell Countians. There was another ante-over to Richardson again—once more he dropped it in the basket. Miraculously, his teammates retrieved the ball. The big boy fixed himself. Ante-over, and he tipped it in a third time—and then a fourth! Someone fouled him. Russell County tied the score! Now they forged ahead two points. The entire Somerset gymnasium was in complete bedlam.

WITH THE LAST minute seeming like an eternity, the Lakers added to their first lead of the game by six more points, and at the end the scoreboard read 68-62 in their favor.

Richardson collected 37 points; Poikston 12; Roy 9; Stephens 6; and Skaggs 4. To win the crown advancement was made in this manner: over Lily 56 to 54; over Eubank 42-39, and the final.

South Hopkins is a small team—the tallest man is 6 ft.—with a brilliant record from Western Kentucky. King of the 2nd Region, ratings have South Hopkins listed at 6-10 of a point ahead of Russell County.

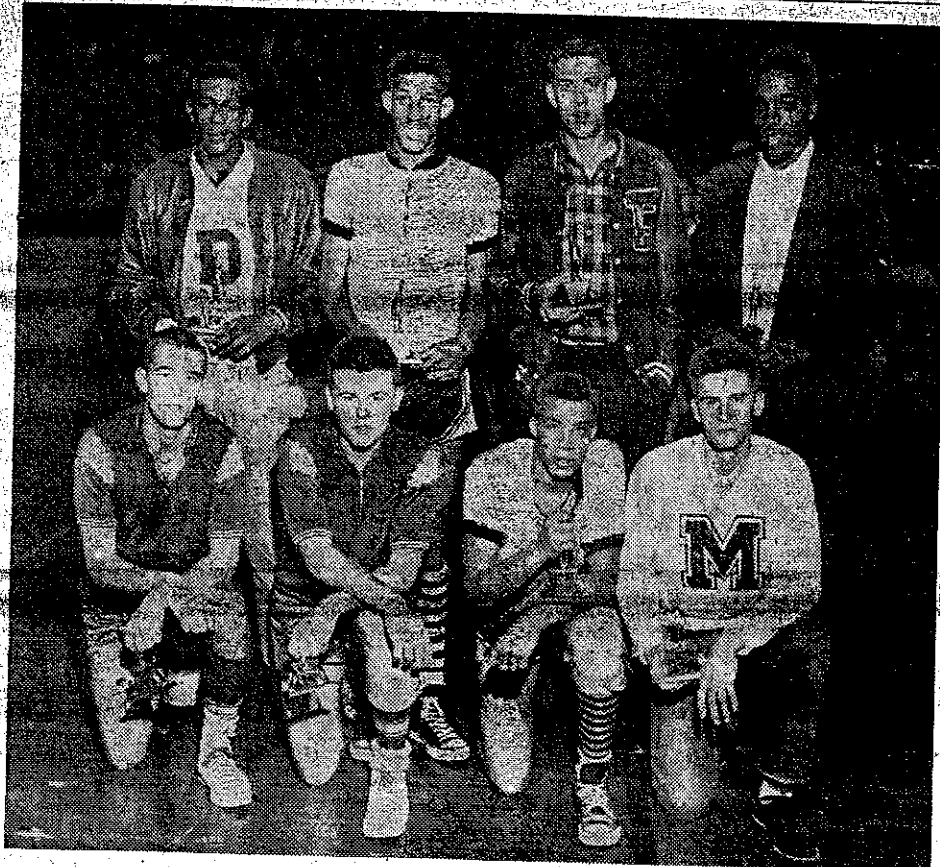

Boys like Dixie Heights' Howard Stacey, and Joe Stark of Lafayette's All-State Bill Lickert, Nicholas County's Mutt and Jeff combination of 6-8½ Ned Jennings and 5-6 Donnie Hillcock, Russell County's Ralph Richardson, South Hopkins' Jim Beshears, Daviess County's Don Crosley and Bobby Rascoe, Tompkinsville's J. E. Petett, Hartford's Joe Tichenor.

But the biggest heroes were two unsung Dixie Heights players, Bob Eveleth and John Heckman, who teamed up in the late stages to fire their team to a 58-55 win over Nicholas County in the first afternoon game. Lafayette spanked Hartford 70-49 in the second contest.

A crowd of 13,000 saw the battles.

The morning session, which drew 9,000, saw Russell County nip South Hopkins 61-58 and Daviess County top Tompkinsville 60-50.

Dixie Heights 58, Nicholas Co. 55

One of the best Northern Kentucky teams in years, Coach Lew Phillips' Dixie Heights Colonels, came through with a breath-taking rally in the last three minutes to edge the Blue Jackets, who seem to play their best when Ned Jennings is having his troubles with fouls.

The only points that separated the teams at halftime came when Jennings, biggest player in the tourney, was called for goal-tending on a last second, behind-the-midstripe fling by Bob Eveleth. That made it Dixie Heights 28-26 and the Colonels entered the last quarter with that same two-point lead, 40-38.

With Jennings burdened by four personals since early in the second half, the Nicholas County situation looked rather dark, but the big boy fired a come-

back that put his team on top 49-46 with 4:38 left.

Dixie's John Heckman and Nicholas County's Jack Guy traded buckets and then Howard Stacey went to work. He scored on a driving hook at 2:59 and came right back with a one-hander at 2:05 to provided the Colonels with a 52-50 edge.

Eveleth, fouled by Donnie Hillcock, the guard who masterminds the Nicholas County attack, sank two free throws with 1:40 remaining and the Colonels led 54-51. Guy cut the deficit to one point with a follow shot at 1:15. With 21 seconds left, Stacey fouled Stanley Rose and he calmly made two gratis shots to recapture the lead for Nicholas County 55-54.

Scores Winning Points

Stacey hurried down the floor, fired and missed, but Heckman was fouled by Jennings (his fifth) while going for the rebound.

With eight seconds remaining, the stocky Dixie Heights forward made two free throws and the Ninth Region champions were "in." Eveleth added two

more points when he intercepted the in-bounds pass and scored on a lay-up.

Stacey, with 19, and Jennings, with 16, vanned the scoring. Nicholas County hit 33 per cent, the winners 36.1. The Colonels are now 28-3, the 'Jackets 24-9.

Lafayette 70, Hartford 49

Although Lafayette had a little trouble adjusting to the tournament atmosphere at first, the Generals looked every inch a title contender as they flogged Hartford 70-49 in the afternoon trailer.

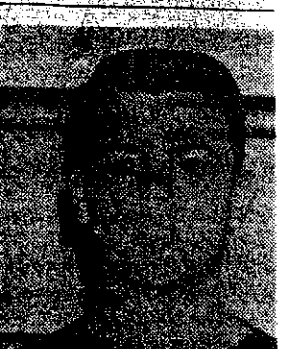

Kentucky and Western seem to be the leading contenders, with U.K. having an advantage.

PAUL SMITH — A ruggedly constructed boy, Smith stands 6-4 and weighs 190 and, for his size, is perhaps the best rebounder on the team. He snared 274 offensive rebounds, a really impressive number; and 351 defensive rebounds. Letcher Norton, his coach, says he is the best rebounder he has coached. He and the basket aren't strangers, either, since he connected on 306 out of 659 shots and averaged 20 points a game. And those figures become even more impressive when you consider that the Clark County regulars sat out an unusual amount of nearly every game. 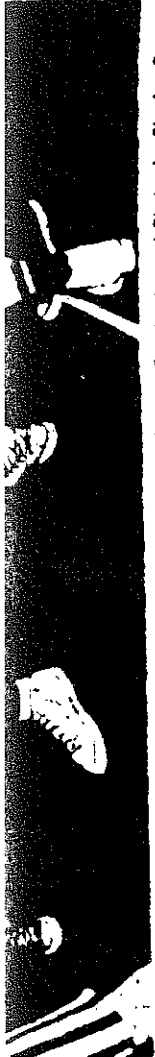

With the opening-day preliminaries over, here's the Louisville Invitational Tournament in a nutshell:

Today's power-packed quarter-finals will find host Male tangling with No. 9-ranked Earlington at 3 p.m. and No. 1 Davies County meeting No. 4 Central at 4:30. In tonight's games, No. 18 Manual will play No. 23 Russell County at 7:30 and No. 3 Lexington Dunbar will go against No. 5 St. Xavier at 9:15.

It was a short L.I.T. for Flaget, Ahrens, Atherton and Shawnee. They fell victims to visiting teams yesterday.

Davies County mowed down Flaget 86-56, Earlington whipped Ahrens 73-40, Russell County out-lasted pesky Atherton 67-60, and Dunbar ousted Shawnee 53-46.

Davies County, making Dr. Litkenhous look good, was clearly the class of the first round. A big, good-shooting club, the Panthers won with ease over a better than average Flaget.

But, good as the Panthers were, they had to share the spotlight with the two All-Staters in the tourney, Russell County's 6-7 Ralph Richardson and Earlington's 8-8 Harry Todd.

Richardson joined some exclusive company with a 38-point performance, tying him with Berea's Don Mills and Central City's Corky Withrow for the most points ever scored in an

L.I.T. game. Mills and Withrow set the record in 1955. Todd also had a good day, pitching in 34.

DUNBAR 53-46—The Lexington club had one of its worst shooting games and it's a good thing for Shawnee that it did. For the Indians, too, were far below par. Even so, they made a run at Dunbar in the last quarter, getting within nine points midway of the period

before closing the gap to the final margin.

A frigid second quarter that saw Jerry Keiffner's Indians make only one field goal—and that a "gift" when a Dunbar player was charged with jumping above the basket while a Shawnee shot, one that was 'short, was in the air.

The Indians didn't score during the first six minutes and 15 seconds of the quarter. Dunbar, meanwhile, pitched in 12 to go on top 25-9. S. T. Roach's Bear-

Davies County erased an early Flaget edge and sputtered late in the opening period to take a 21-9 lead and was never headed. In the last four minutes of the first quarter, Wells scored eight of the Panthers' 13 points.

Noonan, who entered the game as Louisville's highest scorer, got only 14 yesterday. Gary Steiger, Mickey Clark and Norman Gruneisen each tallied 10.

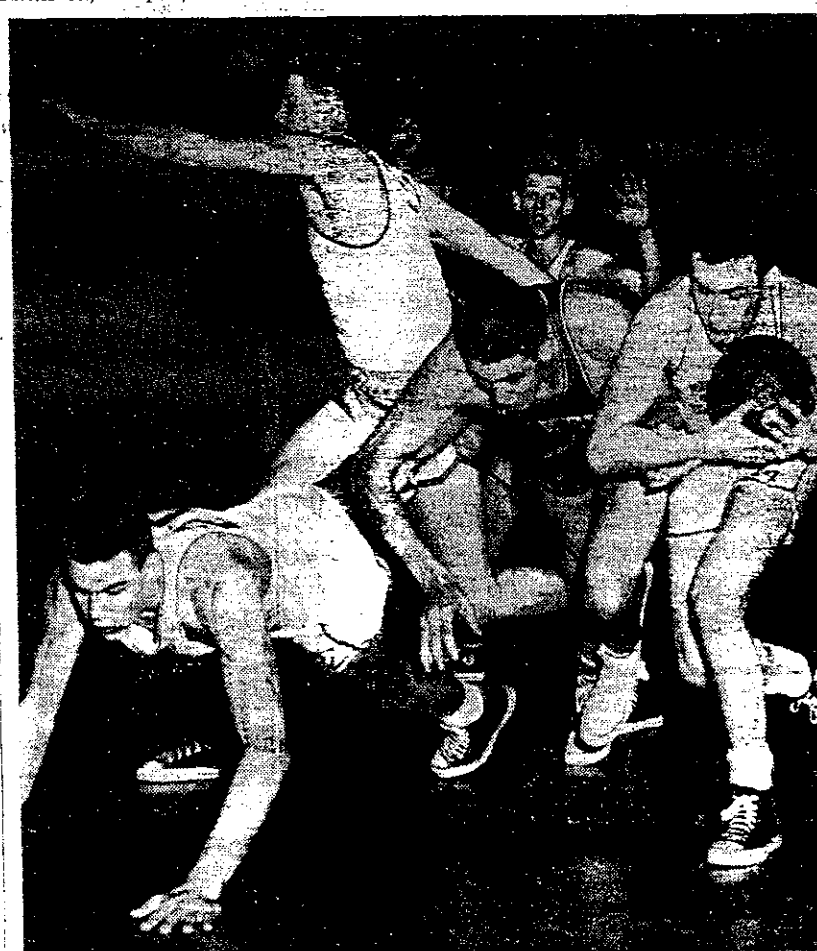

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is Gain Semis 1st Time; Male, Manual vs. St. X.

It's a tough league this season, this Louisville league.

For the first time in history, four City teams have fought their way into the semi-finals of the talent-loaded Louisville Invitational Tournament at Male High gym.

The conquerors are Central, Male, Manual and St. Xavier.

At 11:30 this morning, defending champion Central will face Male, the "ugly duckling" of the quarter-finals—the Bulldogs were the only quarter-finalist not ranked among the top 25 in the state. Then, at 1 p.m., St. Xavier will battle Manual. The winners will clash at 8 tonight for the title.

"Sophomore Day" was observed during yesterday's session, Central's Larry Holt and Male's Everett Stallworth starring.

Torrid shooting, No. 4 rated Central, which seems to reach the heights in the L.I.T., made the biggest splash when the Yellowjackets turned No. 1-ranked Daviess County every way but loose en route to an 81-58 victory. It was Daviess County's first loss in 17 games. Holt drilled home 13 of 20 shots and scored 29 points.

Male's young Purples, with Stallworth out-scoring 6-8 All-State Harry Todd, ousted No. 9 Earlinton 66-52.

In the night session, Russell County's magnificent Ralph Richardson, also an All-State, broke the L.I.T. single-game scoring record when he piled up 40 points, but Manual's big Crimsonson won out 72-67. In the night-cap, a smooth St. Xavier team, ranked No. 3, eliminated No. 3 Lexington Dunbar 57-50. Capacity crowds of 2,800 saw both sessions.

The 6-7 Richardson Thursday night tied Corky Withrow and Don Mills for the L.I.T. record with 38 points. Withrow, from Central City, and Mills, from Berea, set the record in 1955.

Tonight will mark only the fourth time in the 11-year history of the tourney that City teams have wound up in the championship game. Male and Flaget made it in '50 and '53 (Male won both times) and Central whipped Manual last year.

MALE 66-52 — Guy Strong's well-prepared Bulldogs got a death grip on Earlinton early and never let go. Using a half-court press early in the game and then a zone designed to stop Todd, Male outplayed the Yellowjackets all the way.

CENTRAL 81-58 — Making a determined bid for the state's No. 1 ranking, W. L. Kean's Yellowjackets hit 50 per cent of their shots, 35 of 70. Under that sort of barrage, Daviess County never had a chance. Central led at the quarter stops 19-13, 45-33 and 62-41.

MANUAL 72-67 — The victory was Manual's, but it was Richardson, a hard-working jumping-jack, who commanded the spotlight. It'll be a long time before L.I.T. fans forget him. Russell County's strategy was

simple—the Lakers threw the ball to Richardson under the basket and he usually scored or was fouled.

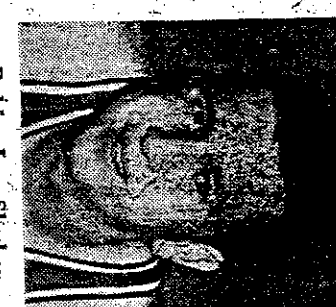

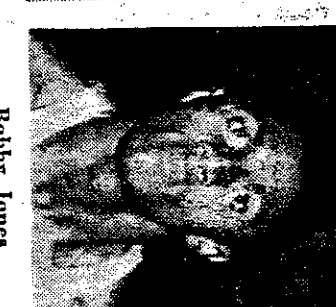

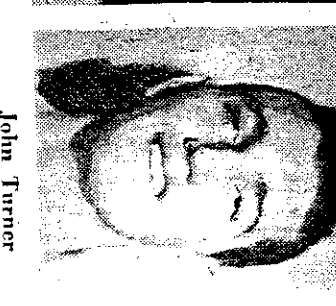

People Are Overjoyed At Region Win And State Trip

South Hopkins Is Drawn

Madri Gras atmosphere continued to hover over basketball loving fans in Russell County, even as late this week as Wednesday afternoon.

But ask any Russell Countian and he'll tell you why all the celebrating—of course, he'll reply, "It's only natural... the boys won the Regional Tournament... we're going to the State."

BY THE BOYS, as any typical local man will verify, are the Lakers of Russell County High. The tournament they won, which everybody around here already knows all about, was the 12th Region at Somerset last Saturday night where they emerged victorious over a fighting team from Junction City 68 to 62. And by going to the State is meant they are numbered among the "Sweet Sixteen"—16 Regional winners—and will vie with them in the

State Tournament at Louisville, which began Wednesday night. The Lakers' first game is Thursday morning, at 10:45, against a formidable opponent known as South Hopkins and, from the looks of things to date, at least two-thirds of the county will be in attendance at that game.

Saturday night's tug-of-war for the championship of the 12th at Somerset had all the earmarks of a Frank Merriwell or Ozark like story—for after trailing most of the way, and behind even 10 points early in the fourth quarter, the Lakers snatched the game from the fire with an almost Superman effort.

THE JUNCTION CITY crew was hot, and appeared like a new souped-up engine in the game's very beginning, as they swept through the first quarter like the wind to wind-up on the long end of the score 20 to 15.

Russell fans sighed, but felt confident, as the young giants lined-up for the second round of the battle. As the leave-no-commenced, it was at once evident that the Junction City boys were not nearly out of gas—for they

continued to pump in baskets from all over the court, and the Russell fans' sighing-ease had now turned to alarm. The half ended with the opponents ahead six points—36-30.

Puzzled local fans milled in corridors at half-time, and there was one question on the lips of everyone, concerning their favored Lakers:

"What's wrong?"

But there were no ready answers, other than the fact that several players had been ailing. Still there was hope.

BUT THIS SLIM measure of optimism completely vanished among the most ardent when Junction City continued its Goliath-like swath of point-gathering into the third quarter, and went 10 in the lead on more than one occasion.

The Lakers were now certainly the underdogs, and they looked it. But somehow they managed to scrape themselves together and cut the lead to four as the quarter ended 48-44.

A few hopefuls still held to the theory, "they'll come out of it, yet," even when Junction City commenced another onslaught of point-making in the fourth. The lead again climbed to ten. But one of the players who had literally been smothering Russell County's high scorer, big 6-6 Richardson, fouled out.

Now it was time for the Lakers to make their move. Time was

called. Instructions were given and plans laid.

THEY GOT the ball. Richardson was under the goal. Roy tossed the ball—ante-over it went to the big center, Richardson. He clutch-ed it—then dropped it in easily. The crowd went wild.

Junction City threw the ball in, but lost it within seconds to the crazed Russell Countians. There was another ante-over to Richardson again—once more he dropped it in the basket. Miraculously, his teammates retrieved the ball. The big boy fixed himself. Ante-over, and he tipped it in a third time—and then a fourth! Someone fouled him. Russell County tied the score! Now they forged ahead two points. The entire Somerset gymnasium was in complete bedlam.

WITH THE LAST minute seeming like an eternity, the Lakers added to their first lead of the game by six more points, and at the end the scoreboard read 68-62 in their favor.

Richardson collected 37 points; Polston 12; Roy 9; Stephens 6; and Skaggs 4. To win the crown advancement was made in this manner: over Lily 56 to 54; over Eubank 42-39, and the final.

Dixie Heights 58, Nicholas Co. 55

One of the best Northern Kentucky teams in years, Coach Lew Phillips' Dixie Heights Colonels, came through with a breath-taking rally in the last three minutes to edge the Blue Jackets, who seem to play their best when Ned Jennings is having his troubles with fouls.

The only points that separated the teams at halftime came when Jennings, biggest player in the tourney, was called for foul-tending on a last second, behind-the-midstripe fling by Bob Eveleth. That made it Dixie Heights, 28-26 and the Colonels entered the last quarter with a lead of 2-0. 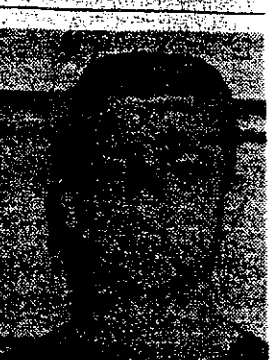

BOBBY RASCOE—Here's a boy who is considered the finest forward prospect in all of Kentucky. Honored on the State Tournament all-tourney team for the past two seasons, Rascoe moves up to the first All-State team after being a second-stringer last season. Coached by Buck Sydnor, Ras-

coe is 6-3 and weighs 180. He averaged 22 points a game and, along with 6-8 center Don Crosley, led the Panthers to the Littleton Ratings' lead through most of the season and to the runner-up spot in the State Tournament. Rascoe and Crosley are being sought by several schools and it's a good bet that they'll both attend the same college. Kentucky and Western seem to be the leading contenders, with U.K. having an advantage.

PAUL SMITH—A ruggedly constructed boy, Smith stands 6-4 and weighs 190 and, for his size, is perhaps the best rebounder on the team. He snared 274 offensive rebounds, a really impressive number, and 351 defensive rebounds. Letcher Norton, his coach, says he is the best rebounder he has coached. He and the basket aren't strangers, either, since he connected on 306 out of 659 shots and averaged 20 points a game. And those figures become even more impressive when you consider that the Clark County regulars sat out an unusual amount of nearly every game. College scouts say his only weakness is his lack of speed, but Norton says Smith is deceptive and that he moves well and is faster than he looks. Smith hasn't made up his mind where he will go to school, but it probably will be the same place as teammate Joe Farris, a standout defensive player.
