Dear Nominations Committee:

I would like to recommend Mr. Don Ringstaff for induction into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. His contributions as both a player and coach make him an excellent candidate. Even though I am too young to have watched him personally, the stories of what a great basketball player he was are well documented. I am confident he should be inducted on these credentials alone. However, his role in high school athletics certainly did not end when his playing days were over.

Like Mr. Ringstaff, I am also a lifetime resident of Livingston County. I have known him since I was a student in his health class at Livingston Central in 1976-77. Starting at that time, I began to follow Mr. Ringstaff's coaching career. He had many great teams at Livingston Central, including a period when Livingston won the Fifth District Tournament for four straight years. His 1977-78 squad, perhaps his greatest team, made it to the regional finals before losing in the final minutes to heavily favored Christian County. Even though we are a small Class "A" school, Mr. Ringstaff's teams were always very competitive with larger schools. Before retiring in 1986, he won over 300 games and made 10 trips to the Second Region Tournament. When you consider his playing and coaching career, I do not believe you could find a more deserving candidate than Mr. Ringstaff.

A final reason for your consideration of Mr. Ringstaff that makes him even more qualified for Hall of Fame selection is his teaching career. I realize this is not an official criterion for selection, but it can not be overlooked. He is in his thirty-fourth year of teaching at Livingston Central High School. He has been a very strong, positive role-model for thousands of teen-agers over the years. Not only his players but also his students have always looked up to him with the utmost respect. His fairness, honesty, sportsmanship, and high moral character are what should make him a certain candidate for Hall of Fame selection. Mr. Ringstaff, as a player, coach, and teacher, has always exemplified what high school athletics should be about. It is with great pride and respect that I recommend him for the KHSAA Hall of Fame.

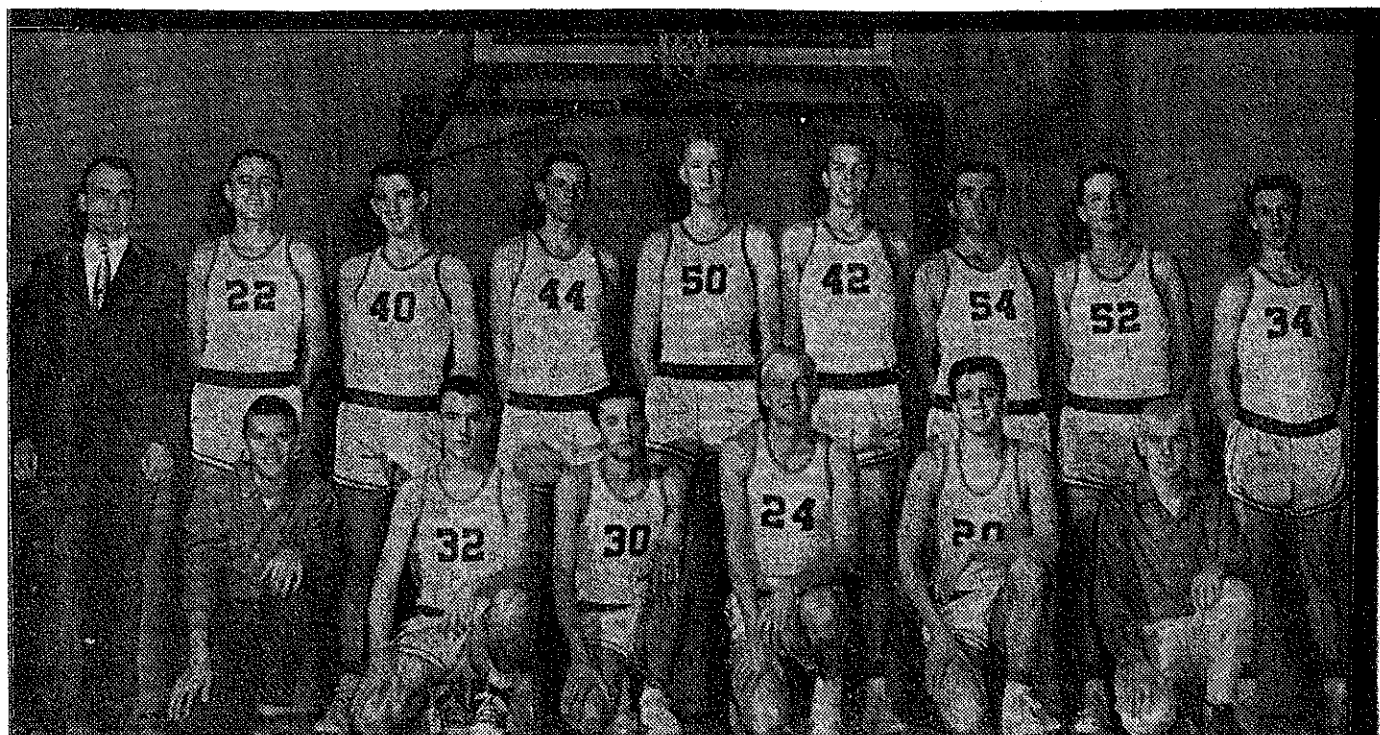

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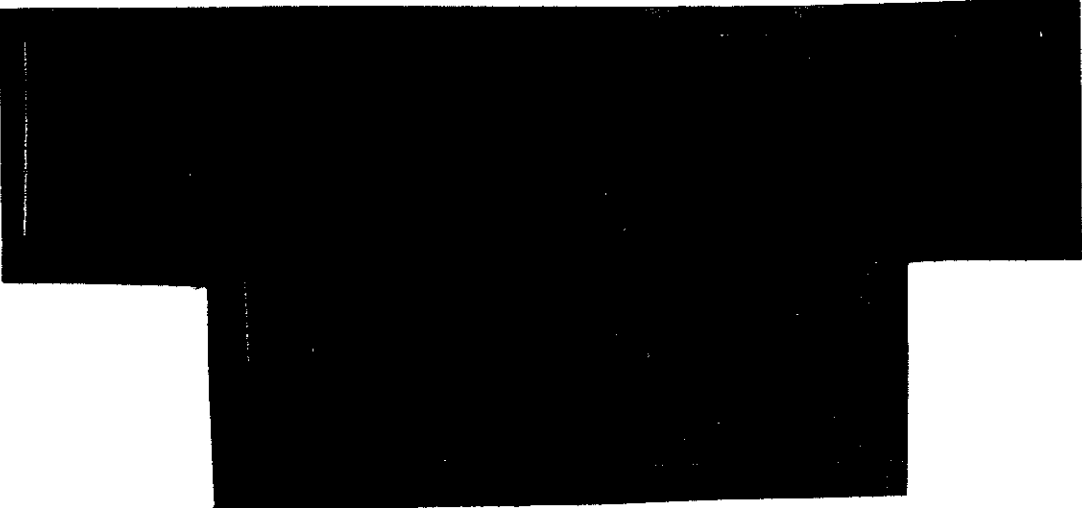

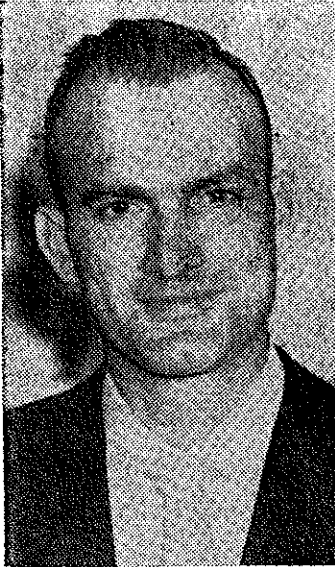

In the second half Don Ringstaff took over the offensive limelight for Livingston, scoring 13 of his total of 17 in the last two quarters.

Brasher Rebound Star

Center Charlie Brasher scored only seven points, but turned in a fine game under the boards.

His main opposition in the rebound department came from Crofton's Jack Ladd, sophomore forward, who also was high-point man for his team with 15 points. James "Tooter" Wilson was second high for Crofton with 14 points.

Livingston gradually took control of the game in the second half. Although the game stayed close, Crofton never got the lead in the second half. They tied it on three occasions in the third quarter, but the score was never tied in the fourth period.

Ringstaff, Cooper and Lee Jones all were named to the All-Tournament team from the Livingston team. Crofton landed Ladd, James Sugg and James Wilson on the star team.

Others on the All-Tournament team were: Ronald Bowman, Rosenwald; Amplies Slaton, Rosenwald; Mike Ridley, Dawson Springs; Dorris Herndon, Hopkinsville; Billy Seibert, Dawson Springs; and David Holt, Hopkinsville.

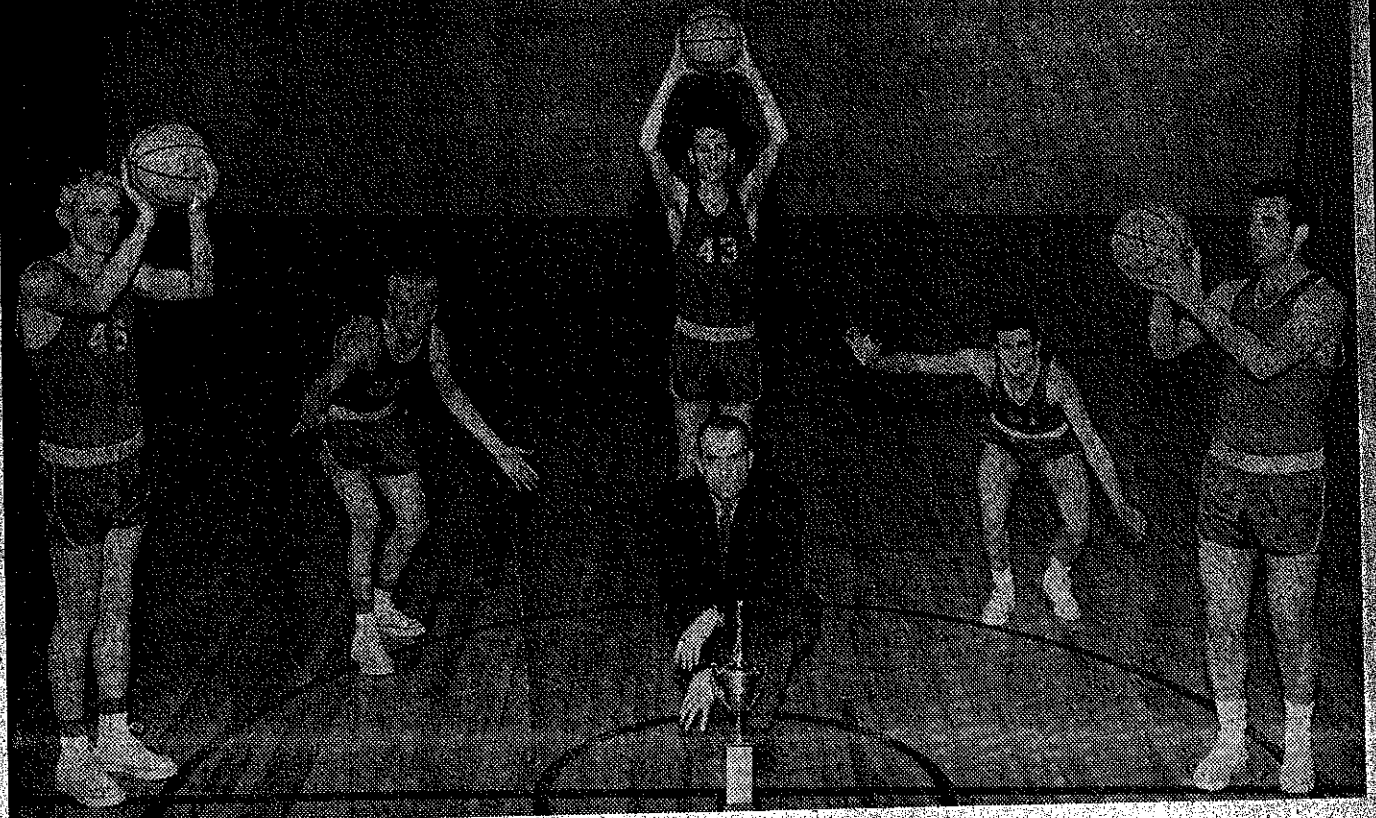

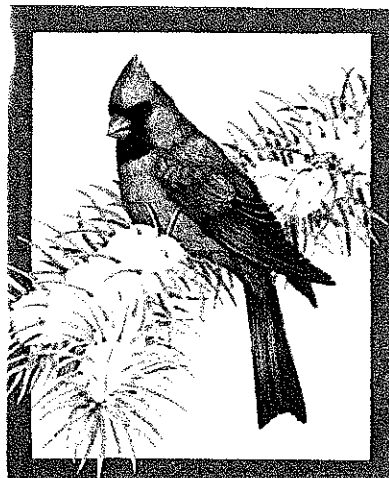

Livingston Central, paced by high-scoring Don Ringstaff, hopes to continue its spectacular tournament play against Olive Hill in the opening round of the State High School Basketball Tournament at Lexington.

The Cardinals play the powerful 16th Region champion in the second game on the Thursday morning session. The game is set for 10:45 a. m. (Lexington time).

Ringstaff, along with Pat Cooper and Lee Jones, were named to the All-Regional team last week.

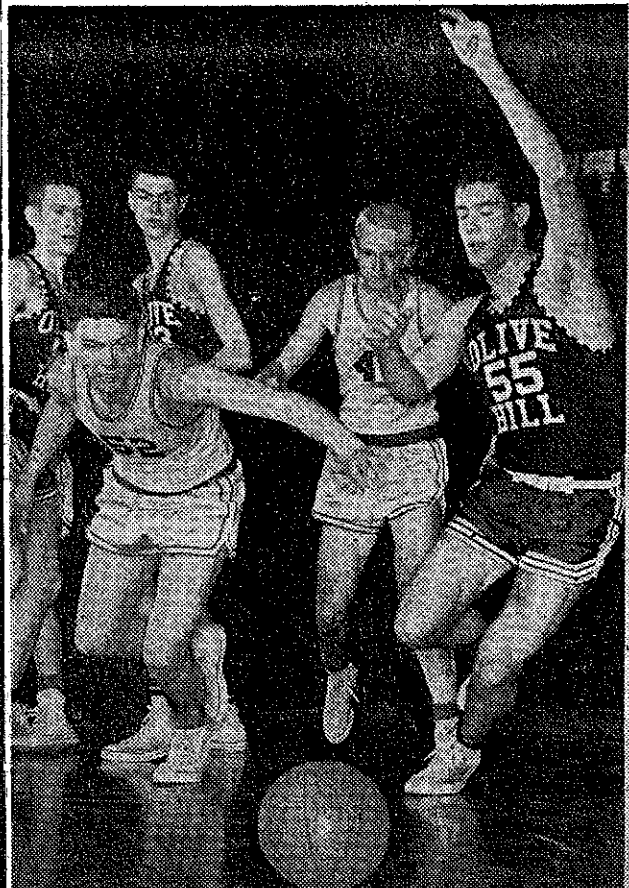

LEXINGTON, Ky., March 19—Don Ringstaff and his Livingston Central mates turned in the most surprising performance of the first round action in the State High School Basketball Tournament.

The Cardinals were given little chance of threatening the 16th Region power. But the Redbirds played a good alert game that could easily have resulted in a victory had Olive Hill faltered once from the field or foul line.

Olive Hill, although badly lacking on defense, has a good offensive team. The Comets hit an amazing total of 30 of 32 foul shots and finished the game with a highly-respectable 49 percent from the field.

Livingston, though, still stayed in the game for over three and one-half quarters.

The Cardinals just fought until they ran out of gas against the Big Olive Hill team.

Ringstaff turned in a crowd-pleasing performance that should have earned the 6-2 "blond" all-tournament honors.

Don did everything you could expect from a boy his size. He tipped, hit from the outside, and looked good driving. And besides this, he was uncanny from the foul line.

Little Freddie Moran, who had a big hand in getting the Cardinals to the big show, turned in a stand-out game as a substitute. He did a good job of penetrating the Olive Hill defense the first half and hit a couple of outside shots.

The game is probably the swan-song for Coach Frank Wright at Livingston. The personable Wright turned in his resignation before the district tournament opened, and has indicated he plans to go through with the resignation.

Wright has brought the Livingston school a long way in his six year stay at Central and its predecessor—Livingston County.

The consolidated school reached its sports pinnacle this year in making the long-sought trip to the state meet. And the team certainly turned in a fitting finale for the hard-working Wright.

● Skinner Elated At Ringstaff's Play

Western is also making a big play for the sharpshooting youngster. The Bowling Green school escorted him back to town after the game and is trying to lure him to the "hill."

Ringstaff, though, will probably go to Vandy. He had always wanted to go to the Nashville school and his brother, Jimmy, is attending Belmont College at Nashville.

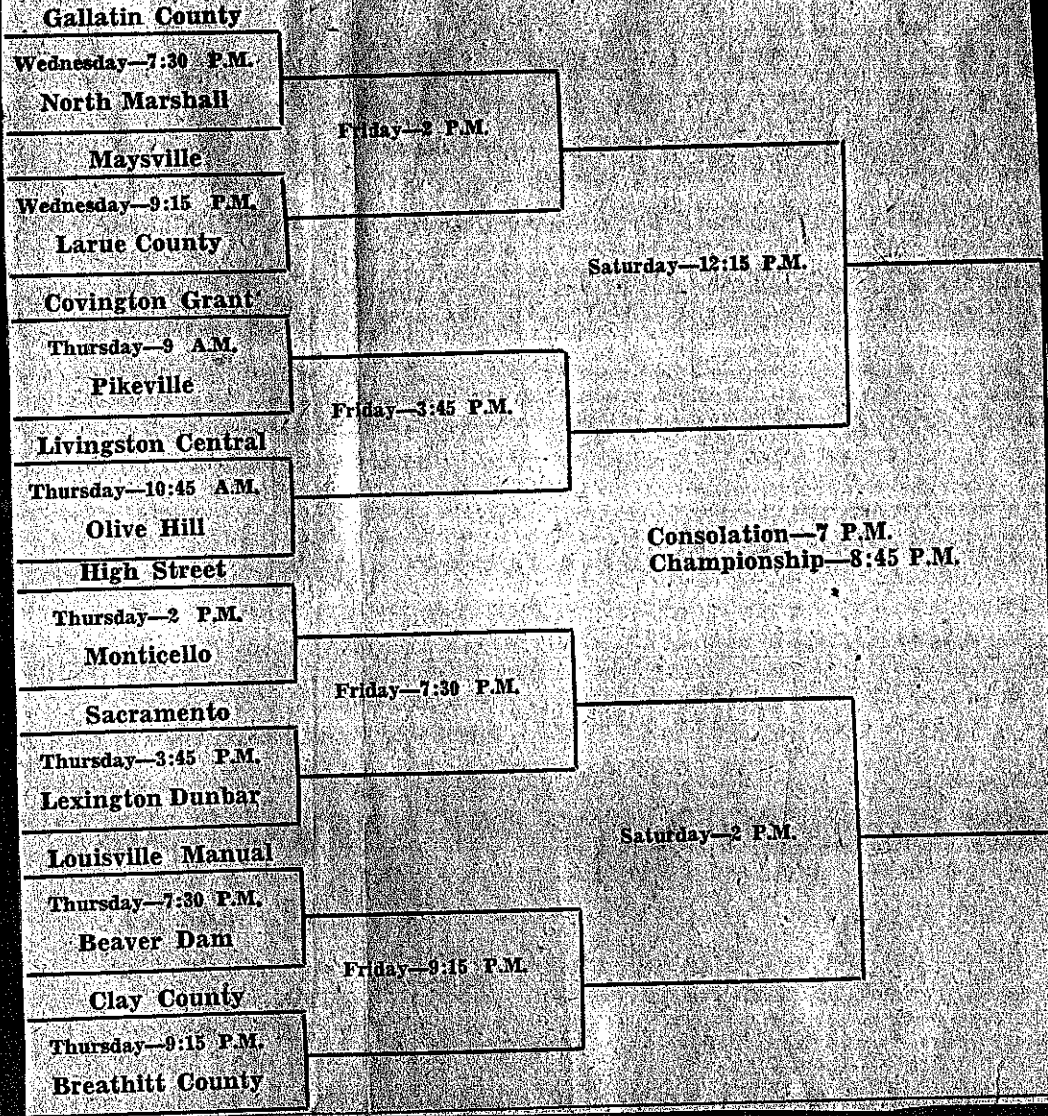

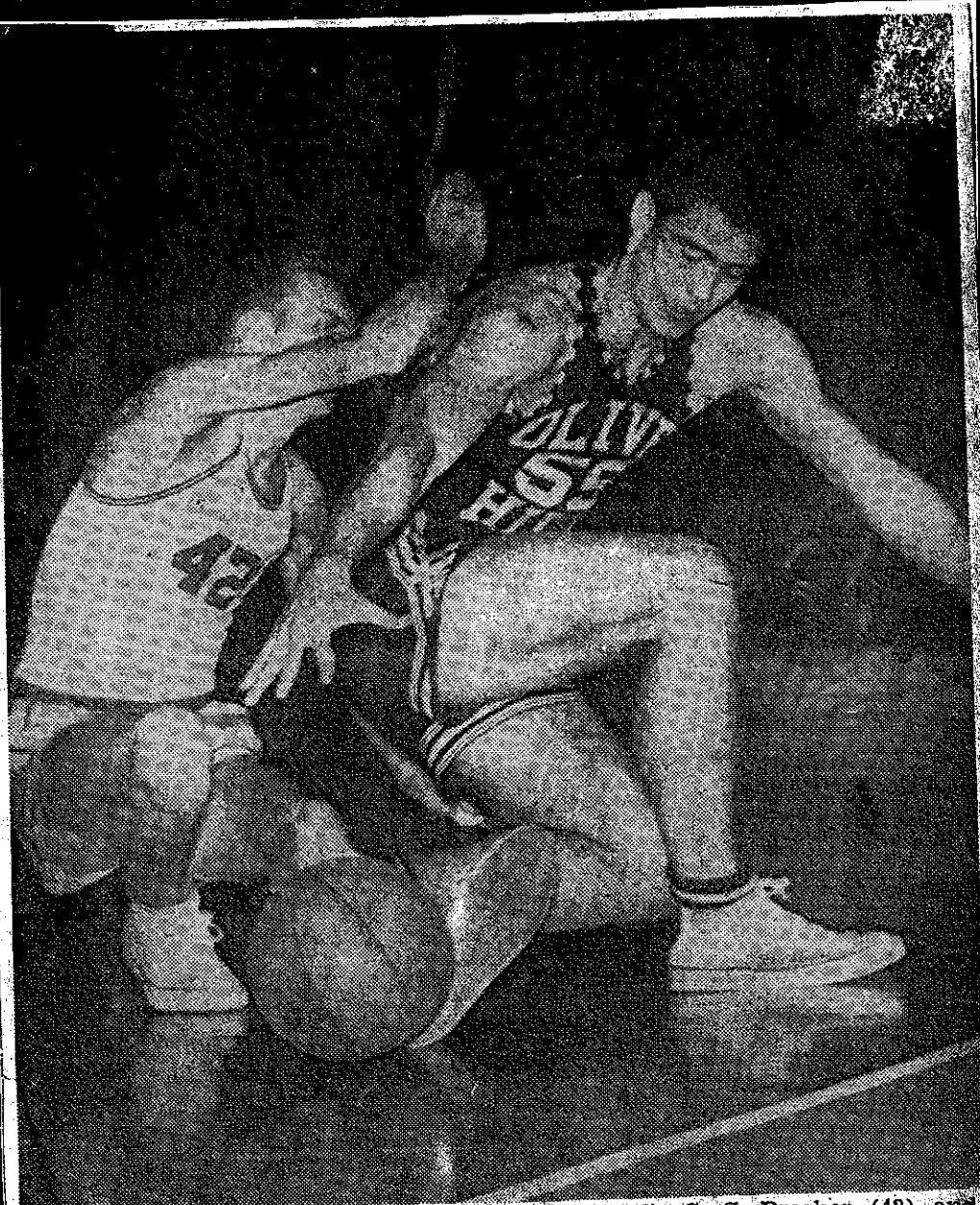

Big Don Ringstaff put on a tremendous scoring show here today, but stunned Olive Hill recovered its poise in time to scrape through to a 88-78 victory over Livingston Central.

Ringstaff pumped in 46 points in the biggest scoring splurge since Kelly Coleman 68 three years ago in a consolation game.

He scored 13 field goals and made good on 20 of 22 free throw attempts.

Trailed By One Point

At the end of each of the first three quarters, they trailed by only a single point.

Olive Hill Wins 88-78 To Advance

Ringsstaff Piles In 46 Points After Thacker Tallies 35

Fired by a 35-point performance by Tom (Big T) Thacker, Covington Grant captured an exciting morning game in the state high school tournament today, beating Pikeville 72-67.

Before the session was completed, Thacker's outburst was eclipsed by a 46-point explosion by Don Ringsstaff, but the barrage of the 6-3 Livingston Central gunner proved in vain since his team was beaten 68-78 by Olive Hill, a decision sending the Comets from Eastern Kentucky into Friday's round as the foe of Covington Grant.

Pikeville led throughout the first period and held a 16-13 advantage at the end of the quarter. The winners, however, spurred to a 17-16 lead before one minute

had elapsed in the second frame. With 5:48 left in the second stanza, the Warriors had increased their margin to 24-17 and had their offense clicking to perfection.

Pikeville was handicapped seriously when star forward Don Raffliff accumulated four fouls early in the first half. He picked up his fifth after only three minutes of the third quarter had been played.

The pairing produced the hardest-fought and roughest game of the tournament and Ed Roberts, Pikeville substitute, was knocked out during a wild scramble under the Grant basket in the fourth quarter.

Roberts had to leave the game and was unable to shoot the free throw he was awarded. Bob Weems took his place and cashed in on both tries in a one-and-one situation.

The losers closed the gap to three points on two occasions in the fourth period, but each time Thacker came through with clutch

baskets to seal Pikeville's doom.

Pikeville was paced in scoring by Bill Booth, who canned 26 points.

Underdog Livingston Central gave heavily favored Olive Hill a real fight, and the final 10-point margin doesn't begin to tell of the battle experienced by the Comets. They were held to one-point edges at each of the first three rest stops.

Ringsstaff, hitting from all angles, pitched in 13 field goals and meshed 20 out of 22 free-throw attempts.

His total was the highest posted in a state tourney game since Kelly Coleman set the record of 68 in 1956.

Although Livingston Central bowed out of the tourney, local fans can expect to see plenty more of Ringsstaff since he has signed for a Vanderbilt scholarship.

The Comets were not able to establish any working margin until 5:59 remained in the final quarter, when they owned a 67-61 edge.

An all-court press by the Cardinals gave them their final surge and cut the deficit to four at 71-67. Dale Barker led the Comets with 24, closely followed by Bert Green with 22.

Two repeaters from last year's tourney, Monticello and Bowling Green High Street, the latter a winner by one point when they met in Monticello during the regular season, were paired for the first afternoon game.

Top-ranked Lexington Dumbauld plays Sacramento, an unknown comer, in the second half of the contest, in his second half of the session.

The local Bearcats spanked Maude Memorial 67-66 in the first round a year ago, then was eliminated 42-27 by St. Xavier at the hands of the Tigers from Louisville, which swept through the rounds to claim the crown, capturing the trophy, led by 40 points of margin.

North Marshall, entering the meet with a 19-11 record, will play a 14-point victory over Gallatin County in the opening game of the contest. The Bears will play St. Xavier on Wednesday night, while the Comets play to win an early game against North Marshall in the

rest of the quarterfinal encounters Friday afternoon.

The swift Jets of North Marshall had their foe outmanned in every respect and made it evident from the first minutes of their tilt, winning a lot of respect for the first Region entry as a title contender.

Jimmy Lampley, brother of Coach Charley Lampley and Pat Doyle led the assault, the former netting 27 points and Doyle getting 22.

The Jets, ahead 49-31 at half-time, did poorly at the free-throw line, missing 12 times in 32 chances. Coach Charley Sutherland's Gallatin gang cashed 17 of 20.

Maysville broke fast and grabbed a 20-7 lead in the first period, but Larne County, appearing upset by the pressing defense

of the Bulldogs, finally got organized for the scrap and outscored the winners by two points through the last three quarters.

Hard-working Jimmy Calvert hit his season's high figure by labbing 22 points to lead Coach Woody Crum's hustling Bulldogs. Al Bane and Bob Alexander added 18 each.

Tourney fans were surprised to see Crum sitting quietly and making no substitutions as fouls piled up against some of his team's mainstays, a total of 27 personals being whistled against the bench-strong Maysville crew.

Roy Gilbert fouled out before the first half ended and Bane and Herman Smith, the latter Gilbert's replacement, were banished before the third period was over.

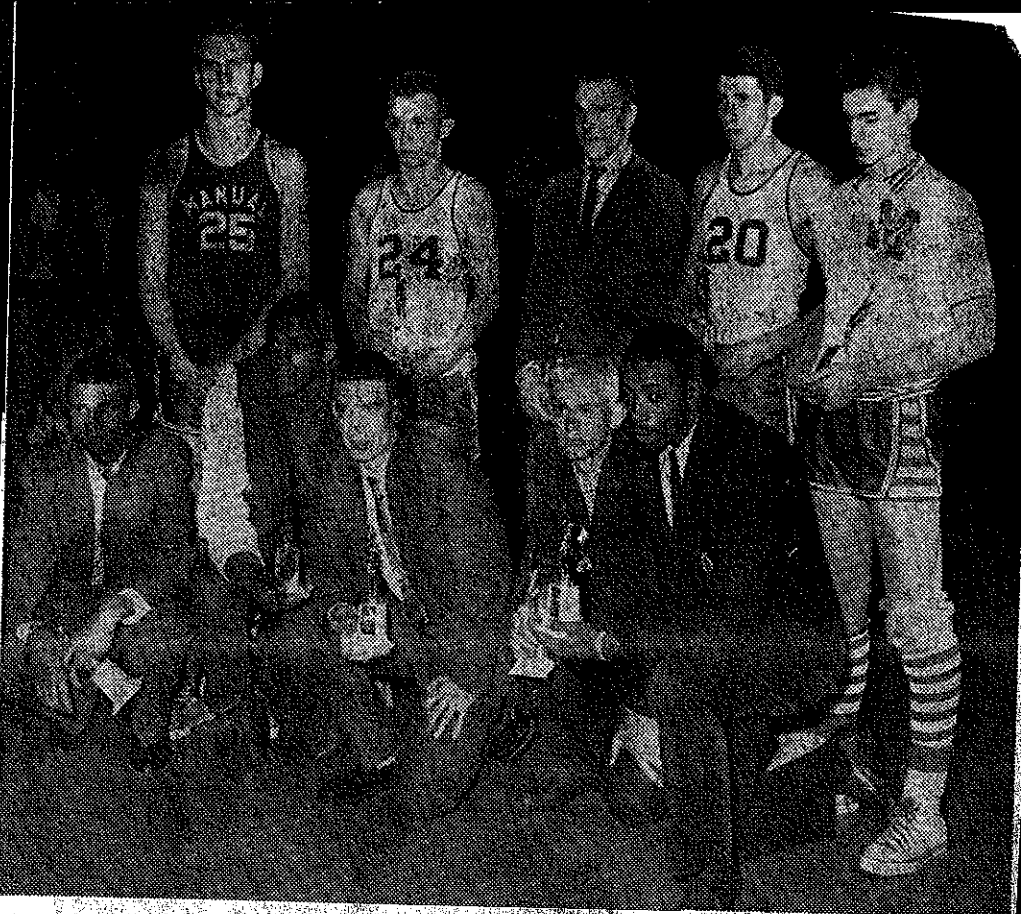

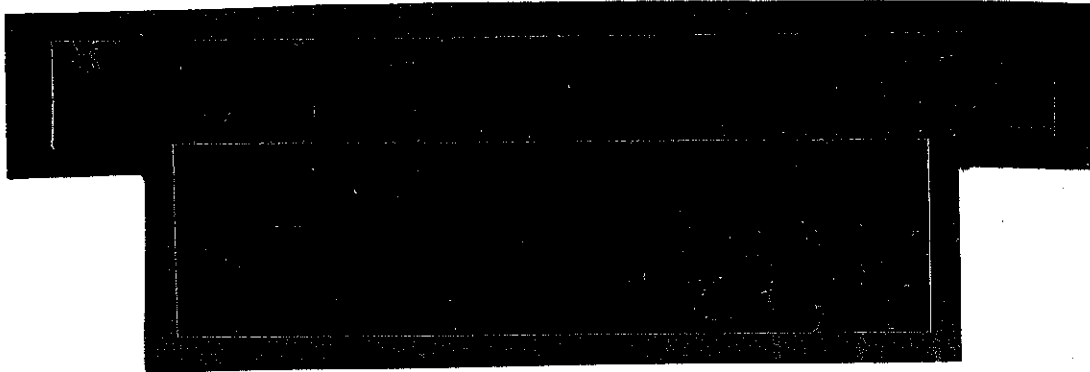
