Craynor Slone is a 1954 graduate of Wayland High School and a 1961 graduate of Morehead State University. Slone coached high school basketball for 32 years with over 500 wins. Slone's coaching tenure included jobs at St. Catherine High School, Trimble County, Henry County, Caldwell County, Carlisle County, Ashland, Betsy Layne and Fort Knox. His teams were noted for their offensive efficiency and man-to-man defense. Fifteen of his former players became head coaches in high school basketball. Slone worked for 30 years in Don Lane's Transylvania Basketball Camp as an instructor and supervisor.

His 1982 Carlisle County Team won the first Class "A" Tournament before that tournament became a state wide tournament. Slone's 1983 Carlisle County Team was state runner-up, losing 35 to 33 in 3 overtimes to Lexington Henry Clay. Carlisle County was the crowd favorite and that state championship game is still considered as one of the greatest state tournament final games of all time.

Slone's 1983 Carlisle County Team won 40 and lost 4. They were ranked number 26 in the nation and were 19-0 in the regular season and 19-4 in tournament play. Slone is a two-time Paducah Sun coach of the year. He was the Courier-Journal and Lexington Herald coach of the year in 1983. He coached the Kentucky All Stars to a sweep over the Indiana All Stars in 1984. He was named one of the top coaches of the 1980's. Slone was named to the KABC Court of Honor in 2006.

It is my pleasure to nominate Craynor Slone to the Kentucky Basketball Hall of Fame for 2004.

Coach Slone has been a personal friend of mine for the last 26 years. He came to Carlisle County in 1978 as the new Basketball coach. At the end of his fifth year at the Comet helm, he had masterminded the Comet drive to the finals of the Kentucky High School Basketball Tournament. The 35 – 33 loss in three overtimes, to Lexington's Henry Clay basketball team was a tragic loss for the Cinderella team. Which made the 1983 state championship game go down in sports history as one of the most classic games in Kentucky.

Notable records of this five years were 136 wins with only 37 losses for a 78.6 winning percentage.

The 40-4 record of the 82-83 year will stand as a basketball record for all times as rules were changed and teams cannot play that many games in one year.

Coach Slone received the 1983 First Region Coach of the Year Award, the Courier-Journal Coach of the Year Award and the Lexington Herald-Leader's State Coach of the Year trophy he received all 39 votes for this award. Keith York and Phillip Hall of the 1983 basketball squad were selected for the All-Tournament team and the Ted Sanford Award.

Coach Slone's coaching technique was always 'defense'. He was a master of this plan and his teams lost few games when these manuevers were followed. His methods of

coaching taught the young men to relay on each other to know where the basketball is at all times and watch each other for the open shots.

Coach Slone left the Comets at the end of the 1983 season. He returned to the Comet program for the 1988 – 1989 season and stayed until the 1991 season.

While defense and slowed down basketball is not what most fans like to see, but the Slone defense system, as it was often called was something to watch. In teaching these young men to believe in and rely on each other, he was also teaching the lessons of life. You have to believe in yourself and you have to rely on others many times of your life. Coach Slone's teams relied on a leader's knowledge of the game and leadership in perfecting a system that really does work, bonding with fellow teammates, for the good of all and seeing a plan work from beginning to end.

I watched from the side lines as one man took twelve individuals, cemented these together and dictated the outcome of the game. As Slone orchestrated the next play and then a small smile began as the play near completion then the ball go thru the goal, the crowd goes wild and you know you are watching a great coach.

As I watch Coach Slone direct these young players getting them to rely on each other, teaching them life's lessons. I thank God for men like Coach Slone who not only knows basketball, but he supports young people in their endeavors and encourages them to seek to be the best they can be.

Coach Slone took a small school team to the top of the mountain and did not just leave them there. He instilled pride in a whole rural county, the First Region and all parts of the great state of Kentucky as they showed all what playing with all HEART means.

Again for his style and confidence and his love of the game, I support Craynor Slone for the Kentucky Basketball Hall of Fame.
