Smith Keys for the Big And Hazel Green

There are times when G. J. Smith "just doesn't want to play basketball," complains Hazel Green High coach Raymond Reed.

"He's a typical sophomore," Reed said. "He just can't get himself mentally prepared for the easy games."

However (and this is the part that has carned Smith a starting job on Hazel Green's 19-3 team), there are other times when the slender 6-foot-4 sophomore performs like a seasoned veteran.

"He hasn't started the entire year," Reed said. "But he does such a fine job against the real good clubs, I have to play him."

Friday night Smith threw in 15 points (five above his season average) and

played a key defensive role in Hazel Green's 81-57 upset of Danville.

"Smith has real long arms, and he knows how to use them," Reed stated. "He got up to Roy (Danville's Jimmy Dale Roy) and flapped those arms all around him. Roy just couldn't get off his shots."

Roy is Danville's leading point-getter with a 21.4 mark. However, Smith limited the Danville ace to only four points on two first-half field goals.

"Smith's going to be a good one," said Danville coach David (Stick) Cottrell. "He broke our backs with his outside shooting. And he does a good job on the boards, too."

Smith's success at the 12th Region school runs in the family.

Smith's father, Charles, was a regular

center on Hazel Green's 1940 state | champions. Two years later the clder Smith guided Hazel Green to the state tourney's semifinals and was named to the tourney's 10-man all-tournament

"His daddy was quite a player," Reed said. "I guess it runs in the family."

Farris Sets the Pace

Still, the key to Hazel Green's remarkable squad is senior Glenn Farris.

A 6-3 center, Farris is scoring at an 18-point clip and pulling down 15 rebounds per game.

"He's the most matured player on the team," Reed said, "and he's one of the best shooters in the region."

In Hazel Green's victory over Danville, Farris had 24 points and grabbed 20 rebounds.

"Farris is an excellent shooter," Cottrell chipped in. "We just didn't have anyone who could handle him."

Charles Broughton (15 points a game), Bill Dotson (10) and Glenn Maxey (10) round out Hazel Green's starting five. Broughton is a senior, Dotson a junior and Maxey a sophomore. All are 6 feet 2.
"Broughton helps out on the boards,"

Reed said. "He's getting about 15 rebounds a game."

G. J. Smith Follows In Dad's Footsteps

- G. J. Smith's father played on the first —and only—State Tournament championship team Hazel Green High School ever had.
- G. J. Smith hopes he's on the last. Today, Hazel Green and Smith are one year nearer their goal. Last night, as G. J. scored 30 points and collected 16 rebounds, Hazel Green defeated Paris 57.46 in the next-to-last first round State Tournament game at Freedom

"He sure did all right," said Charles Smith, G. J.'s dad. "Real fine for a 16year-old boy."

G. J. Smith (the initials stand for George John) is a junior, but its his last year at Hazel Green. It's the school's last year. Next year Hazel Green will be consolidated with Bush, Lily and London into the new Laurel County High.

Won First . . . and Last

Charles Smith, a tall (6 feet, 5 inches), gray-haired cattle farmer in Laurel County, played in the first game when Hazel Green dedicated its gym in 1938.

"We won that game," Smith recalled last night. "We beat Covington Holmes."

G. J. Smith played in the last game at Hazel Green's gym.

"They won, too," his father said.

"They beat Clay County." In 1940, when Hazel Green defeated Hindman 42-39 for the state championship in Lexington, Charles Smith was a sophomore.

"There were about 4,000 people at the game," he said. "People followed basketball real well, even back then.'

G. J. got an early start at the game. "He put a shoebox up in his room and used to shoot paper wads at it when he was real little," the elder Smith said.

"I could dunk it when I was six," G. J. said with a smile.

"Later, we put a goal up outside," Charles Smith said. "It got a good workout."

Charlie Jean, G. J.'s older sister who is a senior physical-education major at Eastern Kentucky University, usually provided G. J.'s opposition.

"She's not real good," G. J. said, "but she's a girl.'

Charlie Jean was there last night. So was Mrs. Smith. They gave G. J. his personal front-row cheering section.

Mr. Smith sat by himself, high up in Section 207.

"I get real nervous before a game," he said. "But G. J. doesn't. I think they're going to do all right."

At Hazel Green, baskethall is important. "It's the only thing," is the way G. J. puts it.

"You drive around," Mr. Smith said, "and you see little boys out shooting at a goal and little girls standing around their cheerleader outfits. Green's always been a basketball school."

Presently, Hazel Green has an enrollment of 600 students. None were in school yesterday.

School Closed-and Farm, Too

"School's closed until next Monday," said Mrs. Smith, who teaches the eighth grade there.

So's the farm.
"All I had to do was hire a man to feed my cattle for me," Mr. Smith said.

Now it's up to G. J.

"I'm the only one off that 1940 team with a relative on this one," Mr. Smith said. "It sure would be nice to have a Smith on another state championship team here."

G. J. has that same idea.


Bullfrogs Beat Paris 57-46 In First Round But Lose To PRP 55-52 In Quarter Finals

G. J. Smith Named To All-Tournament Team In Louisville Sat.

Hazel Green's Bullfrogs defeated Paris 57-46 last Thursday night in the opening round of the state high school basketball tournament at Louisville's Freedom Hall but had their dreams of a championship spoiled the next night as Pleasure Ridge Park edged the local team 55-52 in a real thriller. Coach Raymond Reed's squad made a fine showing in its two games and had little trouble with the 10th region champion Greyhounds after the half but could not hit from the outside against the strong PRP Panther's zone on Friday night and went down to only their second defeat after 30 victories during the regular season and tournament action.

Male High of Louisville nipped Richmond Madison in the finals Saturday night by a single point as the Purples from the 11th region made a fine late comeback but fell short by that one point. Male had won over PRP in the semi-finals by 6 points while Madison bombed Trigg County in the other Saturday mid-day semi-final tilt. G. J. Smlth, Hazel Green's 6'6" junior centerforward was selected to the all-state tournament team along with 11 other players. The youngster scored 30 and 24 points in his two games and took off and 11 rebounds also but only Bradley Stines with 10 points against PRP was the only other Bullfrog in double figures for the two games.

Hazel Green had a bad shooting night in its losing game as it hit only 30% of Its field goals and had 38.6 against Paris but the Frogs did outrebound both opponents. Against the Panthers HG jumped off to a 7-0 lead and controlled the rame for three periods before going cold from the field. They were outscored 18-8 in the decisive quarter. In the Paris game the Greyhounds led at the half by a point but were never in the game to amount to anything after that as their 6'9" center, Bill Gaines, only a sophomore was in personal foul trouble most of the time and Smith was able to 'ake strong advantage of that.

Hazel Green 57 Paris 46

The Bullfrogs got off to a fair start against Paris as Smith tallied 10 of the first 16 points. It was 13-11 at the first period stop and HGHS stretched that lead to 16-11 before the Greyhounds came back behind the fine play of Robert Crumbie who led his team to a 27-26 halftime lead but Gaines had three personal fouls on him and had to sit out quite a bit.


Gaines drew his fourth foul early in the third period and Hazel Green went to work. Smith hit five straight points to build up a fair lend and the talented junior tallied 12 points in the third frame to lead the Frogs to a 42-38 lead after three quarters and he had 24 points then. They built the lead to 53-38 and had the game under control early in the last quarter as Paris fought hard but could not gain any ground.

Hazel Green hit for 22 field goals and 13 of 19 at the free throw line while Paris had 19 fielders and 8 of 16 foul shots and the Greyhounds committed two more personals, 15-13. Smith hit 12 of 22 from the field and 6 of 7 at the gratis line and he picked off a game high 13 rebounds, several of which he put back up for two pointers. Crumbic was most of Paris's offense scoring 23 points.

In 1970, Trey's father scored 30 points and grabbed 16 rebounds in a state tournament game against Paris. It was the last victory ever for the old Hazel Green High School. The next season, G.J. played — with a broken left foot - for the new Laurel County High in the Sweet 16.

A generation before that, in 1940, Trey's grandfather Charles was a sophomore center for Hazel Green's state championship

Charles was a "big, rawboned guy that loved to bang," said Raymond Reed, a retired principal who coached G.J. in

high school.

Charles became a farmer, raising tobacco and beef cattle. He died three years ago, at age 76. Trey doesn't know so much about his grandfather's playing days, but he can tell you about his father: "He played at UK from '72 to '75, and in '75 he went to the national championship game and they got beat by UCLA."

Reed adds to the tale: "I think G.J. was probably the last player that coach (Adolph) Rupp recruited to UK here."

Rupp had foot problems related to diabetes. G.J. had a broken foot. Reed recalled a visit to Memorial Coliseum in which the old coach and the young player compared infirmities.

"Coach Rupp had his shoe off and G.J. had his shoe off," Reed said. "Two of the ugliest feet I've


ever seen."

(Reed, incidentally, was coaching Hazel Green when a sportswriter asked one of his players, Glenn Farris, where Hazel Green actually was. "It's right across from Junior Farris's general store," came the reply. Reed is a little more helpful: "It's below East Bernstadt, about three or four miles.")

Trey Smith, who played 11 ½ minutes yesterday, finished with fouls and no points — on 0-for-5 hand as South Laurel chugged to Elizabethtown.

a 63-55 victory.



"That was the nicest moment for me, when we beat Indiana. They beat us by 20-something points earlier in the year. They were a lot of talented team, Smith said. "I just remember the trip back. We came back on a charter bus and every exit we went past, there were people lined up on the interstate.

"When we got back to Lexington and to Memorial Coliseum to have a pep rally there, there were about 10 or 11 thousand people there," he added. "It was a real special time because it showed how much interest people had in

Kentucky.'

After the Indiana win, the Wildcats managed to beat Syracuse

95-79 in the Final Four before losing to John Wooden's No.1 rated UCLA Bruins 92-85 in the finals. The game turned out to be Wooden's last as a coach.

"I was able to be a part of Adolph Rupp's last game and John Wooden's last game and that's something special."

Dreading going at first, Smith said he's glad he went to Rupp Arena

this past weekend.

"It was really nice, just really nice," he said. "I really enjoyed being there and being there brought back some old memories."

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Smith is a big part of Laurel Co. history

hen it comes to being involved in some the greatest moments in basketball history, go no further than Laurel County's own G.J. Smith.

Smith, along with his teammates from the 1974-75 University of Kentucky Wildcats Mens basketball team, was honored by the university Friday and Saturday and it was deservedly so.

If you know Smith, he's very quiet-natured and doesn't brag about anything he has been a part of, or accomplished, which is very rare of a any former athlete these days.

You would never know Smith's father, Charles, helped lead Hazel Green High School to a state championship in 1940.

You would never know that Smith made the All State Tournament team while playing for both Hazel Green and Laurel County High Schools.

You would never know that Smith helped guide both Hazel Green High School and Laurel County High School to 12th Region Championships.

You would never know that Smith was one of top high school

shooters around in the early '70s.

You would never know Smith was a member of University of Kentucky great Adolph Rupp's last recruiting class, which was named the 'Super Kittens'.

You would never know Smith participated on 1974-75 National Runner Up team, which barely lost to the UCLA Bruins, while ending No. 1 and unbeaten Indiana University's win streak at 34 games.



As per your request, I am forwarding additional information on the highs school basketball playing career of G. J. Smith for consideration by the Hall of Fame Screening Committee.

G. J. Smith holds a rare distinction in the state of Kentucky. He may be the only player to have been chosen to the All-State Tournament Team for two schools in back-to-back seasons. He led Hazel Green to its final state tournament appearance in 1969-70 and Laurel County High to its first "Sweet 16" birth in 1970-71. He was named to the All-Tournament team both times.

Besides being named to the Alf-Regional Tournament Team three times and Alf-District twice, he was a High School Alf-American in 1971 at Laurel County High School. He played on the 1971 Kentucky Alf-Star team.

G.J. was a Varsity basketball player for four years and a three-year starter during his high school career. He averaged 16 points per game as a sophomore and 18 points per game as a junior. His senior year, he averaged 22 pointer per game and he is the all-time career record holder for Scoring Average Per Game with a 19.8 points per game average. His high game of 38 points is second on the All Time Season Records at Laurel County High School. He also shot over 50% from the field every year of his career and most of his shots were long outside shots, even though the 3-point line had not even been thought about at that time. Additionally, G. J. Smith averaged over eight rebounds per game for his career totaling over 720 rebounds.
