Stout began his athletic career in the early fifties (1953-54) at the varsity level while attending Banneker School, an all black school and completed his high school career at Cynthiana High School in 1959. While attending Cynthiana he participated in the sports of baseball and basketball. It was his basketball talent that enabled him to further his education, attending college on a basketball scholarship. Stout was one of the few players to letter in the sport of basketball at the varsity level for seven years.

Stout's first honor in sports came to him while attending Banneker School during his eighth grade season when he was named to the All-Bluegrass Basketball Team made up of players who were upper classmen. He was also named to the All-District Team during his 8th & 9th grade years and was named to the All-Regional Team his freshman year. The only thing that probably kept this stellar player from being named to the All-State Team was because this team was made up of players who advanced to the State Tournament for post season play. (News Paper Articles regarding Black Athletes and their abilities were non existent in those days. Occasionally, special awards were given to athletes during season ending banquets).

In 1956-57, Louis enrolled at Cynthiana High School as one of the first athletes from Banneker (an all African American school) as a result of integration. During his career at CHS, Stout became one of the most outstanding high school basketball players in the school's history, if not the best ever. He led the Cynthiana Bulldogs to three straight District titles and one Regional Championship, as they advanced to the KHSAA State Tournament for the first time in school history. Stout was honored for his talent his sophomore year by being named to All-Conference, All-District, All-Regional and Third Team All-State Team. That year he led his team with a scoring average of 23.5 points per game and 17 rebounds per contest. His junior year was even better, as he led his team to the regional title and a trip to the state high school tournament. His scoring average increased to 25 points per game while his outstanding rebounding (20.0 per contest) was a primary reason for the Bulldogs success in 1958. He was once again named to the All-District, All-Regional and All-Conference Teams and earned a spot on the Second Team All-State Team, chosen by sports writers. During his senior year he scored in double figures in all twenty four games, averaging 30.9 points per game, 24 rebounds and led the state in scoring. His jersey (45) was retired at the end of the season, and he was named to First Team All-District, All-Regional, All-Conference Teams and First Team All State. He was nationally recognized, being named to the Dell Sports All-American High School Team. Stout played in three East/West All-Star games, The Pepsi Classic, and the famous Kentucky/Indiana All-Star basketball game. He received an athletic scholarship to Regis College in Denver, Colorado, where he enrolled in the fall of 1959 to begin his college career under Coach Joe B. Hall, who later was Head Coach at the University of Kentucky. While at Regis College, Stout led The Regis Rangers in scoring for four years and set several rebounding records. He was named to the Rocky Mountain Conference All-Tournament Team four times and was named MVP in two National Catholic Invitational Tournaments. He completed his four year career at Regis with impressive 15.9 points per-game and 14.8 rebounds per game averages. During his final two years at Regis College he was named to the Catholic Digest All-American team (Known then as the "Little All-Americans"). Stout has been honored for his athletic abilities by being inducted into the 10th Region High School Basketball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1989 and the Dawahares/Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame in 1999.

COACH

Stout began his coaching in 1965 as Assistant Boys' Basketball High School coach in Lexington, Kentucky at the highly recognized Paul L. Dunbar High School. He was later named head coach and remained in the position until consolidation in 1967. While at Dunbar, Stout's teams won two district tournament championships and finished runner-up in the Regional Tournament two consecutive years. In the two years prior to the school closing, his team compiled an impressive 47-15 record. Stout then served as an assistant coach at Tates Creek High School in 1966-67. Later, he was named head coach at Tates Creek and was purported to be the first African American in Kentucky to be a basketball coach at a predominately white school. Stout coached at Tates Creek for four years and ended his coaching career at the school with a record of 72-28. Stout's coaching career was cut short when he was approached by the KHSAA to join the Association staff as an Assistant Commissioner in December 1971.

Stout was an active member of the State High School Basketball Coaches Association while he coached basketball at Dunbar and Tates Creek during his six years as head coach. Due to his short stay in coaching he was not affiliated with other coaching organizations.

Upon his return to Kentucky in 1965, after spending two years in Denver as Athletic Director at Lookout Mountain School for Boys, Stout began his officiating career. In 1966-67 he started umpiring high school baseball for a career that lasted 26 years. During that time Stout worked 21 KHSAA District Baseball Tournaments and 21 KHSAA Regional Baseball Tournaments. He also officiated baseball at the college level, working in the Kentucky Intercollegiate League, the Ohio Valley Conference and the Southeastern Conference, working several conference tournaments throughout the Southeastern United States.

Stout was regarded as one of the finest softball umpires in Kentucky and officiated many men's and women's softball games across the United States as representative of the ASA.

Special Honors and Achievements

Stout received honors for his outstanding officiating in baseball from the Kentucky High School Baseball Coaches Association and he was inducted into the Kentucky Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame in 1997. In 1999, The Kentucky Amateur Softball Association inducted him into the Kentucky Chapter ASA Hall of Honor for outstanding contributions and umpiring in the sport of softball. Stout was named to the Who's Who among African American administrators in 1995 and again in 1996. Stout served on the National Federation of High School Associations Board of Directors from 2000 until his retirement in 2002, and Chaired the National Federation Hall of Fame Screening Committee from 1996-2002. Stout has been National Chairman for the James E. Sullivan Memorial Award program since 1992, which honors the top amateur athlete in the United States.

Stout considers his selection as the first African American Executive Director in the United States among the greatest achievements of his sports career.

Stout was a member of the National Association of Sports Officials, served on the NFHS Baseball Rules Committee from 1976-79, and NFHS Softball Rules Committee from 1984-86.

State Administrator: Stout began his service as a state association administrator on December 10, 1971 when he accepted the position as Assistant Commissioner with the KHSAA. He was the first African American to represent the KHSAA in any capacity when hired by Commissioner Ted Sanford. One of his responsibilities was to initiate a program that would increase the number of African American Officials as members of the KHSAA officials associations throughout the state. Stout was also responsible for high school baseball, swimming, cross country and rifle. During his tenure he was later responsible for the boys' and girls' soccer, girls' slow pitch and fast pitch softball programs.

Stout conducted clinics annually in baseball and softball for all KHSAA member coaches and officials. He served as assistant commissioner for 23 years before being named Executive Assistant to Commissioner Billy V. Wise. In 1994 Stout succeeded Wise as Commissioner, a position held until 2002. Overall, Stout devoted 38 years to education and athletic administration.

It is a real and genuine pleasure for me to nominate Louis Stout as a candidate for induction into the 2005 National Federation High School Hall of Fame. I have known Louis since 1979 when I was hired at the Kentucky High School Athletic Association as Assistant Commissioner. Louis is a unique individual and after reviewing his accomplishments, could fit in virtually every nomination category.

As a participant, Louis distinguished himself as an outstanding high school basketball and baseball player. His statistics and honors are numerous, and significant when he played at an all African American high school (Banneker), during segregation in the early 1950's. He experienced the challenges of integration first hand upon entering Cynthiana High School, where he graduated in 1959.

Louis also distinguished himself as an official, particularly in the sports of baseball and softball. In addition, he officiated basketball, but did very little on the high school level due to moving quickly into the collegiate ranks, concluding his career as a Southeastern Conference Basketball Official.

As a contributor, he was the first African American in the United States to serve as the Executive Director/Commissioner of a High School Athletic Association. One of his strengths was the ability to bridge the racial gap by involving more minority officials and coaches in high school athletics.

Louis has received many honors, which are included on the nomination form. He has taken the initiative to do extensive research on a book, *Shadows of the Past*, chronicling the history of African American high school athletics in Kentucky. The book is close to completion.

He continues to stay involved in highlighting the accomplishments of student athletes by being part of a high school radio Scoreboard Show, which airs on Friday nights. Louis also co-hosts a television show "The Scholastic Ball Report" on Saturday mornings.

In closing, let me say that Louis Stout has served the high school community in Kentucky well, throughout his career in education and athletics. Feel free to contact me at your convenience should you need any further information on Louis Stout.

The completed nomination form and support materials should be sent to: Hall of Fame Director, NFHS, PO Box 690, Indianapolis, IN 46206. Once the nomination form is received by the NFHS, all action necessary to the selection process shall remain confidential. All information submitted shall be retained by the National High School Hall of Fame.

A completed nomination must be accompanied by letters of recommendation from the nominator, the respective state high school association and other appropriate individuals from the nominee's related high school career. In cases where other support material is difficult to obtain, additional letters may be in order to substantiate the individual's accomplishments or contributions. Letters of recommendation for other awards or honors should not be used as a substitute for this requirement. A limited number of newspaper clippings, magazine articles, copies of scorebooks and statistics should be included to help substantiate the accomplishments and contributions of the nominee. These materials should focus on high school accomplishments and contributions and be listed in chronological order.

A portrait-type photograph also should accompany this nomination. If the nominee is inducted into the Hall of Fame, the nominee or individual submitting the nomination shall furnish, at no cost to the Hall of Fame, an 8" x 10" color photograph of the nominee.

In completing the nomination materials, please observe the following: 1) All copies should be 8 1/2" x 11"; 2) nominators should sign their names on the form on page 4; 3) do not use highlighters to point out specific facts; either underline or draw arrows to mark copy; 4) please type all material so that copy is legible; 5) do not use notebooks with plastic sheet protectors; 6) put names on all photos.

A state shall have only one nominee annually (regardless of category), with that nominee meeting the requirement of state association endorsement. A state may have an additional nominee if one of the individuals is a nominee of an NFHS professional organization. In submitting nominations, please remember that the National High School Hall of Fame requires that all inductees attend the annual Induction Ceremony.

The Hall of Fame Induction Ceremony is held in a different city each year in conjunction with the NFHS Summer Meeting. The ceremony is usually held the last week in June or first week in July. Inductees will be notified by March 1 of their selection.

GENERAL CRITERIA

Nominees must exemplify the highest standards of sportsmanship, ethical conduct and moral character.

The categories of athlete, coach, official, administrator, fine arts and others are included on the nomination form for expediency in understanding the primary area in which an individual is to be considered for his or her achievements in interscholastic athletics. The grouping is for screening purposes only and to assist those making the nominations in understanding the type of information required. Once nominees are inducted, they are not categorized, but all are recognized as members of the National High School Hall of Fame.

All candidates for the Hall of Fame must be at least 35 years of age prior to November 15 of the applicable year in order to be considered for induction. This includes candidates in all six categories.

To further explain, athletes would be former student participants who are being nominated for their achievements in interscholastic athletics. Coaches would be considered on the merits of their high school coaching achievements only, officials on the basis of their service as a high school official, and administrators on the merits of their service as a high school athletic administrator, or state or national high school administrator. Fine arts nominees would be considered on the merits of their service as high school participants, coaches, directors or adjudicators. The other category is for those individuals who have made contributions to interscholastic athletics in some capacity other than those previously mentioned, including such areas as sports medicine and sports media.

ALL CANDIDATES WILL BE JUDGED ON THEIR SIGNIFICANT AND/OR LONG-TERM CONTRIBUTIONS TO INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS OR FINE ARTS. WHILE MANY HAVE SERVED THEIR STATE AND LOCAL PROGRAMS OVER A LONG AND DISTINGUISHED CAREER, THEIR ACCOMPLISHMENTS MUST HAVE BEEN WORTHY OF NATIONAL RECOGNITION FOR THEM TO BE CONSIDERED. LONGEVITY, WITHOUT MEANINGFUL NATIONAL IMPACT, DOES NOT CONSTITUTE APPROPRIATE CREDENTIALS FOR HALL OF FAME CONSIDERATION.

Nominees for the Hall of Fame will either be 1) Approved and sent to the Selection Committee, 2) Put on "Hold" or 3) Placed in the "Inactive" category. The "Hold for Future Consideration" category means a nominee may be considered again for induction and that additional information and supportive material would be helpful before future consideration. "Inactive" indicates that the nominee no longer will be considered for Hall of Fame induction until renominated. A one-year waiting period is required before renomination.

The National High School Hall of Fame is organized as a means of recognizing, preserving and promoting the heritage of interscholastic sports and fine arts in the United States. Many individuals have made extraordinary contributions and have had superb accomplishments in high school sports and fine arts. The National High School Hall of Fame honors the contributions and accomplishments of these individuals who are worthy of national recognition as examples for others to emulate.

I became aware of Louis Stout during his senior year at Cynthiana High School. Louis came from Banaker High School when the schools integrated. Louis led his Cynthiana High School basketball team to the State Tournament, where they lost to an outstanding Clark County team.


Louis was the leading scorer and rebounder, making All-State, even though he played only one game. Louis was an outstanding player who could score in many ways from any place on the floor. He was a smooth and finesse player with a variety of shots and outstanding rebounding skills. Quick and mobile, he could beat you off the dribble and hit the jumper. He could post up and score inside with either hand.

I recruited Louis to Regis College in Denver, Colorado, a small, Catholic, all-boys school, with 650 students. We played a Division I schedule. Louis started all four years. At one time, he held the Regis College records for both scoring and rebounding. Louis had his best games against the toughest teams: Xavier of Cincinnati, Dayton, Detroit, Arizona, Colorado State, Denver, Air Force and California. In a game against Utah State, Louis had 33 points and 16 rebounds, while being guarded in the low post by a 6'8" Junior College All-American, Troy Collier.

I am confident that, if the University of Kentucky had recruited Louis, he would have been an All-American and a household word in Kentucky. It is a shame that basketball fans in this area were denied seeing one of Kentucky's best.

Louis was a hard working, self-disciplined student. He got his degree in four years and has been a success in all of his pursuits.

With this writing I highly recommend that Mr. Louis Stout become an inductee into the 2005 National High School Hall of Fame.

Louis Stout is a native of Cynthiana, Harrison County, Kentucky. He attended the all black Banneker Elementary-High School of Cynthiana, Kentucky. Due to the integration of schools, Banneker was closed. This created a situation that Louis, if he was to continue his education and basketball career, must enroll in the Cynthiana High School from which he graduated in 1959.

At Banneker Louis participated in the all black Kentucky State Bluegrass Conference and at Cynthiana High School in the integrated Central Kentucky Conference. Louis lettered in basketball seven years. His height and ability enabled him to play in the sixth grade and earn a letter.

Mr. Stout was a good student with the determination to excel in basketball. He was highly competitive with confidence which produced an ego which said "I am the best." Louis was one of the great basketball players produced in Kentucky. He was blessed with physical stature and with coordination which enabled him to possess superior offensive and defensive skills. Other assets which propelled Louis to become an outstanding player were a positive attitude, knowledge of game, discipline and the motivation to be a team-player. Louis earned All State honors three consecutive years.

Perhaps the crowning moment of his outstanding high school career was an honor he received when he was selected to be a member of the prestigious 1959 Kentucky All Stars Basketball Team, which engaged Indiana All Stars in the annual Kentucky All Star game.

Stout Scores 32, Bulldogs Beat Buffs

GEORGETOWN, Ky., Nov. 25 (Special) — Louis Stout, 6-4, junior center ripped the nets for 32 points as the Cynthiana Bulldogs romped over Georgetown Garth, 75-46, in a Central Kentucky Conference basketball game played here tonight.

Cynthiana broke on top and was leading 15-11 at the end of the first period and increased their advantage to 37-21 at halftime. At the three-quarter mark they were enjoying a 57-34 lead. Stout was helped in the scoring column by Kenton Barnett and Sam Custard who came through with 18 points a piece.

Leo Thomas and Jimmy Sullivan topped the Garth scoring with 16 and 13 points respectively.

MAYSVILLE, Ky., Jan. 28 (Special)—Maysville's Bulldogs, trailing throughout the game, came from behind in the last five minutes of play to down a hard-fighting Cynthiana team, 63-60, here tonight.

Even with the outstanding play of Louis Stout, Cynthiana was unable to stave off the Bulldog rally. Stout took game scoring honors as he tossed in 29 points in one of his best performances.

Under the Dickinson Rating System, which officially decides the champion, neither could catch the Bulldogs—even if Cynthiana should lose to Madison-Model.

But Cynthiana, with big Louis Stout and Kenneth Barnett sparking, still want to increase its stock against the Purples. An individual battle between Stout and Kenard Bosley—two of the top scorers in the CKC—should take place as the teams will meet

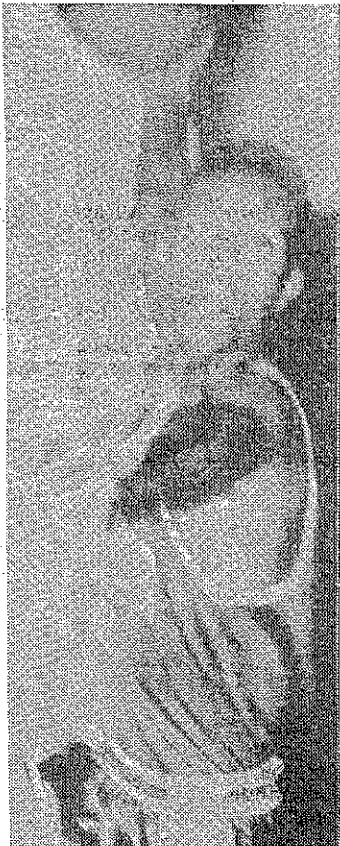

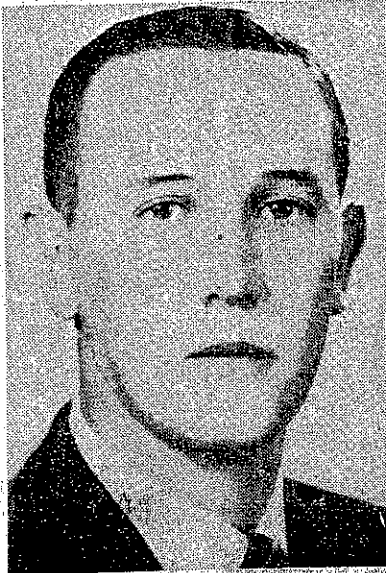

All 10 of the members of the first team are seniors. Not only does this team possess the height to clear the boards, but it also has tremendous shooting skill. Seven squad members took part in the State meet, which speaks for itself as to the players' ability.

Headlining the squad are such well-known cagers as big Julius Berry of Lexington Dunbar, Leland Melear of Louisville Manual, Pat Doyle of North Marshall and Bert Greene of Olive Hill who represent the four teams that reached the semifinals of the "greatest show on earth."

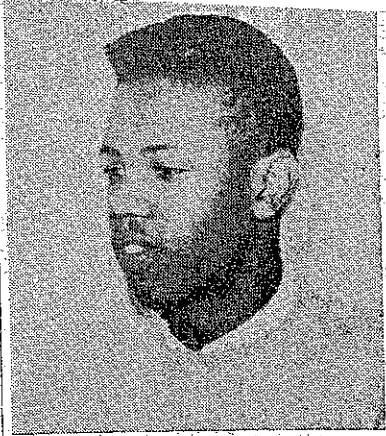

The Lexington Board of Education announced the appointment of Louis Stout as head basketball coach at Dunbar this week.

Stout, a former basketball star from Cythiana, was twice an all-stater in high school and an outstanding player at Regis College in Denver, Colo.

Stout, in accepting his position at Dunbar, takes over for Coach S. T. Roach, who resigned after 21 successful years as head coach to accept a job as Principal at Carver.

Stout, 26, is a 1963 graduate of Regis where he earned his B. A. Degree and also did graduate work. He is currently director at Lookout Mountain Home for Boys in Denver.

Stout Named Cage Coach

Louis Stout, former Cythiana basketball star, has been named head coach at Dunbar High School, replacing S. T. Roach, who resigned to accept an administrative position.

In another area coaching change, former Georgetown College player John Lykins was named head coach of Franklin County, replacing Cliff Barker.

The 26-year-old Stout is currently a director at Lookout Mountain Home for Boys in Denver, Colo.

The other members of this "new look" are seniors William Washington, George Brown, Jerry Gentry and James Martin. Although all were on the team last year none started or saw extensive varsity action.

In other local action tonight Henry Clay is the only other team to travel out of town. The Blue Devils place their undefeated record on the line at Jessamine County. The other three schools with games play at home.

Lafayette hosts Casey County in its season opener, Frankfort Good Shepherd challenges Bates Creek's unblemished record at McAlister Auditorium and Bryan Station, also undefeated, entertains 11 Region pre-season favorite Woodford County. The Yellow Jackets shellacked the Defenders 82-41 last year and have essentially the same team back.

The only returning starter from Dunbar's last year 11th Region championship team is All-State guard James Hamilton. The 6-foot senior averaged 20 points a game last year and teamed with now graduated Robert Washington to give the Bearcats one of the most feared guard combinations in the state.

Stout is predicting something that is almost unheard of at Dunbar — a "rebuilding year." "With only one starter back

from last year's team plus the fact that our tallest player is only 6-3 what can you expect but somewhat of a rebuilding year," said Stout. Of course six of the boys were on the team last year but they didn't play very much," he added.

Helping complicate matters besides this lack of height and experience is the rough schedule the Bearcats must face. Included on it are such teams as Hazard, Woodford County, Louisville Male, Trinity and St. Xavier plus Covington Catholic, among others.

However Stout feels that this "strong schedule" will prove beneficial in the long run — "especially when tournament time comes."

Although Dunbar's tallest man is Gentry at 6-3, all of the other starters stand 6-foot or better.

Another thing that should prove beneficial according to Stout is "the boys' attitude." This along with the fact that the Bearcats are "fundamentally sound" might overshadow the drawbacks.

"Coach Roach taught these boys well — and they haven't forgotten it," said Stout. "That gives us more time to practice on actual game situations. We might lose a few games but we won't make the same mistake twice!"

The top two reserves this year will be senior Ronald Jones and

sophomore John Bledsoe. Stout is especially pleased with Bledsoe. "For a sophomore he's mighty tough," said Stout.

"The key to our season is Hamilton," continued the amiable Bearcat mentor. "If he comes through and uses his leadership and experience to guide the others over the rough spots, then we'll be okay."

Stout, who was five years old when Roach began coaching at Dunbar, is "really enjoying" his first coaching experience. "Coach Roach has sure been a real help to me," added Stout. "I'll bet I could find his house blindfolded now that I've been over there so much asking him for advice," he added laughing.

Stout is "real anxious" for the season to start. But he's not nervous — right now at least. "But ask me again in the middle of the season. I'm sure you'll get a different answer!" he said.

Stout Is 'Quite Thrilled' To Be Dunbar Cage Coach

Louis Stout met the man he will replace as head basketball coach of Dunbar High School yesterday and got his first tour through the school.

"I think I'm going to like it," he said afterwards, "I think I'm going to like it real v.ell."

Stout, 26, arrived in Lexington Saturday from Denver, Colo., where he has been a director in a boys' school since graduating from Regis College there in 1963. This will be his first full-time coaching job.

"Frankly, I'm quite thrilled by it all," said the former Cynthiana basketball All-Stater. "I never thought it would really happen."

With what many consider one of the "plum" coaching jobs in the state, Stout is naturally "enthusied and really anxious to get started."

Stout said he met S. T. Roach yesterday for the first time and plans to get together with the veteran mentor Friday to talk about the season's prospects.

Roach, who guided Dunbar teams to 512 wins in 21 years as head coach, resigned last month to become principal at Carver Elementary School.

Stout said he plans to get returnees from last year's State Tournament team together Monday for the first look at his material.

Actually, Stout has been acutely aware of the basketball prowess at Dunbar since he was in the eighth grade when the Bearcats clobbered Cynthiana, 90-45, in the Kentucky Blue Grass Tournament.

"It was always a thrill for me to watch Dunbar play and to play against the Bearcats. It's even more of a thrill to get to coach them."

"Louis is a young man with potential," Roach said, but admitted "my last contact with him was in high school. He was certainly a fine basketball player."

Roach said he will aid Stout if needed during the first part of the campaign and predicted a "pretty good season" even

with the loss of four of the Bearcats' first five.

James Hamilton, who played guard last year, is the lone returnee. "He's the only one I've heard of so far," said Stout.

Roach said boys like William Washington, Marshall Green, Ronald Jones and James Martin should help the Bearcats.

Stout is married and has a son.

Regis Eager for '61-62

With only one senior departing the Regis Ranger basketball squad, Coach Joe Hall has an added incentive for launching the 1961-62 season in a hurry.

The Ranger coach, with five sophomores and five juniors due to return next year, is about to take what he hopes is the first step towards a brighter future.

Within the next ten days Hall will join the ranks of his fellow coaches in their annual recruiting sortie and Hall makes no bones about wanting a "big man," preferably a junior college transfer ready to make his action next season.

Only Ken Williams, a reliable reserve, graduates. Hall gets back sophomores Ben Wesley (6-5), Louis Stout (6-4), Jim Jones (6-6), Dean Sullivan (6-2) and Darryl Bartz (6-4), the basis of his front line.

Juniors returning are guards Gary DeMarlie, Paul Frey and Dick Hoogerwerf, forward Jerry

Sherman (6-4) and center Bill Kelly (6-5).

Two freshmen who saw varsity action this year were guard Bill Whalen, a Denver Post All-Metropolitan selection from St. Francis, and Allen Thomas, a 6-4, 205-pounder from Lexington, Ky.

Hall still isn't sure of this unit's capabilities. In only four games this year was he able to field the same starting lineup.

Stout, who missed the last two games, paced Regis with a 14.5 scoring average and was the leading rebounder with 206. Sherman, who missed three games, had a 10.5 average.

Wesley, on probation most of the season, finished strong, but played in only 15 games. Sullivan, designated as Hall's floor leader, missed nine games and saw limited action in six.

"It was one big lost week end," says Hall of his 10-10 rec-

ord. "I'd like to know what this team could have done had it been healthy all year."

Hall feels his team lacked the one ingredient for a highly successful year — the big post man.

"He wouldn't even have to score a lot," says Hall. "He'd be a good ball handler, rebounder and be able to scare a few people."

Hall will catch the area high school tournaments, travel into Kentucky (his favorite recruiting field) then attend the NCAA basketball meetings.

Joe B. Hall of Regis College might be pardoned if he breathes a small sigh of relief on closing the books on the 1960-61 basketball season.

The former Cynthiana resident's young Rangers finished with 10 wins and the same number of losses, but these statistics fail to tell the story.

He had his starting lineup intact and healthy just four times during the season as injuries kept him shuffling forces like a card dealer.

Dean Sullivan, sophomore guard and floor leader, appeared in just 11 games, 6 of them at half speed or less as a result of knee and ankle injuries, while the team's leading scorer and rebounder, Louis Stout, missed the final 2 games because of torn ligaments in one ankle and a sprain in the other.

Another starter, Jerry Sherman, also missed three games early in the year with an ankle injury, while Hall himself spent an uncomfortable night in a Montana hospital with what physicians at first feared was a heart attack but finally diagnosed as acute indigestion.

Stout, with 14.55 points per

game, and Sherman with 10, were the only regulars to average in double figures for the year, but here again the figures are deceptive.

Here's the way Stout finished his second collegiate season:

Games 18, Field Goals Attempted 257, Field Goals Made 97, Per Cent .377, Foul Tosses Attempted

Regis, Stout Fought Injuries All Season

Stout-Less Rangers Host AFA

"I'm truly sorry that Louis Stout won't be able to play with Regis," said Coach Bob Spear of the Air Force Academy Falcons. "We would rather they were healthy when we beat them."

Spear, who brings his Falcons against the crippled Regis basketballers Wednesday (8 p.m.) at the Ranger fieldhouse, was disappointed when he read that Stout, Regis' top rebounder and scorer, would not be able to play because of torn ligaments in his ankle.

"Our plans won't change because Stout is out," Spear said. "Our basic defense—man-for-man—will still go. We'd just as soon beat them with Stout in the lineup, though."

Spear said he didn't feel Stout's absence would help his club.

"Somehow we play better

when we tangle with the better players. It's always tough when someone as good as Stout gets hurt. We like Regis . . . we like to beat Regis."

Spear couldn't feel as bad about Stout being gone than Regis Coach Joe Hall. The loss crushed Hall, who has had to adjust his forces the entire season because of injuries.

In 18 games he has had his starting lineup intact for only four games.

In 10 of these games Regis

has had a different high point performer and Stout is the only Ranger with a scoring average better than 10 a game.

Dean Sullivan, crippled with only four seconds left against Arizona early in January, probably will see limited duty. Stout was injured with eight seconds left last Saturday against Idaho State.

The Regis-AFA series is even at two wins, two losses each.

All is not rosy with the Fal-

cons, although none are injured. But, last Saturday the usually sharp Falcons committed no less than 25 errors against Loyola of Chicago and absorbed their worst licking in history 92-63.

"We made 12 errors the first half and were only one point behind at the half 40-39," Spear said, "but we didn't shoot too well that second half and made 13 more errors."

The Regis win streak of five straight is the best run Hall has made in two seasons at the Ranger helm, and Stout played an important role in each win.

Regis Crippled For AFA Game

The Air Force must win one of two remaining games to stay

above the .500 pct. level this season. Now 11-11 after splitting of the road over the weekend, the Falcons have never had a losing season under Coach Bob Spear.

Both coaches will rely on the improved play of reserves in the tie-breaker contest Wednesday night. Each team has won two games in their series.

WESLEY TO START

With Stout on crutches, Hall will rely mainly on Wesley, a sophomore from Denver's Manual High School who has been on probationary status at Regis since the beginning of the season. Frey, a fiery 5-10 guard, will inherit Sullivan's leadership chores. He has been Regis' most consistent player this season.

Spear will start sophomore

Ray Lundquist, a 6-6 center-forward who has improved greatly the past six games. Butch Viccellio, 6-5 center, Bob Schaumberg, forward, and guards Jim Uim and Terry Norris are the other AFA starters.

Jim Diffendorfer, another Falcon sophomore, will be Spear's No. 1 reserve. Like Lundquist, Diffendorfer has developed rapidly and can play either forward or guard.

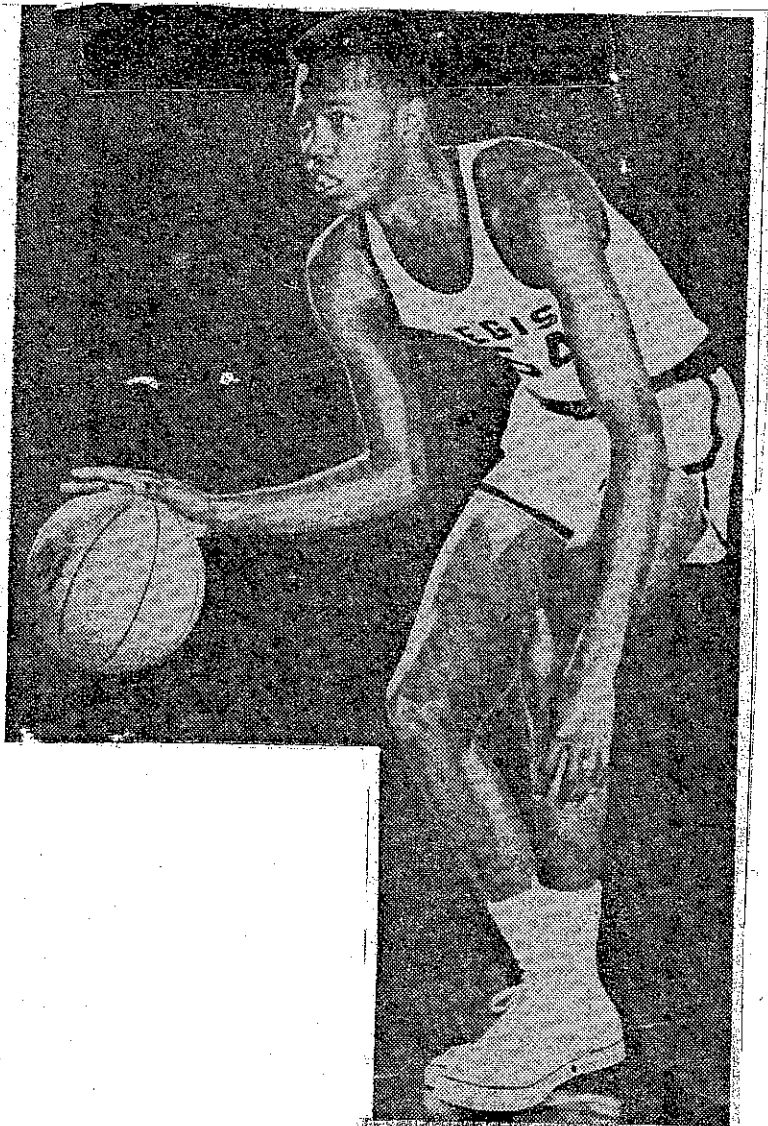

Hall, Stout And Regis Getting Solid Build-Up In City Press

With basketball season nearby reports from the various cage circles are pouring in.

One item in particular, that of the Regis Rangers, has a pair of local twists — Joe Hall, head coach from Cynthiana, and sophomore Louis Stout, a C.H.S. graduate.

In an article sent from Denver this week, scribes are giving Hall, Stout and the Rangers quite a build up. Here's what is being said:

It isn't often that a basketball coach welcomes 10 lettermen back with 4 of them only sophomores, but that's the happy lot of Regis College Coach Joe Hall.

To underscore the working depth Hall can count on, only 1 of the 10 is a senior.

Still, Hall is doing his best to avoid smiling when he talks about prospects for the 1960-61 season.

"We'll have more experience

than last season," he observes, but we still won't have what you call a veteran ball club."

The quartet that lettered as freshmen includes 6-4 Louis Stout who averaged 14.9 points and 12.8 rebounds a game. Stout scored 30 or more points in 2 games and set a new school rebounding record with 20 in another.

Hall lost only 1 senior in graduation, but that was a severe blow. Dennis Boone, who set 4-year and season scoring marks while at Regis, is gone and will be sorely missed in the backcourt.

The article discusses other lettermen and dips into the freshmen ranks, pointing out that Regis, although accepted in the University Division of the NCAA this season, is still allowed to use freshmen except in NCAA playoff games.

Other Kentuckians on the squad include sophomore Jim Jones, 6-6

forward-center from Shepherdsville and freshman Allen Thomas, a 6-4 product from Lexington Dunbar. Pat Jenkins, a member of last year's squad from Lebanon Junction, is not mentioned in the Denver newspaper article.

Regis opens its season December 1 with Denver University. The Rangers aren't scheduled to perform near here during the 1960-61 campaign as they did last season when they played Xavier in Cincinnati.

Regis Uncorks Rally, Rips Creighton, 76-64

Regis College pulled the cork on a bristling second half Monday night to score a 76-64 victory over Creighton's Bluejays at the Regis Fieldhouse.

The victory was the third straight triumph for the young Rangers and pushed their season's record over the .500 mark at 9-8.

A fine crowd of 2200 fans turned out for the contest which saw the Rangers methodically work free for clutch baskets in the midst of a second half zone defense thrown up by the visitors.

This was a well-earned triumph for Coach Jim Hall's club which was forced to come from eight points behind—and do it with 6-6 Center Jim Jones watching from the bench.

Jones picked up his third personal with 11:47 remaining in the opening session and things looked a bit bleak for the Northsiders when Creighton immediately whipped into a 20-12 lead.

But Hall had the answer to the dilemma when he yanked 6-4 Ben Wesley off the bench. The ex-Manual High whiz played like a lion just escaped from a cage as he took command of both backboards and used a bit of his feeding to set up his mates several easy buckets.

Five free throws and baskets by Dean Sullivan and Paul Frey tied the score at 21-21. After Creighton moved back in front 27-23, Wesley's two free throws started a rally which put the Rangers in front 33-29 with 1:21 left in the half.

The Bluejays chisled the lead to 33-32 at the half, but Wesley sounded the Rangers' second half war cry by nailing a pair of free throws and the hand writing was on the wall.

Louis Stout, Regis' fine 6-3 forward, supplied 11 second half points and joined Wesley on the boards to dominate the final 10 minutes of the contest.

The Rangers, with a 5-4 record, take their final and toughest road trip starting with Idaho State at Pocatello on Thursday night.

Saturday night Regis is at Bozeman against Montana State and Monday night draws Gonzaga University at Spokane, Wash.

After games at Reno, Nev.,

The last game for Regis was a winning effort against the Montana State Bobcats at the Ranger Fieldhouse on Jan. 12.

Montana State and Idaho State have always been tough hosts for Regis and Gonzaga features big Frank Burgess, the nation's second leading scorer with a 31-point average.

Louis Stout, 6-4 Ranger sophomore, leads Regis with a 15.7-point average and has pulled down 135 rebounds in nine games for a similar average in that department.

The only other Ranger averaging double figures is Jim Jones, 6-5 center, with a 10.7 mark.

Regis will be without backcourt ace Dean Sullivan, but Hall hopes Sullivan's injured right knee will be healed in time for Regis' next home date on Feb. 15 against St. Ambrose.

 teamed with Louis Stout and Ben Wesley to overwhelm Creighton from that point until a stuff shot by the 6-5 Wesley put the game away for Regis at 65-55 with 4:53 left in the contest.

This determined Ranger trio helped Regis survive two three-minute dry spells in the first half and set the stage for the victor's late first half rally which netted a slim 33-32 half-time lead.

Wesley and Stout rebounded both boards as if the game was keepaway. Sullivan keyed a fast-breaking offense that knifed open a close duel after six minutes of the second half.

Creighton switched to a zone defense in the second half in an attempt to slow Regis and place the Blue Jay front line of Dowling, 6-4 Carl Silvestrini and the high jumping 6-1 Clinton Bedford in better rebounding position.

Hall turned back this maneuver by instructing Stout and Wesley to cut loose long lead-out passes after they had cleared the defensive board. This triggered Regis' fast break.

Creighton's zone was never really jelled, and even with the Jays set, Regis employed a high-low post with Stout especially effective on jumpers from the keyhole. He spaced Regis in the second

half with 11 of his 17 points and tied Wesley for rebounding honors with 15.

Sullivan and Gary DeMarlie fused Regis' pattern play, getting ten points each. Wesley added 12 and Jerry Sherman 10 to give the Rangers a well-balanced attack.

The win was especially sweet to Hall who last Wednesday had to order a post-game drink because he was dissatisfied with Regis' play in a 76-64 win over St. Ambrose.

The loss to Regis was bitter for Coach John (Red) McManus of Creighton.

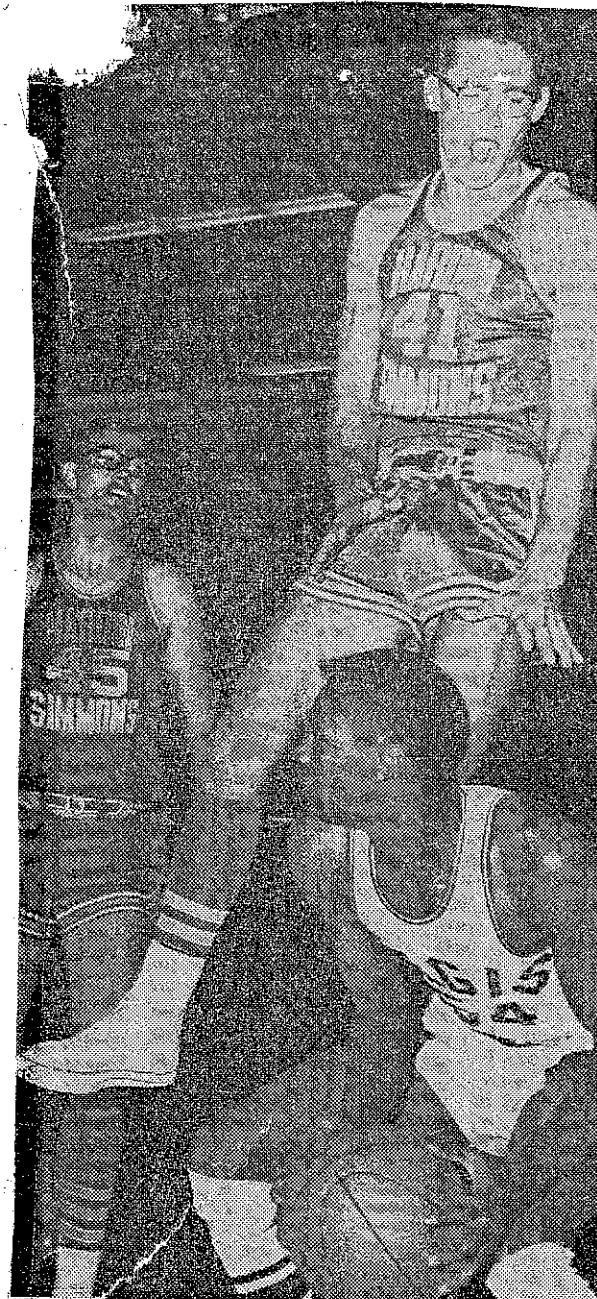
"We didn't get beat by a better team," he lamented. "We just played a poor game. We couldn't beat a high school team tonight.

"Definitely," he said. "(Pat) Haggerty did a fine job, but there's no point in saying anything. The officials only hurt you when you're playing loose ball."

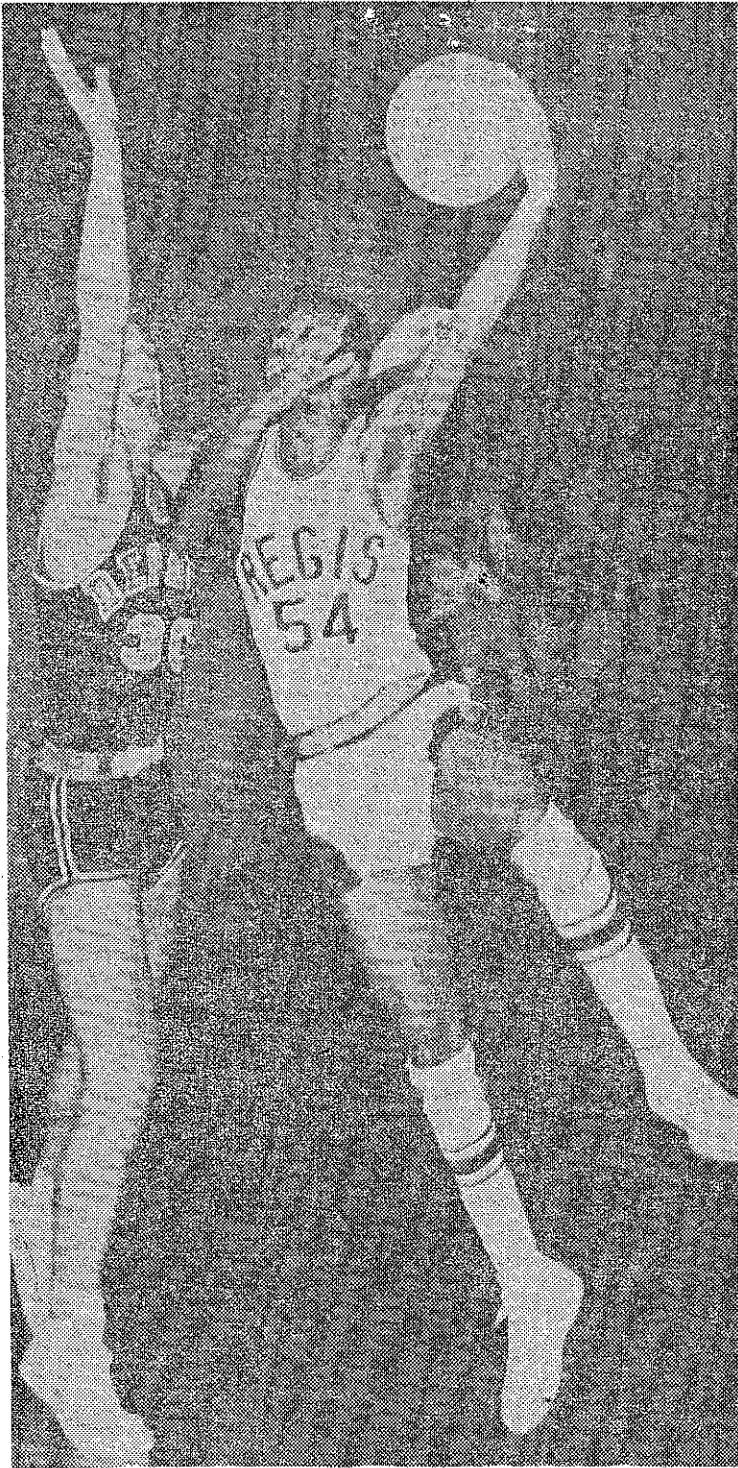

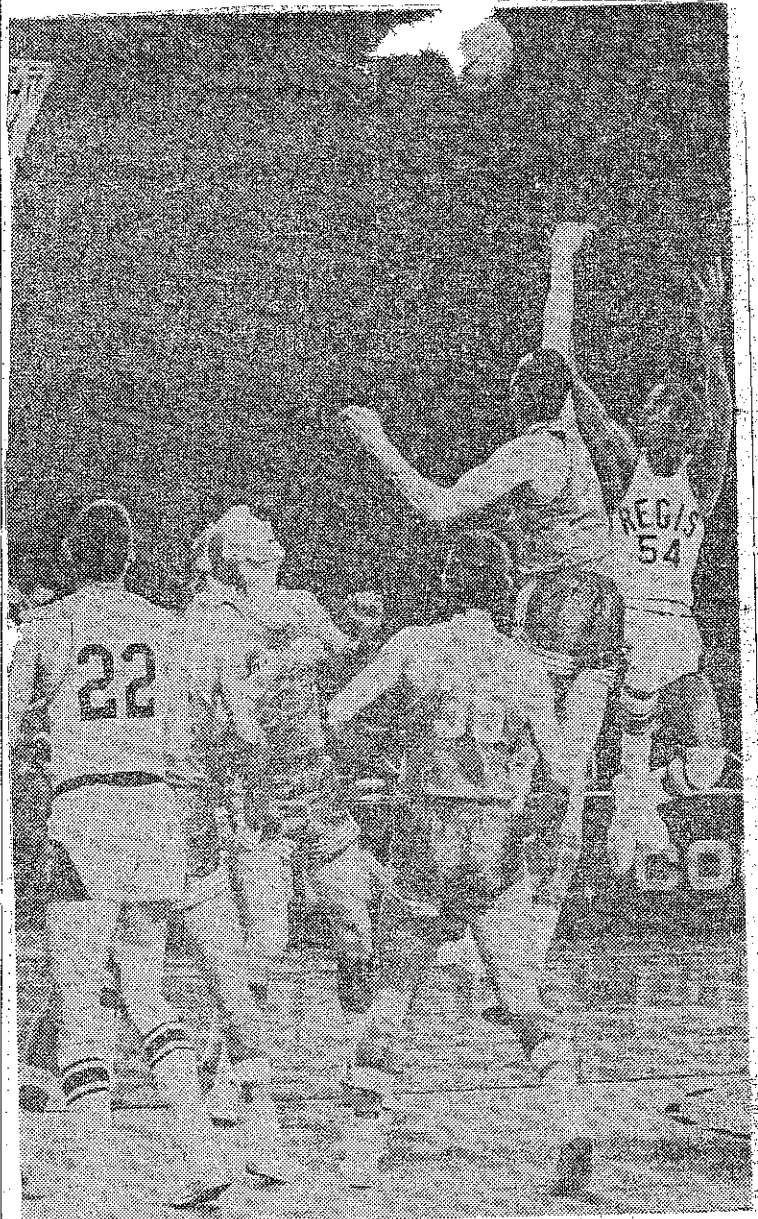

Stout Hurt, but Regis Tops Bengals 70-55

Regis College avenged an earlier basketball loss to Idaho State Saturday night, defeating the Bengals 70-55 for the Rangers' fifth victory in a row at the Regis Fieldhouse.

It marked Regis' longest win streak of the season and the Rangers are now 10-8.

Sophomore forward Louis Stout hit 10 of his 26 points in the first 6½ minutes of the second half to propel Regis to a game-winning 46-30 lead with

13:12 left to play. Stout, however, suffered sprains in both ankles, with eight seconds left in the game and his future services are doubtful. He was to be X-rayed early Sunday.

Sophomore Ben Wesley helped spark Regis in the second half.

The Bengals, who trounced Regis 96-65 at Pocatello last month, suffered cold shooting spells in each half and could get but 18 fielders in 64 attempts for a 28.2 percentage.

With Stout hitting from all angles and Regis getting a well-

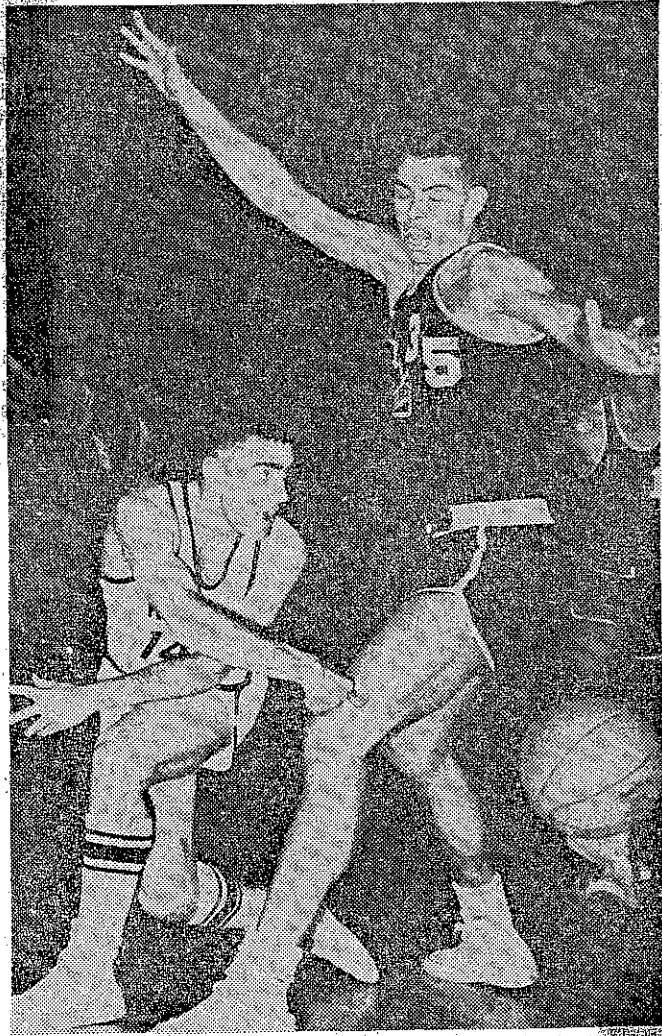
balanced scoring production the Rangers hit 22 of 60 shots for a 36.8 percentage. Equally cold at shooting free throws Idaho State got only 19 of 33 attempts. The fouls were almost equal, 24 for Idaho State, 23 for Regis.

The Bengal downfall came against a determined Ranger man-for-man defense which was especially effective in the second half. Frank Swopes, leading scorer in the Rocky Mountain Conference, got 20 points but didn't hit his first basket in the second half until 6:50 was left.

Idaho State went through three- and two-minute scoring lapses early in the first half and Regis jumped to 7-2 and 10-4 leads. Then Swopes and 6-8 center Al Rolf pumped life into the Bengals and they forged into their only lead in the game at 21-20 with 6:27 left.

Stout hit eight of Regis' next 13 points to give the Rangers a 33-27 halftime lead.

Besides pacing Regis with 26 points, Stout hauled in 15 rebounds. Rolf was high in the rebounding with 19.

Stout Holds Several Records At Regis

DENVER, Colo. (Special) — Two-time Kentucky All-Stater Louis Stout, of Cynthiana, is impressing Regis College basketball fans with what many claim to be the best performances of his collegiate cage career.

Not that Regis fans need impressing by the 6-3, 158 pound senior. Stout has handled that assignment in each of his three previous years on the Ranger varsity. But this year is an exception.

After 13 games, Stout has compiled his best statistic average since coming to Regis. He has hit 207 points in the 12 games in which he has played, an average of 17.3 per game, good for second place in team standings.

He is hitting 47.6 percent from the field (79 of 166) and a creditable 76.5 percent at the free throw line (49-64).

As a freshman Stout averaged 14.9 points in 21 games. He hit a 14.5 game average in 18 games played as a sophomore and last season in 21 games averaged 15.9 points.

Stout is only off his pace of previous years in the rebounding department. This is due mainly to the well-balanced rebounding strength which has developed along the entire Regis front line.

Coach Joe B. Hall's Rangers are currently leading the nation's major college clubs in team rebound percent with a 60.5 recovery percentage. Stout has a 6.7 rebound average. Hall incidently, is also a native of Cynthiana.

Statistics released by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau January 18 placed Regis 7th in team offense with a 82.2 point per game average and 12 in team defense with a 57.3 point defensive average. The Rangers were the only club among the nation's top 20 major college outfits ranked in both departments.

While helping Regis post a current record of 11 wins against only 2 losses, Stout's best game to date came in the loss to Utah State at Logan when he poured in 33 points.

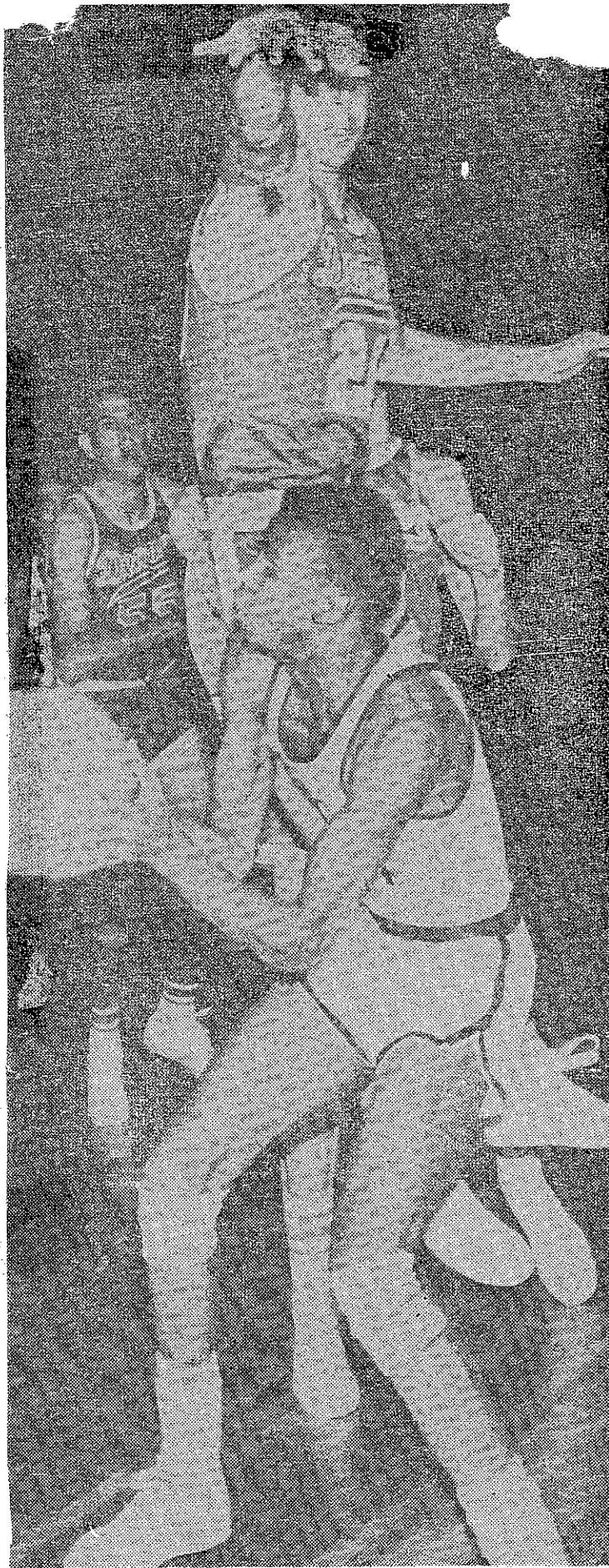
This total, the best one-game individual scoring mark of any Regis performer, this season, ranks as an outstanding production in view of the fact Stout was defended by Utah State's 6-9 star, Troy Collier.

Stout broke two records and tied a third during the 1961-62 campaign when he finished second in both team scoring and rebounding.

He set a Regis individual one-game scoring mark of 44 points against the University of South Dakota, a total which also ranks as the Regis Fieldhouse individual scoring record. In this same game, Stout hit 16 free throws which tied the Regis record of most free throws scored by an individual in a single game.

Since being at Regis, Stout has been a Catholic All-American Honorable Mention winner, has earned Honorable Mention Honors on Chuck Taylor's All-American squad and has been selected on the All-District 7 team by sports writers.

Stout and his wife, Ann, live in Denver. She is a teacher at Denver's Cole Junior High and Louis plans to join his wife in the teaching profession following his graduation this June.



Lou Stout Scores 33 But Regis Bows, 83-75

LOGAN, Utah, Dec. 15—(AP)—Big Wayne Estes, a 6-6 sophomore from Anaconda, Mont., set a rebounding record and became the first Aggie to hit more than 30 points this year in pacing Utah State University to an 83-75 victory Saturday night over Regis College of Denver.

Estes thus won a sparkling scoring duel with the Rangers' Lou Stout, who finished with 33 points. This also makes Stout the first Ranger to top 30 points this season. Stout canned 20 of his points in the second half.

Estes snared 28 rebounds to eclipse by one a 3-year record set in 1959 by Jerry Schofield. The sophomore also hit 34 points to lead all scorers.

En route to this first 30-plus game of the season, Estes dunked 16 of 17 free throw attempts.

The game was close during opening minutes. The score was tied three times and the lead changed five times in the first six minutes. But then Utah State began to move ahead and led 50-33 at halftime.

Midway in the second half, Utah State reserves entered the game and the Regis Rangers closed a 65-40 margin to the 8-point loss. The crowd was 2817, the smallest audience to watch a game in Nelson Fieldhouse in the past three years.

Stout Leads Regis Over DU, 78 to 69

Lou Stout won a blazing shooting duel with Dennis Hodge to lead Regis College out of the basketball doldrums with a 78-69 win over Denver University at Regis Fieldhouse Saturday night.

Stout and Hodge, both seniors, treated the crowd of 1693 to a brilliant fireworks display the lanky Regis forward won by connecting for 36 points. Hodge scored 32 to boost his career total to 1113 and move into second place on DU's all time scoring list.

Stout's total came on 12 of 25 field goal attempts plus 12 of 14 from the free throw line. Hodge hit an even 500—12 of 24—from the floor and eight of nine charities. Eight of Hodge's points came in the last minute and a half to chop down a 15-point Regis lead to the final margin.

Stout's total is the largest by any Ranger this season, topping his 33-point production in a loss to Utah State early in the campaign.

The victory was the second of the year over DU for the Rangers, who boosted their season mark to 15-7 and dropped the Pioneers to a final total of six wins and 19 losses. Regis won, 70-64, at DU in January, and Saturday's completion of the sweep is the first by the Rangers in the long series.

It also ended a 4-game victory

drought for Regis, which goes on to Louisville, Ky., and the National Catholic Invitational Tournament next weekend. DU ended its season Saturday.

Both teams waged a ragged and whistle-filled battle in which the Pioneers spent almost the entire evening trying to catch up and Regis failed to make good on its opportunities until the final 10 minutes.

In fact, Hodge inspired a Pioneer rally that startled the Rangers by erasing a 10-point lead, 42-32, in a little over two minutes just inside the second half.

Hodge hit eight and Jack England two during this scoreless stretch for the Rangers, England's jumper coming at 17:08 to knot the score at 42-all. Another jumper by England a minute later even gave the Pioneers a brief 44-43 lead.

It melted as fouls and steadily increasing Regis shooting pressure took their toll. The score was tied at 49 and 51 before Stout and Cozel Walker took charge and put the game out of reach. Regis' lead mounted to 15 points twice in the latter stages.

This spurt came against a zoning DU after Oglesby picked up his fourth personal with 14:53 left and Bob Moe retired with five at 14:09.

Walker, whose 14 rebounds helped Regis to a huge 46-27 edge and led both teams, contributed 24 points to the Ranger cause. He waged rugged duel with Bill Mumma, who cashed in 17 points with some fine work underneath. Mumma fouled out with five minutes left.

Regis' Stout operating with deadly efficiency off the low post for 17 points, forging leads up to 11 points, swept out to a 39-30 halftime lead that might have been even larger had they made good on a number of close ones that missed the target. Hodge, not yet warmed to his task, had 10 at the intermission.

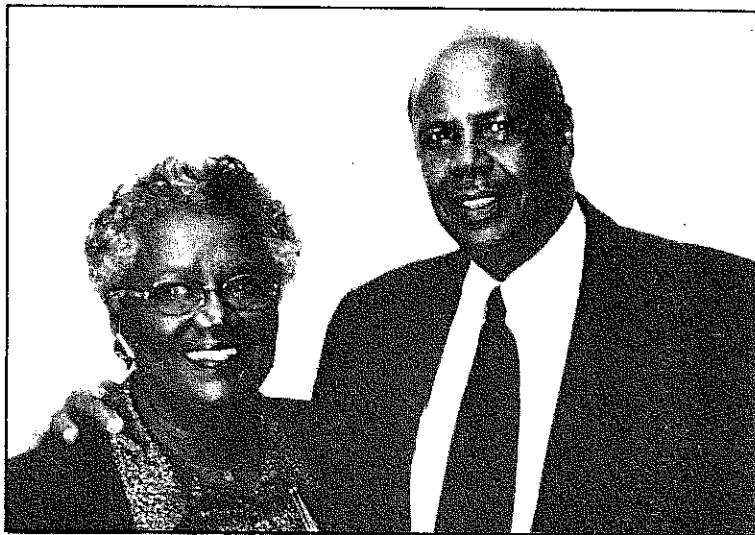

A native of Cynthiana, Stout is a graduate of Cynthiana High School and Regis College (CO), where he played basketball for B. Hall.

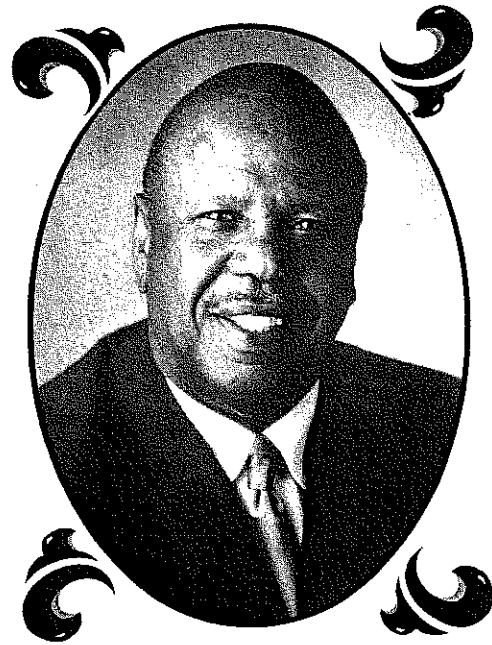

Under Richard Tyler's leadership, the Maine Principals' Association (MPA) has taken shape, grown and flourished. For 17 years, Tyler went about his life's work — the association's work — with vision, courage, energy, integrity and civility. In 2001, he concluded that service, retiring from the MPA.

Tyler began his career in 1961 as a teacher, coach, athletic director and administrative assistant in the Concord (New Hampshire) School Department. He then became junior high school principal in the Oyster River (New Hampshire) School Department and principal of Morse High School in Bath, Maine, before becoming executive director of the Maine Secondary School Principals' Association in 1984.

During his tenure, Tyler engineered the unification of the Maine Secondary School Principals' Association and the Maine Elementary Principals' Association to form the Maine Principals' Association with professional and interscholastic divisions.

He also oversaw the growth of the association from a one-room office in Augusta to a new office and conference center. These accomplishments occurred as the association's professional development offerings for school administrators increased and interscholastic offerings for students expanded.

At the national level, Tyler served a term on the NFHS Board of Directors from 1992 to 1995.

As the first African-American in history to head a state high school association, Louis Stout just concluded more than 30 years of service to the Kentucky High School Athletic Association (KHSAA). Stout joined the KHSAA in 1971 as assistant commissioner and later was named commissioner in 1994.

In his career, Stout has done it all. He was a standout basketball player at Cynthiana (Kentucky) High School and Regis College in Denver, Colorado, and later became a teacher, athletic director and counselor at Lookout Mountain School for Boys in Golden, Colorado. Stout also has refereed college basketball, taught history and sociology, and served as commissioner of the NCAA Division II Great Lakes Valley Conference.

In 1992, Stout was named to the Kentucky Softball Hall of Honor, and in 1997, he was inducted in the Kentucky Baseball Coaches Hall of Fame, the KHSAA Hall of Fame and the AAU Hall of Fame. He currently is the national chairman for the James E. Sullivan Memorial Award, given to the nation's top amateur athlete, and is a member of the Kentucky Chapter of the National Football Hall of Fame Committee. He also was chair of the NFHS Hall of Fame Screening Committee for six years.
