Bobby Washington Biography

Bobby Washington was a brilliant basketball player at Lexington's all-black Dunbar High School, energizing the Bearcats during his high school career from 1963-1965. As a sophomore, he was part of the best guard combination in the school's history. He provided the offensive punch and defensive leadership in the title game of the 1963 State Tournament. He possessed remarkable poise and coolness under fire, standing out as a team leader, and was a strong competitor. Washington was called "Dunbar's kingpin", "the spark" and "a smooth-passing southpaw". During 1964, he was one of the best in the Boys State Tournament. In 1965, he directed the attack for the Bearcats during Dunbar's third straight appearance in the State Tournament. Coach S. T. Roach noted that Washington fired his famous jump shot accurately with either hand and was one of the finest guards ever to play at Dunbar. He started and played in 85 games, scoring an average of 18 points per game. Bobby Washington was named to numerous all tournament teams and received All-City, All-District, All-Region and All-State honors as a sophomore, junior and senior. He was chosen for the Kentucky High School All-Stars and was named to the 1965 prep All-America basketball squad. "The Last of the Dunbar Boys" played college ball at Eastern Kentucky University where he was named Most Valuable Freshman and Most Valuable Sophomore in the OVC and made the Ohio Valley Conference team three years in a row. He started in the professional ranks when he was drafted by the Kentucky Colonels of the American Basketball Association. Later, he was the sparkplug and known as the "Little General" of the National Basketball Association's Cleveland Cavaliers, remaining there until injuries forced him into retirement. After returning to Kentucky, Washington began a career in teaching and coaching boys basketball. He recently retired after completing seventeen outstanding years as the head coach of Bryan Station High School. He continues to mentor young people, always stressing strict discipline and personal responsibility for achieving a lifetime of success.
