

Mel Webster certainly merits inclusion as a coach but he is still active but he is being nominated for his whole body of accomplishment especially his lifelong dedication and contributions to girls sports and sports equity in the state of Kentucky.

NKU News Director and Former NKU Sports Information Director Rick Meyers once wrote in 1976 "In an age of sports chauvinism Mel Webster stands alone in his contributions to girls athletics."

He has received numerous awards in this area including a special contribution award from the Northern Kentucky Girls High School Coaches Association in 1977 for his contributions to Northern Kentucky High School Sports. In 1990 he received the 'Citizen's Award' from the Kentucky Girls Sports Association and in 1996 received the Leadership Award from the Citizen's For Sports Equity. He is currently Title 9 Coordinator for Bishop Brossart High School. (Per Donna Wolfe, Joan Mitchell).

A member of the Northern Kentucky Athletic Directors Hall of Fame and Northern Ky. Hall of Fame he was honored by the Behringer Crawford Museum in Northern Kentucky twice in the last four years for his lifelong contributions to Northern Kentucky Sports along with others like Jim Bunning, Tom Thacker, Ken Shields, Homer Rice and other legends in the "Coaches Corner Exhibit" and the "Reaching for the Stars," display.

In the early years he made an impact on girls sports through publicity and promotion. When the local newspapers refused to take girls basketball stats for the Post and Enquirer he compiled them for no compensation and delivered them to the paper for publication. He ran tournaments, was an assigning secretary for softball (no compensation then), umpired and started a sports newspaper just for Girls High School Sports.

He would later serve two terms as President of the Northern Kentucky High School Girls Coaches Association.

Along with Dale McMillen, he broadcast the first girls basketball game in the state of Kentucky between Boone Co. and Newport in the spring of 1974 before basketball was a State Sport a game which featured Donna Murphy and eventual NKU Coach Marilyn Moore.

As an official he worked the Kentucky State Tournament seven times and the 9th Region finals 20 times from 1971-1992. He was the top rated official in the 9th Region eight times.

Overall he officiated over 3,000 high school and summer league softball games over 28 years.

As a high school coach at Bishop Brossart he is 479-164 with the 1998 State Slow Pitch Championship, 4 Region Titles, 10 District Titles and 11 Conference Titles.

As a volleyball coach he still holds the one season record of 22-11 and was even Cheerleading Sponsor a year.

In summer softball he compiled a 2,110-512 record and although that is not high school competition he coached Kentucky kids and helped over 75 get college scholarships and have an opportunity to improve their skills while playing in over 34 states during the summer months.

He ran the Famous Stars Program in Northern Kentucky which honored Scholar Athletes in the area for over 18 years and later the Northern Kentucky Famous Classic Basketball Tournament featuring 16 boys and 16 girls teams from all over Kentucky from 1983 to 1999.

He was Editor In Chief of Northern Kentucky Sports Newspaper from 1976-1992 and from 1980-1992 added an all girls section.

He was one of the Region's best public address announcers working over 3700 games and over 2,000 as official scorer.

I have attached a complete resume of his accomplishments. In many ways Mel Webster might be the most deserving candidate you have ever had when you take into consideration his impact on girls sports and the body of work in all aspects of Kentucky Sports.

Mel Webster is in his 13th year as Athletic Director at Bishop Brossart High School. He has also been the school's Head Softball Coach for the last 18 years. He is responsible for overseeing what has become a program, after adding football, with 17 sports and over 300 participants per year. He is also overseeing Bowling and dance Club this year as Athletic Activities. He is a member of the National Interscholastic Athletic Association, the Kentucky High School Athletic Director's Association, the 9th Region and the 10th Region Athletic Director's Association. He has successfully completed the American Sport Education program as well as the Athletic Director's Leadership Training Program. This year he was the school delegate to the KHSAA Delegate Assembly and serves on the State AD Legislative Committee. . He has been Recording Secretary for the Northern Kentucky Athletic Conference (NKAC) the last seven years, re-elected for a new term, and on the Board Of Director's for the Northern Kentucky Athletic Directors Association the last ten. Mel is also Treasurer for the NKADA which oversees the Athletic Director's Hall Of Fame and the Northern Kentucky Senior All-Star Series. He is in charge of the NKAC Directory and the hall of Fame Program. Mel was the youngest ever inductee to the Northern Kentucky Sports Hall Of Fame in 1993, and in 2000 became a member of the Northern Kentucky Athletic Director's Hall Of Fame. His career softball coaching record for summer, high school and college is now a combined 2,589-684. He was National "Coach of the Year" three times in summer softball, was Vice President of the National Touring Teams organization, was Northern Kentucky "Coach of the Year" in high school in 1993 and 1998, as well as *Kentucky Post* and *Cincinnati Enquirer* "Coach of the Year" in 1998 and 2002. His career high school coaching record in softball is now 479-174 in 18 seasons. His summer team won the 1978 World Championship with a 102 win 14 loss record and his 1982 team was World Runnerup with an 81 win 21 loss season. His high school teams at Bishop Brossart have won a State Championship, five Regional championships, nine District Championships and eleven NKAC Championships. He is now the winningest softball coach in Northern Kentucky.

Mel's career also included 22 years as a high school umpire working 20 Regional Championship games, over 3,000 high school and summer games, and seven KHSAA State Tournaments. He was also a high school public address announcer for over 30 years announcing over 3,600 games including 25 straight 9th Girl's Regional Championships and the 10th Region Tournament won by Bishop Brossart. Webster was Head Volleyball Coach at Bishop Brossart in 1996 and 1997 and his 1997 team still holds the school record for wins (22-11). He served a year as Cheerleading Coordinator. Prior to becoming Athletic Director at Bishop Brossart, he was Director of the Famous Stars Program from 1979-1996 that honored over 2,000 high school scholar-athletes. In addition he was Editor in Chief of *Northern Kentucky Sports Newspaper* from 1976-1992. Mel, a two-time President of the Northern Kentucky Girl's Coaches Association, is a strong advocate of Gender Equity and is the school's first ever Title 9 Coordinator. He has received numerous honors statewide including the Girl's Sports Association "Citizen's Award" in 1990 and the Kentucky Citizen's For Sports Equity

Leadership Award in 1996. This summer Mel received a special honor. He was selected to the "Coaches Corner" at the Behringer Crawford Museum in Covington as one of Northern Kentucky's Top 69 Coaches of All Time in Northern Kentucky joining such legends as Ken Shields, Stan Arnzen, and Homer Rice. He was honored again in 2008 as one of the Top 60 "Reach for the Stars" recipients of all time in Northern Kentucky. He was also awarded by the Museum for his contributions providing background on most of the inductees.

Athletic Director Job Description

The Athletic Director at Bishop Brossart shall oversee the general operation of the Athletic Department. This includes....

- 2. Will oversee the scheduling of all games and approve all scheduled games. This shall include making sure the games are in compliance with KHSAA game limitations and rules.**
- 3. Shall work with coaches in making sure all paperwork is in order and that all coaches are in compliance with virtue and certification requirements. This will also include school required paperwork.**
- 4. Make sure all student athletes are in compliance with KHSAA requirements by having an up to date physical on file and proof of insurance.**
- 5. Work with the Athletic Trainer in making sure any injured athlete has a release from the doctor before returning to participation.**
- 6. Represent the school in all Athletic Director Meeting and NKAC Meetings whenever possible.**
- 7. Represent the school at the annual KHSAA Delegate Assembly.**
- 8. Represent the school at Bishop Brossart Booster Meetings.**
- 9. Secure gate workers and game workers for all athletic contests.**
- 10. Assist Principal in compiling list of all athletes in each season for weekly grade check and make sure all students are in compliance when the Principal is not available.**
- 11. Approve all purchases of the Athletic Department for Principal's ultimate approval. This shall include uniform replacement and rotations.**
- 12. Maintain school athletic website.**
- 13. Compile edit and sell advertising for school's athletic All Sports Publication.**
- 14. Order soft drinks and oversee workers for concession stand at basketball games and volleyball games.**
- 15. Write section for Athletics in Monthly School Newsletter**
- 16. Organize and supervise Athletic displays and Handouts from Athletic Coaches for Annual Open House.**
- 17. Secure game officials for all sports that require game officials.**
- 18. Compile Athletic Eligibility Forms for each sport for each season.**
- 19. Update all required forms and information on KHSAA Members Only section of the website that includes, pictures, rosters, game schedules, coaches information, enrollment and information for the school.**
- 20. Reinstate all disqualified students and coaches with the KHSAA**
- 21. Schedule Gymnasium and Weight Room**

22. Keep all student athlete information updated on computer in Athletic Director Program.
23. Secure police for games requiring security
24. Help secure workers to assist boosters at annual Stag and Golf Outing
25. Work with coaches on making sure they assist media by calling in all games, statistics and information.
26. Work with the Principal in hiring of coaches
27. Supervise gymnasium and keeping banners updated and added based on school policy
28. Enforce school athletic policy
29. Enforce School's Title 9 Policies and follow guidelines submitted by the KHSAA.
30. Make sure coaches attend seasonal rules clinics.
31. Maintain and keep up to date school athletic records
32. Approve and schedule buses for all trips of the Athletic Department working with Transportation Director.
33. Identify all athletes for awards
34. Supply Guidance Counselor with lists of athletes for annual retreats.
35. Schedule pictures for all team sports with Cooper Digital Photography.
36. Meet with parents or coaches when problems occur.
37. Arrange game sites for sports not on campus.
38. Other duties and requests by the Principal.
39. Oversee Athletic Activities such as Cheerleading and Dance Club, Pep Band and other activities not yet sports but under the umbrella of the Athletic Department.
40. Compile and send all required reports to the KHSAA including Tournament expense reports, the Annual Participation Report and the Title 9 Report.
41. Supervise Spirit Shop (starting 2008-2009)
42. In charge of concession stand, stocking, workers, accounting and turning in of all money (starting 2008-09)
43. In charge of Annual Men's Golf Outing
44. In charge or organizing and planning a large fundraiser for all sports

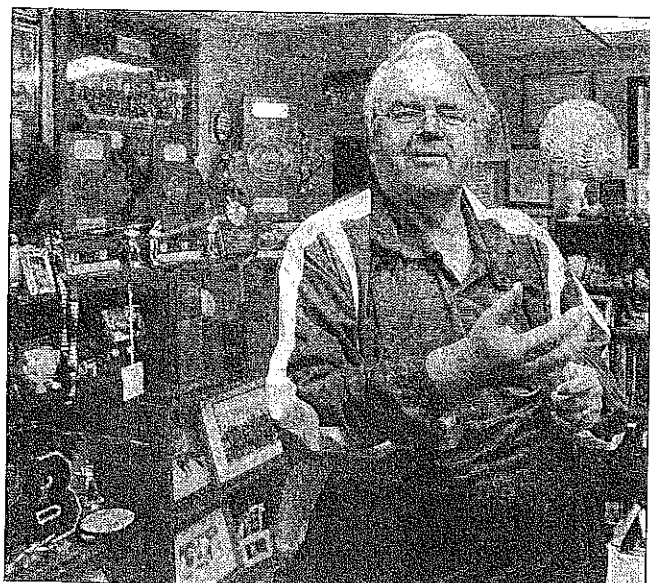
Dear Committee

Brossart AD passionate about preps

Webster catalogs area's history

Former Bishop Brossart principal Tom Seither gained first-hand knowledge of athletic director Mel Webster's far-reaching impact when the two attended a state of Kentucky delegate assembly at Rupp Arena where Seither voted on policy changes.

"I was the voting rep for the school and I asked Mel to come with me one year," said Seither, who put Webster on his current path when he hired him as Brossart's softball coach 19 years ago.

"We get down there and everybody's calling Mel by his first name and shaking his hand. I was embarrassed for myself. Like, what am I, chopped liver?"

Webster has done work in public relations and media relations. He has organized longstanding tournaments. He has acted as publisher and editor for sports newspapers. On press row, he has served as public address announcer, official scorer and radio broadcaster.

In many instances, Webster has been a pioneer. He started a sports newspaper specifically geared to girls' sports before girls' sports were widely accepted. Before newspapers started taking girls' basketball statistics, Webster compiled them and delivered them for publication. He was part of the first broadcast team covering a local girls' high school basketball game in the state of Kentucky when Boone County played Newport in 1974.

Webster was introducing people to Seither at the delegate assembly instead of the other way around, and Seither was struck by that. The voluminous amount of work Webster was putting in on behalf of the school and Northern Kentucky suddenly took on new meaning.

"He's known and respected throughout the state," Seither said. "The man is a walking encyclopedia of Kentucky sports knowledge, particularly locally, because he's been digging up information for years.

"If you want to know anything about high school basketball in our area, boys or girls — because he's done a lot for the advancement of girls' sports — Mel is the go-to guy."

Webster fields phone calls to answer trivia questions and settle bets because he has been collecting facts, statistics and memorabilia related to Northern Kentucky high school basketball since he was a student at Holmes. It began in 1971 when Webster asked Holmes boys' basketball and football coach Tom Ellis what his career basketball record was. Ellis didn't know, but asked Webster to find out.

"I went through old scorebooks and yearbooks and I went to the library and looked at microfilm of old newspapers and figured out his record, and told him one day it was 426-150," Webster said. "Then he wanted to know how he stacked up against everybody else, so I went and compiled all the other coaches' career records. From there, it just became a hobby."

The rest is history, and lots of it.

Webster has been working on a book that will gather all the information he has compiled over the past 39 years. Though the project is basically complete, with records and photographs dating to 1910, Webster is going to publish it himself with the help of sponsors, so he's not quite authored a book.

But Webster has done just about everything else.

Since he completed his schooling at Northern Kentucky University, Webster has worked as an umpire, softball coach and volleyball coach in addition to being Brossart's athletic director for the past 12 years. He's held important positions, including secretary, vice president and president of the Northern Kentucky Athlet-

He has received numerous awards, including a special contribution honor from the Northern Kentucky Girls High School Coaches Association in 1977. In 1990, he received the Citizen's Award from the Kentucky Girls Sports Association and in 1996 received the Leadership Award from the Citizens For Sports Equity. He was the top-rated official in the Ninth Region eight times.

Webster is a member of the Northern Kentucky Hall of Fame and the Northern Kentucky Athletic Directors Hall of Fame. He was honored by the Behringer Crawford Museum twice for his lifelong contributions to area sports, and one year was depicted in a display that also included baseball star Jim Bunning, basketball legend Tom Thacker and legendary coaches Homer Rice and Ken Shields.

"Mel represents a lot of goodness," said Shields who coached at NKU and high schools. "He's done just about everything you can do in sports at the high school level. He has inundated his life with it. His passion is unbelievable. He's an incredible asset not only for Brossart but our entire area."

Some of Webster's numbers are staggering. He officiated more than 3,000 high school and summer league softball games over 28 years. He umpired a regional final 20 times from 1971-92. He has been the public address announcer for more than 3,000 basketball games and the official scorer for more than 2,000. He announced the Ninth Region girls' basketball tournament 25 straight years from 1974-1998.

At Brossart, Webster has won 479 games as softball coach with a shot at No. 500 this season. He guided the Mustangs to the 1998 slow-pitch state title. As volleyball coach, he still holds the school single-season record for wins with 22. In summer softball, he won 2,111 games.

Under Webster's direction, the number of Brossart athletic teams has nearly doubled, and 20 Brossart teams have won state championships.

"It's not just me. It's the accomplishments of a lot of people at Brossart. There's been a lot of good coaches and excellent athletes who've been part of this," Webster said. "Being involved with sports is just something I enjoy. I feel very fortunate to do what I do."

Webster gives up head coaching job

Mel Webster has stepped down as Bishop Brossart softball coach after guiding the team for 20 years. Webster, who remains Brossart athletic director, is turning over the reigns to eight-year assistant Tom Baynum.

"Tom has all the qualities you would ever want in a head coach," said Webster, who compiled a 531-185 record. "He is a great communicator, has a great knowledge of the game and is well-respected. It's the easiest hire we have ever made."

Webster, 57, guided the Mustangs to the 1998 slow-pitch state championship. His slow-pitch and fast-pitch teams combined to win four regional titles, 14 district championships and 16 conference crowns. Baynum's Brossart junior varsity teams have a record of 133-41.

The Mustangs, 25-6 last season, will return seven starters.

"Tom's getting a better team than I got when I first started," Webster said. "Originally, I was going to do this next year. But being the AD and being NKAC president one more year and doing more with the Athletic Directors Hall of Fame, with Ron Madrick retiring, I thought that this was a good year to do it."

Webster is staying on as an assistant. "I'll keep the scorebook and get Tom a drink in the third inning. I'll cheer out opponents," Webster said. "I'll still be around."

Former booster Nevin Shapiro, now serving 20 years in federal prison, claims he treated players with sex parties, nightclub outings, cars and other gifts. Shapiro told Yahoo! Sports he provided improper benefits to 72 football players and other athletes at Miami from 2002 to 2010.

"If the assertions are true, the alleged conduct at the University of Miami is an illustration of the need for serious and fundamental change in many critical aspects of college sports," NCAA president Mark Emmert said in a statement.

The Hurricanes' entire football team took the practice field Wednesday, even though Shapiro's claims involve several current players. Coach Al Golden said it was too soon to take disciplinary action.

The Hurricanes open their season Sept. 5 against Maryland.
