PARIS—Basketball players at Paris High School were honored last night at a banquet in their honor. Both boy and girl athletes were recognized for their achievements during the past season.

Possibly the highlight of the awards presentation came when Coach Judy Cox announced senior Befn Wilkerson's jersey number 44 would be retired. It was the first time in the history of Paris High School the jersey and number of any athlete, in any sport, had been retired.

A trophy case will be erected to permanently display a picture of Wilkerson and her orange ersey. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wilkerson, will keep her white lersey.

Wilkerson, a first team All-American on both the Parade Magazine and Adidas teams, was also named Most Valuable Player for the past season.

Sharing top honors on the boys team were Stephen Jacobs and Wallis Brooks, both seniors. Jacobs who was unable to attend the banquet due to track competition, received the awards for most rebounds and leading scorer.

Brooks also received two awards one for assists and another for the most steals. Coach Mark Crain, who presented the awards, reminded the crowd Brooks sometimes fouled out trying to steal, but that overall his efforts were successful and very helpful to the team.

Speaking in general about the past season, Crain said the only unsuccessful thing was the 10-17 win loss record. Despite the losing season, he said the team had learned to work together, and were friends as well as players on the same team.

Other award winners on the boys team included Dana Brack, a junior, who had the best field goal percentage. Mike Crutcher, a senior, was recognized for having achieved the best free throw percentage on the team.

Butch Maggard, a senior, was named the most improved player, and junior Tony Withrow received sixth man honors. Clayton Brooks and Buddy Whitaker were given the "Hustlin' Hound" award, and Louis Scott received the leadership award.

Several varsity players also received letter jackets. They were Mike Crutcher, Jamie Tucker, Elgin Downey, Louis Scott, Victor McKee, and managers Victor Tucker and Mike Turner.

Junior varsity boys players were

also honored, with Charles Cummins receiving the leading scorer award. Timmy Dale had the most offensive rebounds, and was also named most improved player, an honor he shared with Eric Maschke.

Junior Jamie Tucker had the most defensive rebounds on the junior varsity team, while Victor McKee had the best free throw percentage. Elgin Downey had the best field goal percentage on the team, and Mark Bell received the 110 percent award.

Other junior varsity awards went to Derrick Pierce who received "sixth man" honors, and Gary Brooks, who had the most assists.

Players on the boys' freshman team were also honored, and Euchre Johnson received the 110 percent award. Jeff Livengood was named most improved player, while John Stephenson received the defense award. Doug Crumbie received the sixth man award.

Other girl players were also honored, and all-state standout, Cathy Stiles was recognized for having the best field goal percentage. Stiles, a junior, will be back on the squad next year.

# It's Too Bad Kentucky Can't Name Two Miss Basketballs This Year

The arguments have raged since the two girls were sophomores. Depending on what coach you talk to or what newspaper you read, either Sharon Garland or Beth Wilkerson is the best female high school basketball player in the state.

With two such outstanding seniors, the issue may never be settled. But before the all-star games begin in June, Kentucky's Miss Basketball must be selected. Which one will it be?

Most likely it will be Garland, a 5-10 forward who led Laurel County to its third consecutive state championship this season. Over the past three years, Garland has been the leading vote-getter in most all-state polls and ususally been labeled the top player.

BUT IF GARLAND wins, it will probably be on the basis of the state titles earned by the Cardinals first and basketball ability second.

"It's too bad there can't be two



Miss Basketballs this year," lamented Roy Bowling, coach of Garland's Laurel County team.

Bowling knows Wilkerson, a 5-10 guard from Paris, is an excellent player. Although Paris is probably Laurel County's biggest rival, Bowling describes Wilkerson as "fantastic."

Wilkerson has been selected first team All-America by Parade Magazine while Garland was named to the second team. Major colleges have been hot on the recruiting trail of both players for over a year. Wilker-

son signed with national champion Old Dominion Wednesday. Garland, who seems to prefer a school closer to home, reportedly is considering Western Kentucky and Kentucky, with Northern Kentucky a possibility.

As far as ability is concerned, Wilkerson is a better all-around player and a superior athlete. She is much quicker and a better leaper than Garland. Wilkerson can play center and forward and switched to guard this season to enhance her college chances.

Garland began her career at center; Bowling switched her to forward this season, also for recruiting purposes.

IN PARIS' opening round game against Assumption in last week's State Tournament, Wilkerson's performance was amazing. She scored 27 points, hitting 10 of 13 shots from the field, and collected eight rebounds and seven assists in a 78 61 victory. She

averaged 21.3 points in three games and received the J.B. Mansfield Award as the outstanding player.

Garland did not dominate play during Laurel County's march to this state title as she has in the past, but did average 16.5 points in four games and proved she can hit from 15 feet.

The views of the two girls' coaches differ greatly.

"I don't think I'm biased, I think I'm right — Beth is the best allaround player in the state," said Paris coach Judy Cox. "She may not be the best shooter or the best ballhandler ... most of the time Miss Basketball is probably the best shooter. But Beth is a tremendous athlete — she can jump so well."

Counters Bowling: "There's no question that Sharon should get Miss Basketball, she led her team to three straight championships.

"She's shown how valuable she (Turn to KENTUCKY, B-4)
