

#### Dear Julian,

I want to thank you for taking the time out of your busy schedule to visit with Coach Ron Bevars and myself at your office on August 13th. I also appreciate your taking the time to show us around the office, the new Hall of Fame Area, and to say hello to Commissioner Brigid DeVries. As I told you on our visit, for the last two years we have been making documentaries on Kentucky Sports Legends. Last year we did one on Kelly Coleman, Wayland, and their efforts to promote an Eastern Kentucky Mountain Sports Hall of Fame. We had a lot of fun going to Wayland and also spending time in Prestonsburg, Pikeville, and Carr Creek. A wonderful part of this documentary was an interview with Kelly Coleman and Morton Combs talking about their teams in battle in 1956. That is a real Treasure!

Currently, we are working on a documentary called "On the Road with Howie Crittenden". It features videos and interviews in Cuba, Murray, Henderson, and Dixon, Kentucky. Included in the video are interviews with Cal Luther, Benny Purcell, Frank Ramsey, and Roger Bird. While doing our work in Western Kentucky we had hoped to meet and get an interview with the 1956 Sports Legend, Corky Withrow. With the help of Marc Stone, from the Argus-Times in Central City, we were able to contact Corky. He graciously gave us a three-hour interview at the old Central City gym that is now a Sports Museum for Central City. At the time we only knew that Corky and Kelly Coleman were the two premier players of their era and assumed both were in the KHSAA Hall of Fame. Pursuing this matter, we of course found out that Kelly had been selected but had declined induction and that Corky had never been selected. This certainly piqued our interest so we began to investigate further. We found that Corky had been nominated twice, but had never made the top 36 of the nominations. This in itself was incredible. So we gathered all of the information we could on Corky and compared his accomplishments to all the other members already selected to the Hall of Fame. In the famous words of Kelly Coleman "I may not have been the best player in the state but I'm DAMN sure I was in the TOP 20"!!!! After comparing the resumes of all of the inductees we can say without any doubt Corky Withrow could make the same claim. Corky and his teams of the Central City Golden Tide were an absolute power in Kentucky Basketball from 1953 through 1956 with a total of 120 wins and 20 losses. Three appearances in the state tourney and without a questionable call leading to a defeat in the regional finals in 1953 they would have made four straight appearances. Needless to say Corky was the STAR on all of those teams.

I am not going into all of Corky's accomplishments in this letter other than to say I think we all know that Corky Withrow, not being in KHSAA Hall of Fame is a huge injustice to this great player and that omission should be corrected as quickly as possible.

Coach Ron Bevars, Gary West, Howie Crittenden, Bob Watkins, and a very large contingency of Sports Minded Historians across the state of Kentucky and I are working to correct this omission. We need your help and council as to how to remedy this situation.

In closing, Claudia and I want to again extend an invitation to you, Brigid, and members of your staff to let us host you whenever you are traveling through our part of the country. We look forward to that and I have enclosed one of our brochures.

Again, Julian thank you for your time allowing Coach Bevars and myself to visit and we look forward to hearing from you and working with you on our special project.

## HD:Â Gathering in Wayland -Â *One Shining Moment* for basketball in Ky.

Basketball players in Kentucky who own one-name recognition that spans more than half century, are as rare as a comet fly by. Made precious because time, anecdotal history and written words smooth a path for the likes of Kelly Coleman, Fred Maggard, Howie Crittenden and Corky Withrow,

On a September afternoon recently these 70-something men gathered in the shady climes of Wayland in Knott County to commiserate over basketball's golden age, the 1950s, and reflect on their roles in making basketball Kentucky's dream game.

Those who have seen 60 winters, would say the Wayland gathering was Hollywood equivalent of a sit-down with Eastwood, DeNiro, Pacino and Newman.

On court as on big screen, all have reputations as maverick, marquee entertainer, free spirited risk-taker who, by wit and wile, one time or another, thumbed his nose at convention and marched to cadence of *his* drum. Sometimes within socially accepted boundaries, sometimes not.Â

Today, Coleman, Maggard, Crittenden and Withrow smile easy, laugh often and bring to mind a line from Morgan Freeman, "lt's been one helluva ride.â€□

They scored a mountain of points, gathered a Great Lake of rebounds, swished game winners, helped win large trophies, and did it all with such flare and panache they still attract autograph seekers.

This foursome won affection and respect that elevated each to pedestals from which their names show up between covers of hardback books and calls for interviews still come.

Beyond the Bunyan-like numbers, Maggard and the rest who had a shining moment or two, are symbols of why a little boy first picks up a rubber ball and shoots at an oatmeal box. A dream is born to chase across the heavens of high school hoops. Few things compare.

A season, a tournament, or one game, we all want a limelight moment to cherish, to revel in. Crittenden, Withrow, Maggard and Coleman got theirs.

Th Gathering in Wayland was a natural to those who 'get it' about sports. Good memories. This scene came to us at the perfect time, in

the perfect place with personalities who have, in the afternoon of their days, become semi-perfect perhaps and mellow. Sort of. Credentials.

- In 1952 Howard Crittenden led Cuba to its *Hoosiers-like* State title. One for the little guy. If there had been Mr. Basketball, Howie was It.

- In 1956 Coleman was Mr. Basketball. A prodigious scorer-rebounder, celebrity and title (King) found him too early. Free-spirited Coleman went solo, and became the embodiment of Frank Sinatra's 'My Way.'

But also in the spring of â€~56 flatlanders would argue for co-Mr. Basketball, Corky Withrow at Central City.Â

- Maggard could have been tournament MVP in â€~56 in part because of two game winning shots. Instead, a vote in the Kentucky Legislature got his name onto the all-tournament team. Today.

COLEMAN. Passage of time and groaning knees may have robbed his skills to play the game, but the 70-year-old with striking blue eyes and reputation as best there ever was, is gracious and glad to see adversaries appear from half a lifetime ago. The King basked in the usual praise, but was more inclined to pay tribute to Withrow, and Maggard's heroics in the State Tournament and admire Crittenden's journey to fame and good fortune.

The man who set almost two dozen Sweet 16 records including a 68-point game, Coleman looked at Maggard and said "ya know, Freddie, those two shots you made in the tournament was the most impressive thing of all to me."

MAGGARD. If humility and hero were one word it would belong to this heart attack survivor. In â€⁻56 the Carr Creek kid, who was once censured for popping chewing gum in English class, saved his team's title run twice. Today, he is adamant that the real heroes were his teammates. "l just happened to have the ball at the right time.â€□

WITHROW. He remembers three trips to the Sweet 16 and no title. But gregarious Corky, who went on to play baseball for the St. Louis Cardinals, fills the room with good cheer, boisterous laughter and antics. With a million dollar smile, he made clear (with a wink) he didn't want to hear about Maggard's shot that sent the Golden Tide home. CRITTENDEN. At 74, Howie the country boy has more a patrician bearing these days. Trim and tanned, life is good. His place in basketball's pantheon assured, Crittenden was gracious, shared stories with wit, gesture and a clucky laugh. As banter flew hot through

the afternoon, Howie deferred to his brethren as they sparred and traded opinions.

• Withrow has not forgotten the Wayland at Central City game on Christmas Eve, 1955 won by the home team. He and Coleman scored 40 apiece. Back home Coleman allegedly told a reporter "... it took seven of â€~em to beat us,â€l meaning the officials.Â

Corky has not forgotten. They laugh about the remark today. Sort of. • Maggard (tongue in cheek) apologized for his dramatic shots that sent Withrow, then Coleman, home from the State Tournament. But, he isn't *that* sorry.

Central City High School closed its' doors for the final time in 1990, becoming part of a newly formed Muhlenberg North High School the following year. At that point in KHSAA history, The Golden Tide (CCHS Basketball Team) was the winningest high school basketball program in Kentucky, had made 16 appearances in The Sweet Sixteen, and was the second winningest basketball program in the United States. That accomplishment was possible because of a number of outstanding coaches and players through the years, but there is one name that stands above all others relative to 'The Tide Tradition'. That name is Raymond "Corky" Withrow. A contemporary of "King" Kelly Coleman, a full chapter of a book recently written about the greatest legend in Kentucky basketball history is given to a Christmas Eve matchup between those two players in the finals of the Central City Christmas Tournament—they both scored over 40 points and Central City won the game. Corky was voted All-State and All-American for basketball, and I believe was voted All-State for baseball as well. He appeared in at least 3 state tournaments during his high school career and remained the leading all time scorer for CCHS until the school closed in 1990.

I played basketball at CCHS 1967-1970, served as Athletic Boosters President from 1985 until the final season, and served as chairman of The CCHS Museum Committee that established 'The Golden Tide Museum' in our old gymnasium in the 1990's. Although there were many great players that wore the 'black and gold' and were a part of the outstanding success that Central City enjoyed for over 60 years, and although other players were selected as All-State and All-American performers through the years (including my brother Ralph, who played on the 1966 team that lost to Louisville Male in the semi-finals of the state tournament), there is only one player that is honored with his own display in our museum, and that is Corky Withrow. Until just recently, I actually assumed that Corky was already in the Hall of Fame and was surprised to learn that he had never been selected. I hope you will agree that his accomplishments as an outstanding Kentucky high school athlete make him deserving of this honor and that you will move toward his nomination for the 2010 KHSAA Hall of Fame additions.
