Harold Mullins was a pioneer for High School Sports Media in Eastern Kentucky. He and Hometown24 (formerly TV12) recognized the need to provide exposure for high school student athletes. In 1985, Harold and TV12 became the first video outlet in Eastern KY to regularly cover high school sports LIVE. Harold would play the biggest role, as he would be the voice of the broadcast. He would go on to become the voice of the mountains and the voice for the kids of Eastern Kentucky.

Since Harold's arrival, sports in Eastern KY have experienced a new level of excitement that has persisted for 38 years. Whether he was broadcasting over the radio or on your TV screen. Not only did Harold's voice resinate across the mountains in Eastern Kentucky, but it was heard across the country and even further. Once we hit the internet with our broadcast, it didn't take long for us to pick up viewers in other countries. Harold's voice drew in viewers from Newfoundland, Australia, New Zealand, and many more. Exposure for KHSAA Student Athletes was the idea, and Harold took it worldwide.

Unfortunately, many of you already know that Harold passed away soon after the KHSAA Sweet Sixteen state tournament, in April. He had been a dedicated spectator and commentator for the tournament since 1966, only missing it for the 4 years he served in the Air Force. For 53 years, Harold was either in the crowd as a fan or on press row, bringing the excitement of his voice to the airwaves. Those airwaves will never be the same. The love he had for the kids and the sports will leave a void that will never be filled.

Not only was Harold committed to his role as a commentator, but he also dedicated 17 years to refereeing. Harold also coached a lot of grade school sports and a few on the high school level. He dedicated his life to the student athletes of Eastern Kentucky.

Harold would make it a family affair, bringing his children and grandchildren to the games with him. I watched several times as his young grandchildren would crawl into his lap, and he would place the headset on them. Each time, he would just light up with joy.

When Covid came around and numbers were being limited in the gyms. Harold along with Hometown24 would once again be innovative. We would still bring coverage and exposure to the athletes of the 14th Region, but we would do it differently. We would send one employee to the gym with the camera and shoot the video back to the station, as Harold would call the game remotely. It was torture for Harold to not be there in person, but he understood the safety of the kids came first. After what seemed like every year, he would mention to me that he was going to retire to spend more time with his family. However, he loved the sports and kids in this area so much that he couldn't stay away. It was in his blood and such a huge part of his life that he simply couldn't quit. He was an ambassador for KHSAA sports and took pride in covering the kids. I imagine the number of kids he commentated for will never be counted, as it was a tremendous amount. Unfortunately, that excitement will never light up the airwaves again. But we hope that you will consider Harold for the Hall of Fame to help cement that excitement into the history of KHSAA sports.
