## Raceland Softball Chronology under Shawn Johnson

2008	Organized and Developed Raceland's first youth softball program, sharing a field with a summer baseball league
2009	With the aid of several parents and multiple fundraiser events, built a softball field on the Raceland-Worthington Ind. School District campus
2010	Lobbied and received a Little League Charter for the communities of Raceland-Worthington with 125 girls in the league, pulling from a school district of only 1,000 students K-12
2011-12	Became the Head Coach at Raceland-Worthington HS while still maintaining a strong influence on the newly established feeder program. Coach Johnson coached Little League, Freshman, JV, and varsity softball in the inaugural season.
2014	Started a string a 20+ win seasons that continued past his retirement
2015	Started video taping all games, practices and individual workouts which, at the time, was unheard of in high school softball. He used this technology to develop individual skills of all his players leading to the Rams improbable District Championship over Russell and a region victory over Rowan Co
2016	The 2016 Lady Rams saw a team with limited power and a slew of young talent who could run. Nathan Frisby, a Raceland grad and state champion sprinter was brought in during the winter to focus on making the team's natural speed more efficient through technique and training. This led to 125 stolen bases during the season, and a district runner up. This team also set a school record with 32 hit batters and 216 bases on balls. The 2016 team started the ascent of Raceland as one of the state's top run producers
2017	As the youth developed, so did the power. 2017 marked the season where the Lady Rams started focusing on exit velocity and power numbers through technology. Several school records were set during the season by the young Rams only to be overshadowed by the 2018 team. The work resulted in a district championship
2018	The work on power had come full circle with this team as they set 16 <sup>th</sup> region records in Runs/Inning, Runs/Season, Runs/Game, Hits/Game, Doubles/Game, Doubles/Season, HR/Inning, HR/Game, HR/Season, RBI's/Season, according to KHSAA stats. They also set state records with doubles in a season, and Emily Johnson tied the state record with 3 Grand Slams in a season. This, at the time,

was the most prolific offensive team in 16<sup>th</sup> region history. A strong All A State Tournament run, losing the Holy Cross in the finals, led to high post season expectations. A District Championship was only tarnished by a region semi-final loss to Montana Fouts and East Carter

2019

2019 tied the school record for wins 28 (w/2018) with great numbers falling just short of 2018 in many categories. Coach Johnson ended his coaching career with a loss to Ashland in the Region Finals
