# Justin Sharp – Kentucky Basketball Story

My basketball story began when I was in elementary school. About six or seven of us guys would play every day during recess and lunch. Our basketball court consisted of nothing but dirt. During the winter months, our teachers would take us to the restroom and run warm water over our hands to thaw them out. That is when my love for the game of basketball began, and I have never lost my love for the game.

In junior high school, I played on the seventh and eighth grade teams. "Duck" Carlton, a parent, coached us. In my eighth-grade year, our high school basketball coach became the principal at Earlington School, and the school board hired Robert "Bob" Fox as the basketball coach. Coach Larmouth had talked to Coach Fox about the fact that I was playing basketball outside in the cold during my elementary years. When the high school team started basketball practice, Coach Fox came to my eighth-grade classroom and told me to start coming to varsity practice.

During the first team meeting, Coach Fox said these words that I will never forget: "I don't care if your dad was a town drunk or the mayor. All I want from you is to play basketball." This was when I knew I had a chance to play. So, in 1963 as an eighth grader, I won a starting role on the varsity team.

Our record that year was 25-5. Our main player was Wesley Coffman, who went on to play for the University of Tennessee. I cannot find any record of what I accomplished as an eighth grader.

Our practices with Coach Fox were long – as much as three hours long. However, I never grew tired of practicing and improving. Coach Fox has had a lasting impact on my life. I visited him from time time to time throughout the years after high school, even traveling to see him in Florida when his health was declining. We both learned to like golf almost as much as he liked basketball.

My freshman year, 1963-64, Earlington went 19-9. We lost in the regionals. Our top player that year was Gary Gamble, who went on to play at the University of Kentucky.

My sophomore year, 1964-65, our record was 30-3. This was the year that Earlington and Earlington Million consolidated to become one school. One of the key players was Charles Moore who went on to play college basketball at Austin Peay. We won our district but lost in the finals of the regional tournament.

I was the only starting player to return for the 1965-66 season – my junior year. The other players moved up from junior varsity. Our record that year was 29-7. We won district, region, and made it to the Sweet 16. However, we lost to Harrison County in our first game.

1966-67, my senior year, we won thirty-eight games and lost only one (to Louisville Male by four points in the LIT Tournament). We won our district and our region; but, best of all, we won the Sweet Sixteen State Tournament. That season, as a team, we averaged 79 points per game and held our opponents to an average of 53 points per game (Attachment #3). During the state tournament we beat Russell County (76-72), Louisville Atherton (85-64), Breathitt County (69-64), and Covington Catholic (54-53).

During the state tournament, Coach Adolph Rupp of the University of Kentucky called our team's defense the best that he had ever seen. For two years, we had full court pressed every team the entire ball game.

During my final three years in high school, I didn't play but about three-fourths of every game because we were so far ahead of the opponents! Earlington's combined record for the five years I played varsity was 141-25. During my senior year, I set a school record by grabbing thirty-one rebounds in one game.

Since high school, I have maintained contact with nearly all my former teammates. We got together in Lexington on the fiftieth anniversary of our state championship. We had a wonderful time reminiscing. Since then, we have developed a group text and keep up with each other's highs and lows. Last summer (2023), many of us traveled to Earlington to visit our old school and gym one last time before it closed for good. No matter what happens to that building, I'll always consider myself an Earlington Yellow Jacket.
