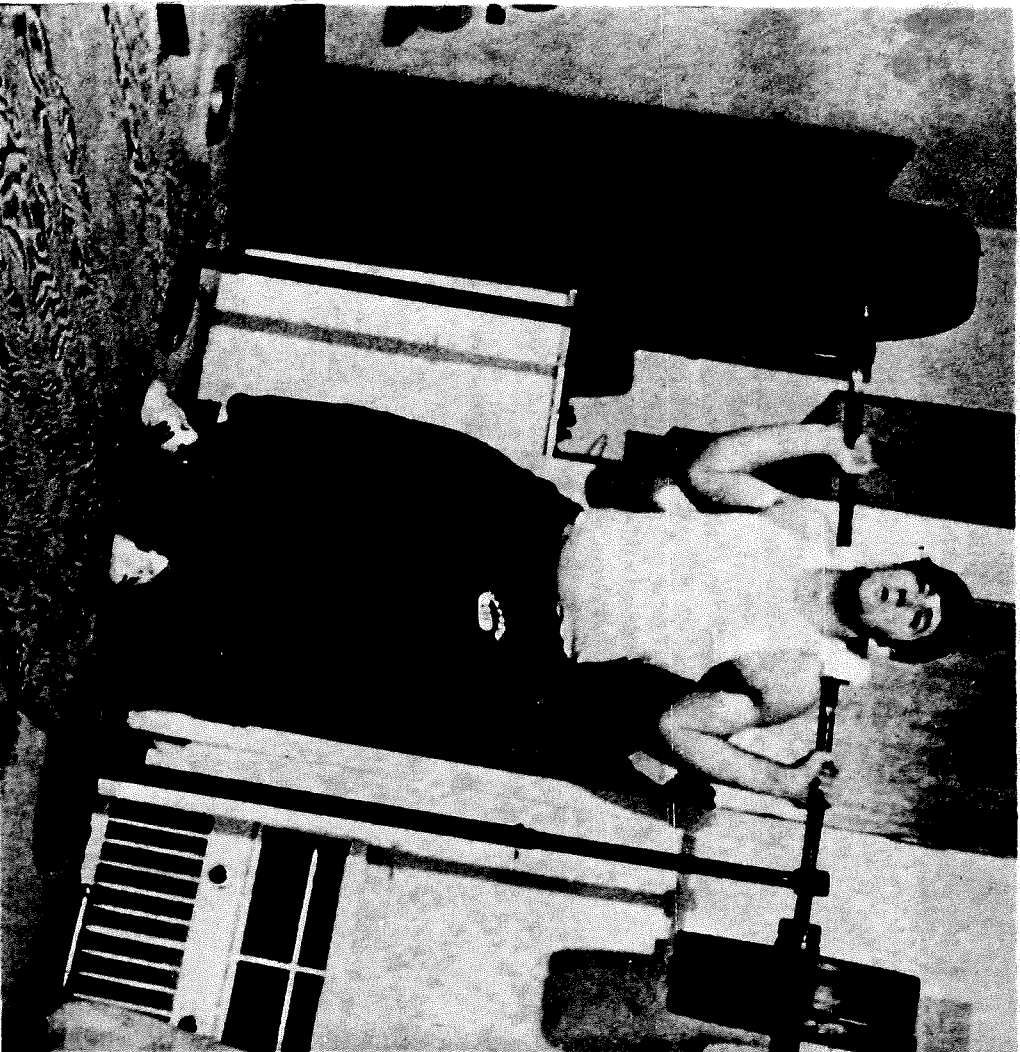

John's first weight lifting meet was in December of 1966 when he competed in the 198 pound class of the Ohio Valley High School Championship in Louisville. He surprised even his dad and brother by taking first place. Less than a month later, in January of 1967, John was grabbing another first place trophy, this time in the heavyweight class of the Ohio Valley Teenage Championships.

After a third place finish in the heavyweight division of the Cincinnati Open, and a fourth place spot in the Teenage Nationals at Youngstown, Ohio, in July of 1967, John

Stuart Adds Kentucky Lift Title

Glasgow weightlifter John Stuart, a senior at Glasgow High, added another title to a growing list of weightlifting plaudits Saturday when he won the 242 pound class of the Kentucky Weightlifting Championships held at Mallicks Gym in Louisville.

Stuart's three lift total of 930 pounds is a new state record, as were each of the lifts making up the total. John was also awarded the Best Lifter award, which is determined by a comparison of weight lifted to body weight of the lifter.

John's three lifts were 340 pounds in the clean and jerk, 260 pounds in the snatch, and 330 in the press. The press total and the 930 combined total both top the listed National Teenage Meet records, but will not count as records because they weren't gained in the National Meet itself. Stuart plans to compete in the National Teenage event at Philadelphia later in the year.

David Harbison of Summer Shade, son of Mr. and Mrs. G.H. Harbison, and John's youngest brother Howard also completed in the meet Saturday and did well. David won the 132 pound class with a three lift total of 515 pounds, and Howard was third in the 113 pound class with a total of 205 pounds.

All three boys represented the Glasgow Athletic Club, a newly formed group to promote interest in weightlifting and track and field.

Stuart Hurls Shot 64-6, GHS Thinlies Gain First '68 Win

Led by a tremendous performance by shot putter John Stuart, coach Bob Driver's Glasgow High track squad opened the 1968 season with a top sided triangular win over Hiseville and Temple Hill at Scottie Field Wednesday. The final score was 91 for Glasgow 59 for Hiseville and 34 for Temple Hill. The Scotties won all but three of the 17 events.

But the biggest noise was belovved by Stuart, an 18 year old senior. His heave of 64 feet, six and three-quarter inches best the existing state record for the shot put by almost six feet. The ton won't go down on the books as a record, however, as only tosses recorded in the state meet are awarded that honor.

Stuart's effort was the longest ever recorded in the state, and amazingly, the second longest also hit the turf Wednesday, coming off the hand of John's younger brother Jesse. Jesse's ton was 59-11.

Other notable efforts were turned in by Tony Smith of Hiseville, who won the high hurdles in 16.2 seconds and the low hurdles in 21.7, and Gerard Johnson of Glasgow, who topped the triple jumpers with a leap of 40 feet, one inch.

Temple Hill's lone win came in the pole vault, where Lannie Milker vaulted 10 feet, one inch to nudge Ron Walbert of Glasgow by one inch.

Other Glasgow winners included Pen Fears in the 100 yard dash, Bruce Trabue in the 220, Dennis Ball in the 440, Tim Gillewater in the 880, Steve Lewis in the mile, Bob Staples in the two-mile, Jerry Dunn in the long jump, Rex Bailey in the high jump, John Stuart in the discus, and Glasgow in the 880, mile, and freshman relays.

Another triangular meet is scheduled here Friday, with Park City and Temple Hill coming to Scottie Field. The meet will get underway at 3:30.

Brother Act Ended In Tragedy

NEW YORK — (NEA) — In the late '50s, when Southern California was blazing the comeback trail in college football, the Trojans had their own version of the Dynamic Duo: Mike and Marlin McKeever.

Both had been schoolboy All-Americans at Mt. Carmel High in Los Angeles. Both were All-Americans at USC. Marlin, the offensive end, was the Rams' first round draft choice. He played with LA

was a versatile performer, both physically and mentally. He placed fourth in the shot-put and discus in the conference track and field championships. He had the highest academic average on the USC team, as well as the highest defensive statistics grade.

Although Mike became the subject of controversy because of his rugged, sometimes brutal, tactics that put a couple of opponents out of action, he was selected as the club's most inspirational player and was chosen team captain his senior year.

McKeever only saw action in the first half of his final season, however. He received

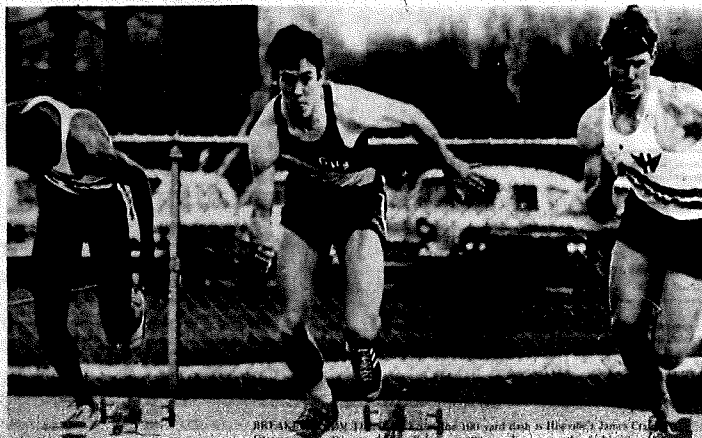

RUNNERS WERE ON THEIR MARK, the gun sounded and the 1968 edition of high school track began in Glasgow Wednesday afternoon. Glasgow High, Hienville High, and Temple Hill High clashed together at Glasgow High School's track with the Scottie track men coming out on top with 91 points. Hienville finished second with 39, and Temple Hill was third with 34 points.

There were plenty of surprises in the meet: Gerrard Johnson won the triple jump with a leap of 40 feet, 1 inch; John Stuart tossed the shot put the longest any high schooler has ever tossed it in the state; Bobby Staples turned in a good 10:56.2 time in the two mile run, and Hienville's Tony Smith stepped over the 120 yard high hurdles in 16.2 seconds. Stress and strain on the high school tracksters were evident—and a long season is still ahead. Another meet is scheduled for Friday afternoon here between Glasgow, Park City, and Temple Hill.

Slow Times Mark Five Team Meet

Gusty winds played havoc with most of the times, but the superiority of the Glasgow track squad nevertheless proved too much for four other schools engaged in a five way meet at the local oval Tuesday afternoon.

The Scotties won 11 of 17 events in scoring 77 points. Runner-up Taylor County was far back with 38½. It was a close battle for third, and

Bowling Green with 23 points, won it, Hiseville was next with 22½, and Campbellsville had 20.

Only two events had what could be called top flight performances. The wind simply prohibited anything better. John Stuart got off a toss of 148 feet, one inch in winning the discus (his best toss of the year), and Jerry Dunn soared 21 feet, one inch in winning the long jump. Both are Glasgow performers. Stuart's 60-11¼ in the shot put is also a fine effort, but his best toss has been almost six feet more than what it was Tuesday.

Tony Smith of Hiseville and Jerry Arnett of Taylor County were the only boys besides Stuart who gained double wins. Smith captured the high and low hurdles, and Arnett was the winner in the 220 and 440

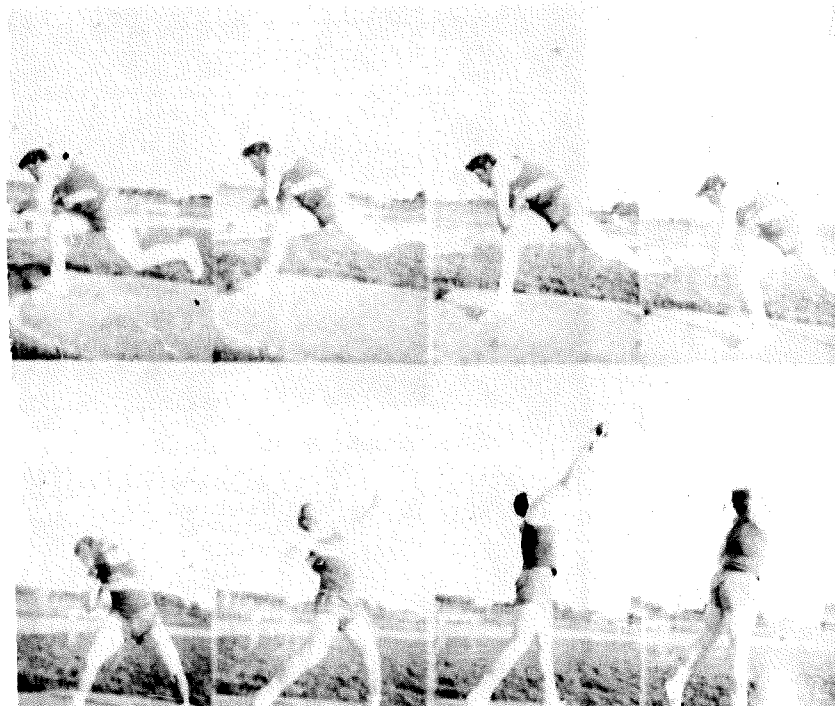
