Stuart Double Win Paces GHS To State's 5th Spot; Lewis 3rd

He was supposed to win the shot put, but Glasgow's John Stuart was only the second choice in the Class AA division's discus event in the state track and field meet at Lexington Saturday. But Stuart, an 18 year old senior, fooled everybody by winning both the shot and discus in record setting performances.

The double win by Stuart paced Glasgow to its finest hour in track and field as the Scotties placed and earned points in all five of the events they had representatives in and gained fifth place in the meet. A total of 27 schools had boys in the AA division, and only Paducah Tilghman, Lexington Bryan Station, Newport Catholic, and Owensboro scored more than Glasgow's 17 points. Tilghman was an easy winner with 34 points, but the Scotties were only five points away from Bryan Station's 22 for second. Catholic scored 21, and Owensboro 20.

Belleview ran away with the Class A title, scoring 49 points to beat distant runner-ups Harlan and Lexington Catholic,

who had 17 apiece. Area representatives Hiseville and Caverna scored three and two points respectively in Class A. Cards Tony Smith and Henry Wood took fourth and fifth in the low hurdles and 440 yard dash, and the Caverna 880 and mile relay teams were fifth in both events.

Stuart won the shot put with ease, setting a new state record of 62 feet, 11 inches. John had hoped to break the old record of 58-9 by more than he did, but the fact that the shot was contested Saturday morning when the weather was damp and chilly might have had something to do with his falling below expectations.

John finished far above expectations in the discus, however, as his 157-9 effort set a new AA mark. Tom Gaebler of Bourbon County, who'd thrown 174-2 in the regional the week before, was the favorite, but Gaebler fouled on three of his first four throws, and never really got a good toss. Stuart seemed to unravel Gaebler when he recorded his best toss on his second throw.

Gaebler did manage to hit 157-7, but it wasn't enough.

Glasgow had entries in three other events, and did well in all three. Steve Lewis clocked 4:35 flat in the mile run, and was nipped at the wire by Bob Woods of Shelby County for second place. Lewis had second all to himself coming into the final turn, but was unaware that Woods was making a move and just didn't have enough left to stop him.

Staples clocks 10:09.2

Bob Staples finished fifth in the two-mile run, recording his best time of the season with a 10:09.2 clocking. His previous best had been 10:32.2 in the regional last week.

The Scottie mile relay team, composed of Lewis, Tim Gillwater, Gerard Johnson, and Rex Bailey also ran its best time of the season in timing 3:33.9. Bailey appeared boxed in and headed for a seventh place finish on the last leg of the event, but sprinted around Elizabethtown and Ashland runners to gain the point for the Scotties.

Tompkinsville's Bill Bushong added further glory to himself and his school by winning the Class A shot put with a heave of 51 feet, 2½ inches. Bill was more than four feet ahead of the second place finisher. Bushong also took third in the discus with a throw of 129 feet flat, and his two excellent finishes gave the Bears nine points and a tie for 11th place in the Class A division.

John Embree added another laurel to his Glasgow Region when he captured the triple jump with a three leap total of 44 feet, 11 inches. Embree was fourth in the long jump, never successfully hitting the take-off board, with a jump of 20 feet, eight inches.

Franklin-Simpson hurdler Jerry Valentine placed third in the 120 yard high hurdles, and was fifth in the 180 yard lows.



John Stuart Is Selected To Compete In California Meet

Glasgow shot putter John Stuart, who set a new state record in his specialty in the state track and field meet last week, has been notified of his selection to compete in the ninth annual Golden West Invitational Track and Field Championship in Sacramento, California on June 15th.

Invitations to the Golden West event are coveted by the best high school track and field seniors in the country because only the top eight boys in each of the 16 prep events are asked to come. The meet's selection committee utilizes an independent nationwide

"network" of advisory coaches and sportswriters to assist it in identifying for invitation the most outstanding performers from throughout the U.S.

Nation's third best

Only two boys have beaten Stuart's best effort of 66 feet, five and three-quarters inches this year. John's new state record is 62-11. His selection for the prestigious meet marks the first time an area athlete has been selected to compete. Jim Green of Eminence and Lonnie Hance of Louisville were selected last year, and Mike McMannon of Newport was also

selected this year but had to decline because of an injury.

Expenses for the competitors while in Sacramento are paid by the meet promoters, but John is charged with meeting the expense of going to and from California. Stuart Tosses 64-10 In California Meet

He went in ranked as the third best high school shot putter in the country, and that's the way John Stuart of Glasgow came out at the conclusion of the prestigious Golden West Invitational track and field meet Saturday night in Sacramento, California.

Only the top performers in each event were invited to the meet, and Stuart would be the first to tell you that indeed, the competition was rather first class. Despite the fact that John got off his second best toss with the 12 pound ball of the year, he was beaten by high school competitors for the first time this season. Stuart's best mark Saturday was 64 feet, 10 and three-quarter inches, the best he had done since early April.

But it wasn't enough. Sam Walker of Dallas won the event with a toss of 69-8½, establishing a new meet record. Walker had been ranked as the number one prep shot putter in the country on the strength of a 72-3 toss he got off earlier in the year. Sam didn't quite reach the magic 70 foot mark Saturday, but it's doubtful that any of the 32,000 paid fans on hand for the Golden West event were disappointed. Second

went to Doug Lane of Cedar Rapids, Iowa with a toss of 65-10½. Lane also maintained his national ranking in the head to head confrontation, coming into the meet with the second best throw in the country.

Stuart called father Dr. John N. Stuart of Glasgow at 3:30 a.m. Sunday morning to inform him of his finish. The elder Stuart had instructed his son to relay the information home after the meet, no matter what time it had to be. Said Dr. Stuart, "From the way he talked on the phone, it sounded to me as if John may have warmed up a little too hard. He said he got off one toss in warm-up that was 69 feet. And in the competition he had a 67 footer that he just barely scratched on. But considering everything, I'm sure that he must have been pleased to finish third in a meet of such good boys. I know that I was very pleased."

Henderson County pole vaulter Mark Norworthy was the only other Kentucky boy in the meet, and having what must have been a bad day, finished in a tie for 11th place. Both Stuart and Norworthy have signed scholarships with the University of Kentucky.

John Stuart Sets National Teenage Weightlifting Mark

John Stuart of Glasgow is only 19 years old, but the son of Dr. and Mrs. John N. Stuart has a way with things heavy. Already the holder of the Kentucky state prep record for the 12 pound shot put, as well as a recent third place finish in the same event in the prestigious Golden West Invitational meet in Sacramento, California, John tried another test of strength this weekend in Philadelphia. And as we said, John Stuart has a way with things heavy.

Establishing a new national record on the way, John was crowned the champion of the Teenage National Weightlifting Championships Saturday in the 242 pound class. The event had a division for teenagers heavier than 242 pounds, but Stuart's total for three Olympic lifts was greater than the winning effort in the Heavyweight Class. And as mentioned earlier, Stuart's three lift performance established him as the all-time best in teenage weightlifting.

Actually, Stuart established two new national records. One was for the three lift total of 940 pounds, and the other was for one of the lifts. John's total of 330 in the press was 15 pounds above the old teenage record of 315, and it was the press that actually won the title for him. Second place finisher Ed O'Brien of Sayreville, New Jersey outlifted John in two of the three Olympic lifts, but was no match for Stuart in the press. O'Brien was credited with 350 pounds in the clean and jerk, and John had 340. The New Jersey 19 year older pulled up 280 pounds in the snatch, and Stuart

But in the press, John was clearly the superior boy. John's 330 beat O'Brien by 45 pounds, as Ed could manage only 285. So it was Stuart's clear cut superiority in what many weightlifters consider the toughest lift that gave him the title. O'Brien's three lift total of 915 pounds matched Stuart's effort last year when he competed in the 198 pound class.

House burns

It would seem that fate is also playing a "heavy" hand with the Stuarts these days as well. John and his father arrived in Glasgow from Philadelphia just in time, early Monday morning to see the Glasgow Fire Department finishing the job of extinguishing a fire in the Stuart residence on West Washington Street. The elder Stuart operates a chiropractic office and studio in the basement of the residence, and the fire claimed the office and studio almost completely. The family's living quarters upstairs were saved by what Stuart said was "great work by the fire department." But at any rate, the Stuart family is now living at a local motel at least temporarily.

It was a heavy finish for what had been a heavy weekend for Dr. John Stuart and family. John's younger brother Jesse set a new record for the Jaycee Junior Champ shot put event in Bowling Green Saturday. For details of Jesse's performance, see story elsewhere on this page.
