## Lady Scotties win 2008 state title

**BOWLING GREEN** — Going into this week's girls golf state championship, Glasgow coach Mike Harris said his squad had the mental toughness to persevere.

He wasn't kidding.

After enduring a 4-plus hour rain delay on Tuesday, playing more than 25 holes each on Wednesday until darkness hit, putting up with the uncertainty of the tournament's length due to weather issues and then finally having to come back Thursday morning to finish off the final round, the Lady Scotties came out on top.

Glasgow built a 12-shot lead heading into the final half round and held off last year's state champion, West Jessamine, down the stretch to claim the school's fifth girls golf state title Thursday morning at Bowling Green Country Club.

"I couldn't be any prouder of a group of girls than what I've got right now," Harris said. "To go through what they've gone through the last three days — all the distractions, all the roadblocks. That tells you what kind of character that this team has. I love each one of them. It's hard to describe."

The Lady Scotties shot a two-round total of 664 as a team to hold off last

Laura Beth Harris, the coach's daughter, said. "It was very nerve-wracking, but very sad too because it's mine and Kristen's last one. But it's very exciting too. (I'm) very proud of all of us."

Kristen Wilkinson led the Lady Scotties with a two-round total of 162. Blair Dennison shot a 163, Laura Beth Harris had a 169, Kylie Foushee shot a 170 and Shannon Bishop finished with a 194.

Nothing was easy in the tournament. Glasgow was close to teeing off early Tuesday afternoon for the first round when rain and thunderstorms hit the area, which delayed the tournament for over four hours. When the Lady Scotties finally got started, they barely got in just over three holes each when darkness halted play.

Glasgow came back Wednesday morning to finish the first round with the rest of the day uncertain. With a spotty weather situation, the KHSAA wasn't scheduled to make a decision on the second round until later in the day.

The Lady Scotties finished the first round with a two shot lead over West Jessamine, 330 to 332. Scott County was nine shots back at 339.

Wilkinson led Glasgow with an 8-over par 80 in the first round. Dennison shot an 81, Foushee had an 83, Laura Beth Harris added an 86 and

"We were sitting up here in the clubhouse about to start again, discussing how we were all playing better at the end (of the first round)," Wilkinson said. "And we were like, OK, if we were playing better at the end that means we're going to go out here and play well and we did. I think everybody was playing good yesterday (Wednesday)."

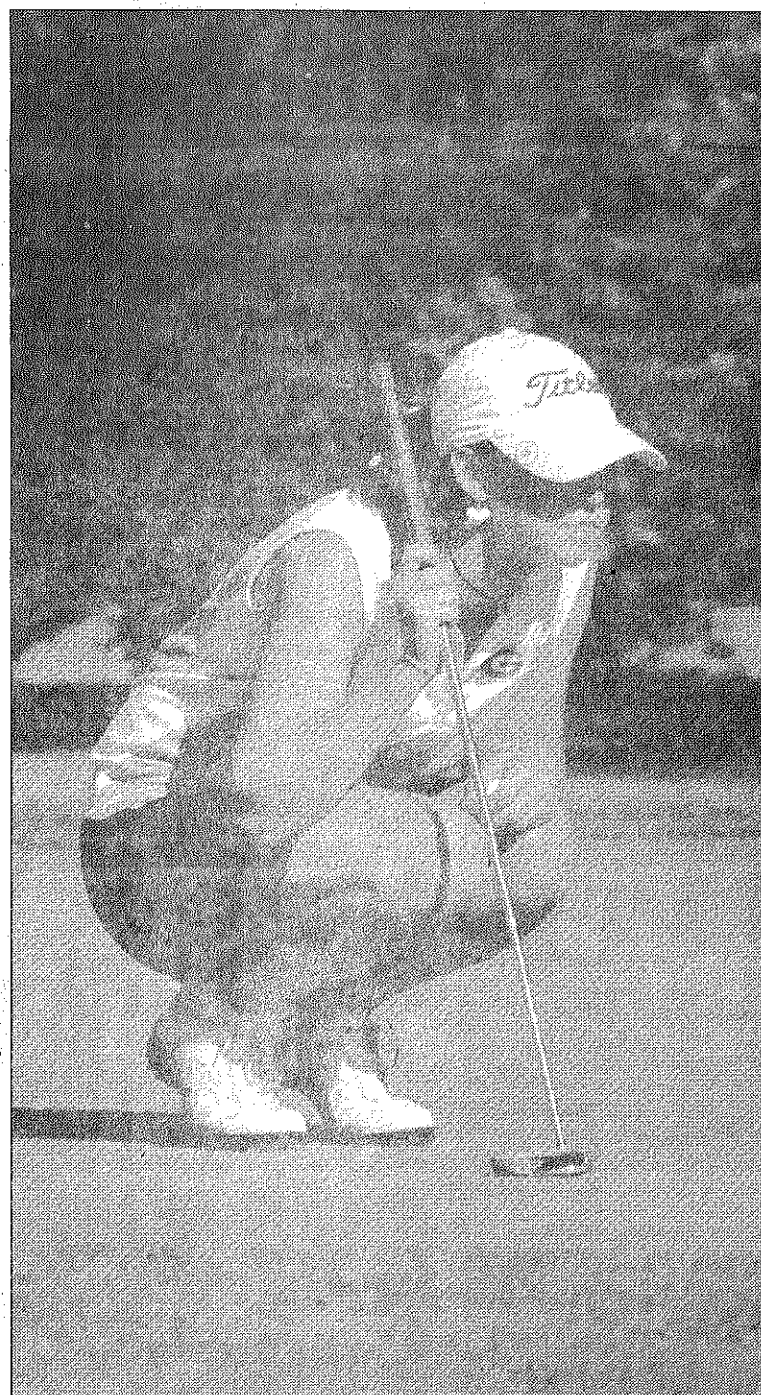
And the Lady Scotties did. They extended their lead by 10 strokes from the end of the first round through just over the half way point of the second round, taking a 12 stroke advantage when darkness halted play on Wednesday.

"I thought we had things really going last (Wednesday) night when we stopped," coach Harris said. "You hate to stop because of darkness, because I felt like when we made the turn last night is really what jump-started us."

Wilkinson was officially 2-over through nine holes when play was halted. Dennison was 6-over through 12 holes, Laura Beth Harris was 7-over, Bishop was 11-over and Foushee was 13-over.

"We knew that we couldn't be like, well we had it," Laura Beth Harris said. "We just had to get a good night's rest and come out in the morning and be ready to play."

# Glasgow wins golf title again

RICHMOND — Glasgow took home its third consecutive team championship during the Girls' State Golf Tournament at Arlington Country Club yesterday.

But the fun didn't end there for the Scotties. Glasgow racked up another state title when senior Morgan Hapney won individual honors. Hapney shot a 78 yesterday to finish at 157 for the tournament.

Right behind Hapney was freshman Whitney Wade, who garnered her third straight runner-up trophy by finishing two shots back at 159.

Hapney shot an even-par 36 on the back nine to rebound from a 6-over-par 42 on the front.

"I was awful (on the front)," Hapney said. "I three-putted twice and just wasn't on top of my game. But on the back I just told myself I had to play better, and I birdied No. 10. If you birdie on this course, you're doing fantastic."

The only worry the Scotties had yesterday was whether they'd have room to display all their trophies.
