Dear KHSAA Selection Committee,

It is my honor to be the person nominating Rick Chasteen for the KHSAA Hall of Fame. Rick has left an invaluable mark on officiating in the great state of Kentucky, both in his 39 years as an on-court official, and in his years as the assigning secretary for the Bluegrass Basketball Association.

Just this fall we hit 25 years since a young kid from Cynthiana who had no idea what he was doing joined his dad, Tony Williams, and Rick Chasteen for a day of multiple scrimmages at Bourbon County High School where the four of us would rotate in and out in a 3-person crew, which at the time was very new to high school officiating. One day on the court watching what seemed like someone who was bigger than life to the profession show me his tricks and I was instantly hooked. For that year I went to as many of his games as I could, went to eat with him after, and did everything I could to just get one bit of new knowledge each time I was around him. I noticed how he handled the student athletes, communicated with the coaches, and most notably the respect he had from all over the state of Kentucky. In a profession where someone goes home not liking you nearly every night, I rarely saw them go home and not respect his work. Doing the right thing is hard sometimes and he taught me this from the very beginning.

Rick had an on-court career that a Kentucky High School Basketball Official can only dream of. Ten state tournaments over the course of four different decades, Nineteen All A State Tournaments, working games in ten of our sixteen regional tournaments, being named KHSAA outstanding basketball official, and rising to the level of supervisor to mentor and advance too many to mention here.

Little did I know I would only spend one year watching him work on the court. After that season he was named our assigning secretary in the BBA and I began working varsity games that next year. Over the next ten years nothing changed for me. I wanted him at every game if I could, knowing that was not a possibility. Not every postgame would go how I or my fellow officials liked, but that's part of learning and growing as an official. When you get things right, it is because you are supposed to, and when you get things wrong then the hard part begins. We

rode up and down countless roads through the 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> regions, and even if he disagrees, I tried to listen as much as I could instead of speak. It seems like just yesterday I saw what felt like a Godfather-like figure sitting in the corner watching me work an elimination district game between top 10 teams, or the call the next day at work to say you need to try to see where officiating can take you. Little did he know how much that meant or how much 20 years later it still inspires me to be the best I can be.

His last year as supervisor I got to experience one of the greatest accomplishments to this day of my entire career, getting to work "the greatest show in hoops." There is simply nothing like the KHSAA Sweet 16 and I try to tell others around the country every chance I get. I still remember the feeling that I was ready before the call came, but he taught me the greatest lesson at that age, and that is you always want to get the call as an official one year later than you think you are ready for any assignment. There is no substitute for experience in our business. And when someone is thrown into a position they are not ready for and the experience is bad it is tough for the official to ever get back to that level. It was a tough lesson to learn those early years, but holding me back and knowing when I was ready instead of me going at my pace is the reason I am where I am today.

In summary, I never say any one individual is more deserving than another for anything. However, there is no individual who has ever worn the stripe shirt in the state of Kentucky who deserves the Hall of Fame more than Rick Chasteen. He is as respected as much as any High School official I ever saw from Paducah to Pikeville. Thank you for your consideration of this so deserving candidate.
