It felt right and – in particular – couldn't be blocked. During a scrimmage, a guard on his team lofted a high pass toward Cooper. He leaped, caught it, and then – in his anxiety to avoid a block – shot it, all in one motion, before he landed."

The Corydon boys won the Class B boys' championship from McHenry by trouncing the McHenry lads by 42 to 22. The scoring combination of Cooper and Cartwright was just too much for the McHenry team. Cooper made seven field goals and Cartwright made eight.

Providence, Class A girls, and Utica, Class B, girls, also won the right to play in the State meet. Providence downed Hardinsburg, 17 to 11, and Utica topped Corydon, 18 to 16. Corydon defeated West Louisville, State champion last year, in the first round yesterday.

The Corydon boys won the Class B boys' title by trouncing McHenry, 42 to 22.

 Danville, Ky., March 10.—Kavanaugh High of Lawrenceburg, picked almost unanimously as a finalist in the State tournament, went out of the race this afternoon in the Class A boys finals, here, Danville High was the victor, 18 to 15.

The Lawrenceburg City High boys won the Class B title from Junction City, 28 to 18.

The Danville Admirals won the girls' Class A crown, stopping the Frankfort five in the Class A girls' finals, by 18 to 9. The game was marked by close guarding. Frankfort rallied in the last few minutes, but failed.

The Junction City girls won the title in B division, topping the Lawrenceburg Misses, 16 to 11.

Lawrenceburg won the regional championship in the boys' division by upsetting Danville, 21-15. Lawrenceburg assumed a 16-11 lead at the half and held it the rest of the game. The Danville girls copied the girls' championship by downing Junction City, 23-13.

Danville opened the scoring with a crisp by Guthrie late in the first quarter. Polsgrove, Kavanaugh, forward, retaliated with another crisp and then White scored a nice one for Kavanaugh from the sidelines. Hill shot from near mid-floor to again knot the count and J Sale made a free throw to give Kavanaugh a 5 to 4 advantage as the first quarter ended.

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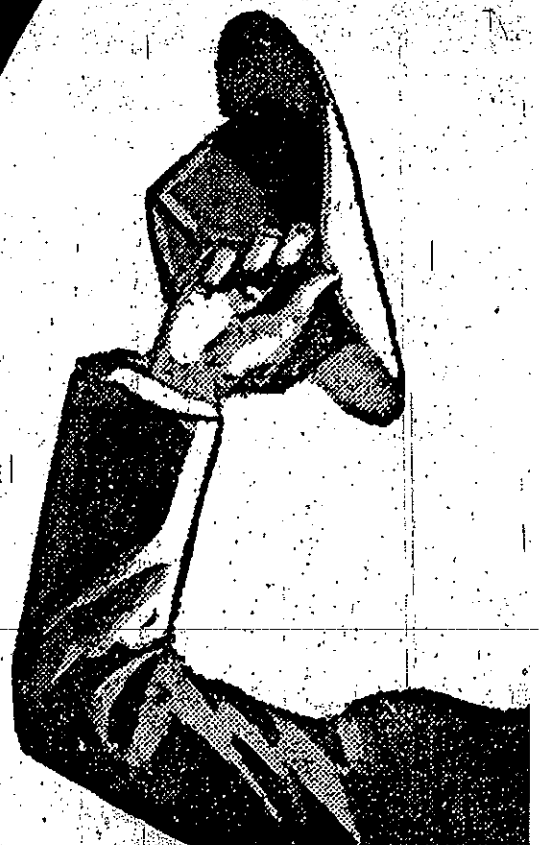

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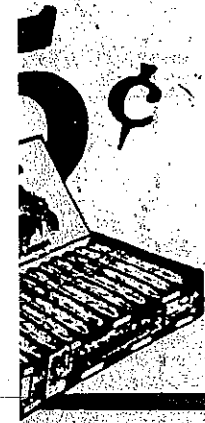

Carr Creek Is Nervous.

Carr Creek, seventh regional Class B Boys' winner, and coming to the State meet with no coach marked itself as the dark horse of the tournament in taking Walton. The team was visibly nervous as the contest started and was behind 3 to 2 at the close of the first period. It stepped out a little in the second stanza and garnered six points to lead 8 to 5 at the half. When play was resumed after the rest the team played as it is reputed to have performed in its district and regional battles, gaining the ascendancy 18 to 8 at the three-quarter mark. Thirteen points were registered in the closing stanza, Madden, with twelve points, and Stamper, with eleven, starred for Carr Creek, although the entire squad played surprisingly well. B. Adams, center, although he is many inches shorter than his opposing pivot man, out-jumped him continually.

Lawrenceburg Not Pressed.

La Grange at no time was a serious threat to Lawrenceburg, the team that beat Kavanaugh among other strong contenders for honors in the district meet. Thompson claimed fifteen points for Lawrenceburg, to lead the scorers. Muse, who substituted for Abbott, gained ten points for La Grange and was the most effective player on the team. Captain Cassaday played the game despite an injury to his foot suffered in the regional at Louisville, where the squad beat Bethlehem for the Class B title.

Woodburn eked out her win over Wickliffe in the last few minutes of play. Wickliffe led 25 to 20 with two minutes to go. At that point Bass and Dewese, Wickliffe players, were sent to the showers on personals, and Woodburn came to within one point of a tie. Celsor sank a crisp field goal to win the game as the whistle blew.

Minerva's boys found Corydon tough in the first half of their contest during the morning round, but crashed through in the last half to increase their 11 to 10 lead at the half to 34 to 14 at the close of the battle. Smoot sank the sphere for a total of eighteen points to lead the Minerva scorers.

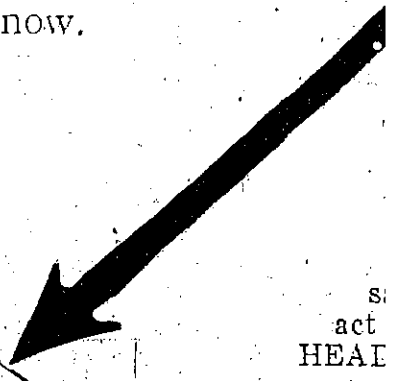
St. X. Decide Not To Forfeit.

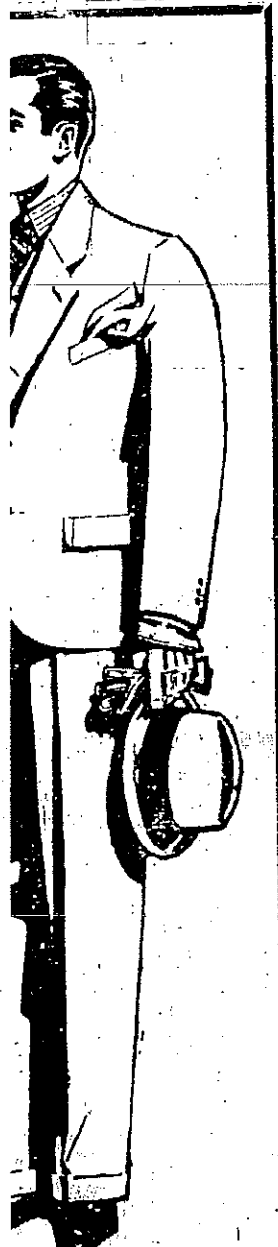

1912—Abe Attell Quits During Bout

The bout had become exciting. Attell was tottering on his pins.

At the gong Kirk sprang forward to finish the one-time champ. But Attell waved him aside and strode to the ropes.
"I'm through," Attell cried to the fans through battered lips, "In not only quitting this bout right now, but I'm retiring from the ring forever."

His tears splashed to the canvas. Fans, sore because the bout wasn't finished (Kirk was giving Abe a fine shelling up to then) but feeling a bit sorry for the old battler, went home to spread the news that Abe had quit in one of the most dramatic retirements the ring had seen.

But Abe hadn't quit. Far from it. He had just saved himself further punishment, having been caught by a husky opponent when he (Attell) was out of condition.

Within six months Attell met Kirk again in the east and knocked Ollie kicking in three rounds. He fought half a dozen more times before finally hanging up the mitts for good. That was in 1914.

Norman Wagner Leads Attack on St. Louisans, Scoring 16 Points

2 MORE GAMES THIS WEEK IN COLUMBIA

COLUMBIA, Mo., Jan. 6. (AP)—Successful in the first of their three games this week against the Washington Bears of St. Louis last night by a 37 to 27 score, the University of Missouri Tigers today began preparations for tomorrow night's clash here with Creighton and their Big Six engagement Saturday with the Kansas Aggies.

Norman Wagner, whom Coach George Edwards shifted this season to center from a forward position where he starred a year ago, led the Tiger attack last night, sinking seven field goals and adding a pair of free throws for high scoring honors.

Wagner's two field goals and free throw within the first minute of play gave the Missourians a 5 to 0 advantage, but the Bears came back to tie the count at 12—all at the half.

Four goals from the field in rapid succession by the towering Tiger center at the opening of the final period, while Washington made but a free throw, gave Missouri a 20 to 13 advantage and from then on the Tigers coasted to victory.

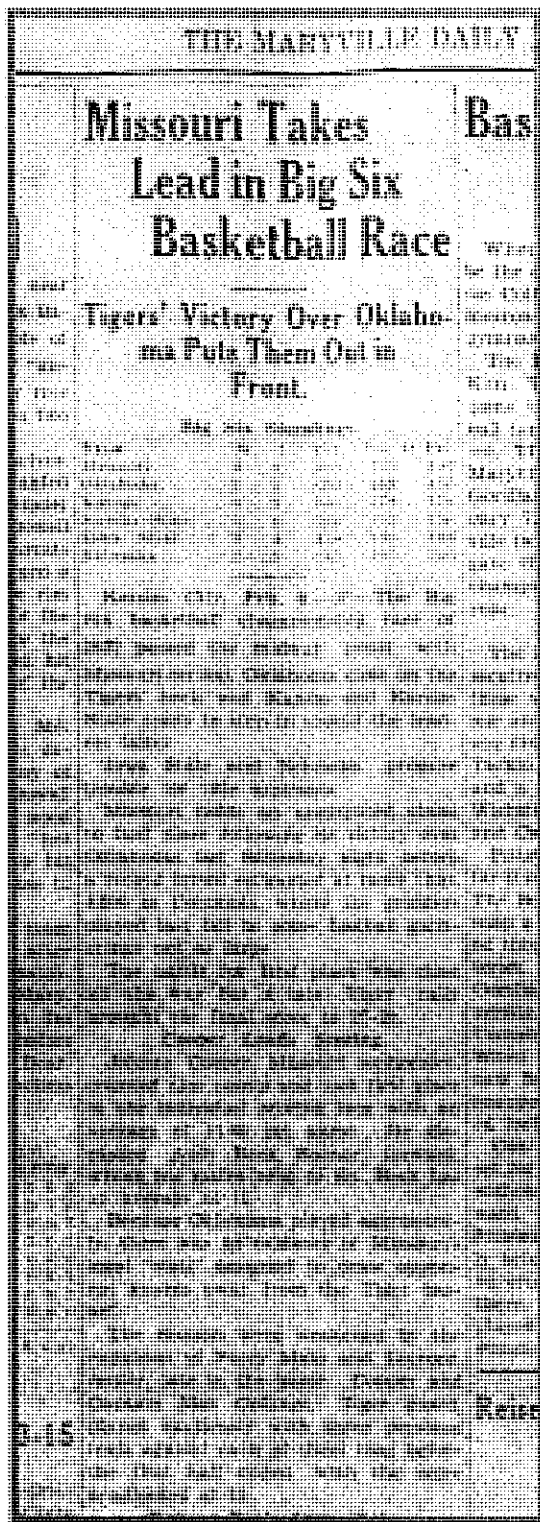

Missouri Takes Lead in Big Six Conference Basketball Race.

COLUMBIA, MO., Jan. 14—(AP)—Led by Johnny Cooper, the University of Missouri Tigers went into the lead in the Big Six Conference basketball race here tonight by defeating Iowa State College 29 to 22.

They remain the only undefeated team as the Oklahoma Sooners were victorious over the Kansas Jayhawks, who like the Cyclones, were given their first setback in conference competition.

Cooper, who last year tied for conference scoring honors, sank five field goals and a pair of free throws, but was matched with a like number of shots by Waino Wegner, Cyclone center.

George Edwards' cagers, who were off to a lead when Captain Norman Wegner converted two set-ups, were ahead all the way, although the proteges of Louis Mouze were only just a point behind early in second half. At the intermission Missouri had 11-to-7 advantage.

Wegner's ability to get rebound shots kept the Iowans in the running. Four times in the final period he took the ball off the bank-board and scored the last time sending his teammates to within two points of the Tigers.

At this period, when Missouri was leading, 20 to 18 the Tigers started playing a delayed attack, pulling the Cyclones out from under their basket, and worked ball in with greater ease. Missouri went into 29 to 20 lead just before Adolph Ludwig scored as the game ended.

Wagner was right on the trail of Cooper and Wegner in the scoring, sinking four field goals and two free throws for ten points.

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MISSOURI TIGERS LEAD CONFERENCE

Defeat Iowa State to Take First Place

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Jan. 16— (U.P.)—The Missouri Tigers stood alone today at the top of the Big Six conference basketball heap, undefeated in two starts, but with a long hard row to hoe before a championship will be in sight.

The Tigers defeated a game Iowa State team Saturday night, 29 to 22, while the Kansas Jayhawkers, previously unbeaten, found a tartar in the Oklahoma Sooners, and lost, 23 to 25 to surrender their claim to first place standing.

In the night's other game, Nebraska, oft-trampled in the last two seasons, came through to its first conference victory of the season, trimming the Kansas Aggies, 31 to 25.

Thus far the Aggies have been unsuccessful in three starts, and they hold undisputed claim to the cellar post.

By virtue of the Missouri victory, conference interest in the coming week will hinge upon the Missouri-Kansas game Thursday night at Lawrence. Any game between these traditional rivals is bound to be good, and in this one the Jayhawks will be seeking to pull the visitors from Columbia out of first place, and to reassert their claim to that ranking.

Missouri was a much improved team Saturday, as Johnny Cooper, ace forward of last season, announced his return to form by looping through five field goals and a pair of charity tosses to share high scoring honors with Wegner, sophomore center of Iowa State.

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Sords Missouri Cagers Risk Big Six Lead at K. U.

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 19.—Coach George Edwards and eight members of his University of Missouri basketball squad advanced on Lawrence, Kansas today for a game tonight with Dr. F. C. Allen's Kansas Jayhawkers with the Big Six conference leadership at stake.

Victory for the defending champion Jayhawks would send them ahead of the Tigers, who are now leading the league with victories over Nebraska and Iowa State, and no defeats.

Edwards' starting lineup, as announced after another secret practice in Columbia places Barney Passer, a 5 foot, 2 inch player at one of the forward posts, instead of Douglas Elgin. Johnny Cooper will man the other forward spot, Norman Wagner will play center and two veteran guards, George Stuber and Denver Miller, will undertake the defense at the start.

The reserves on the trip are Elgin, Woody Halfeld and Kenneth Jorgensen. The Missouri coach is expected to assign the tall Captain Wagner to guard Bill Johnson, the leading scorer in the conference, but it was conceded Johnson probably would control the tip over the Tiger pivot man.

The game is expected to provide a test of the new rules, which are favored by Coach Allen and opposed by Coach Edwards. Allen said he would instruct his cagers to break up any attempt of the Tigers to play a delayed offense, or stall, as Allen characterizes it.



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TIGERS TRIM SOONERS BY 40-30 SCORE

M. U. Loopsters Knock Oklahoma From Leadership in Winning Game

COLUMBIA, Mo., Feb. 17.—(AP)—The University of Missouri Tigers knocked the University of Oklahoma Sooners out of undebated leadership in the Big Six conference basketball race by picking up a big lead, and then profiting to win 40 to 30 in a game here tonight.

The Sooners who led through-out, except momentarily when the score was tied at 1-11, dropped to a first-place tie with the Kansas Jackjacks to make the race more thrilling, and to give the Tigers an outside chance to finish in the championship.

In regular their thirteenth consecutive conference victory on their court here the Tigers piled up a 20-point lead early in the second half, when the score stood at 37-17, and then played cautiously. A Sooner rally in the last few minutes fell short.

Norman Warner, center, led the Tiger attack with 11 points on five field goals, and three free throws. Johnny Cooper, Missouri forward, was just one point behind, while Fred Browning, of the Sooners, and Roger Stuber, of Missouri, tallied 10 points each.

After holding a 21-10 lead at the half, Cooper, Stuber, Wagner and Kenneth Jorgensen sent shots from the field in rapid succession to run up the unassailable lead.

Warner was instinctive at the center post, getting the tip consistently, which enabled George Edwards to beat the Sooners at their own game—the fast break. Only during the latter part of the contest did the Tigers revert to backward style, the delayed offense.

Early in the first period, the Tigers piled up a 12-0 lead, but a short rally by Hugh McDermott's cagers brought them up to a 12-10 count before the Tigers, led by Cooper, initiated for the substantial lead at the intermission.

Browning, high scoring guard of the conference, was largely responsible for the Sooner attack at the stanch. Captain Andy Beck, Percy Math and Karyl Brock also contributed their goals during this period. It was the Tiger's highest scoring victory in several years.

At the first half, the Tigers and Sooners made 11 out of 22 attempted free throws, but the players of both teams tightened up after the intermission, more shots being missed than made.

Denver Miller, star of the Tiger victory over Kansas last week, again was a bright spot on the Missouri offense. Sharing honors on the Oklahoma squares with Browning, was Captain Beck.

The Tiger victory avenged a 21-22 defeat the Sooners handed them at Norman two weeks ago. A record crowd, estimated at more than 4,000, packed Bremer Field House to witness the game.

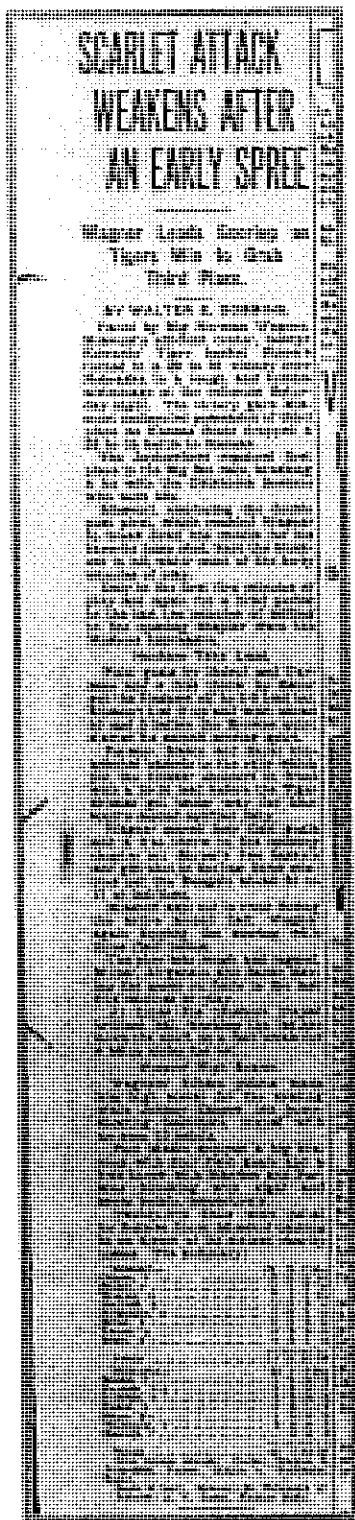

He Marks Up 18 Points in Tiger Victory Over K-Ag-gies to Beat Bill Johnson

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 6 (AP)—The University of Kansas has stowed away its third consecutive Big Six basketball championship but the individual scoring honor for the season, which closed last week-end, belongs to Norman Wagner, Missouri's star center.

Wagner climaxed his collegiate basketball career by scoring 18 points in Missouri's 37-23 victory over Kansas State, bringing his total for 10 conference games to 114, compared with 109 by Bill Johnson, Kansas center.

Johnson, a leading star on all of Coach Phog Allen's last three champion Jayhawk teams, never won the conference scoring honor. Last season he was third with a total of 95 points, while the co-leaders, Johnny Cooper of Missouri and Ted O'Leary of Kansas, each had 110.

Cooper dropped this season to tie with Andy Beck of Oklahoma for third place. Each scored 32 goals and 24 free throws in ten games for totals of 88 points. Beck tied for fourth last season and Wagner, the new scoring king, tied for twelfth.

Kansas clinched the title Friday night by defeating Oklahoma 35 to 26. Oklahoma the following night won the runner-up honor undisputed by defeating Nebraska 38 to 27, with Beck as scoring leader.

Missouri, which tied Oklahoma for second place last season, took a sole claim on third place by defeating Kansas State, the fourth place team. Nebraska advanced from last place, in which the Huskers wound up last season, to next to last, trading with Iowa State's Cyclones whom the Huskers defeated last week 43 to 16.

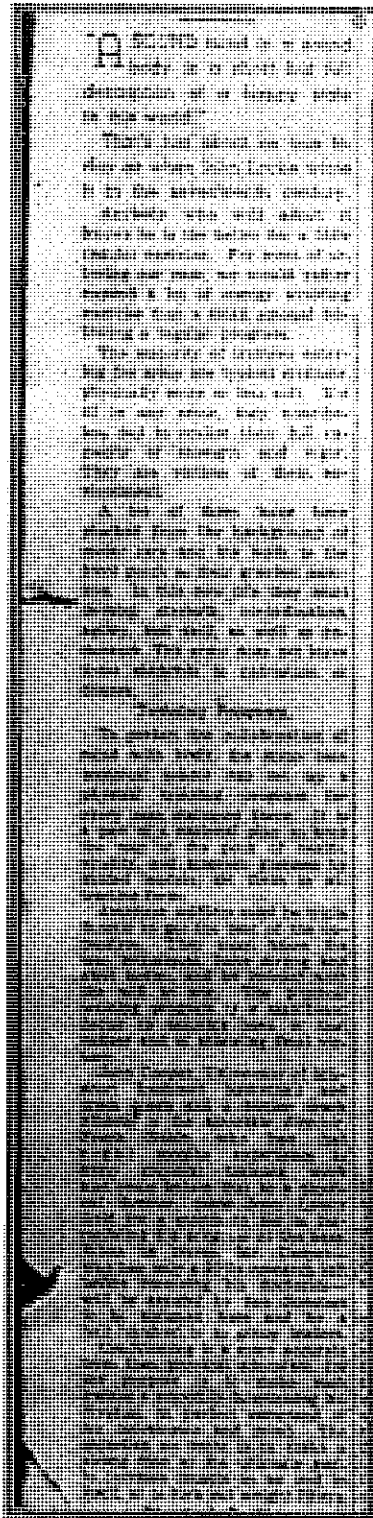

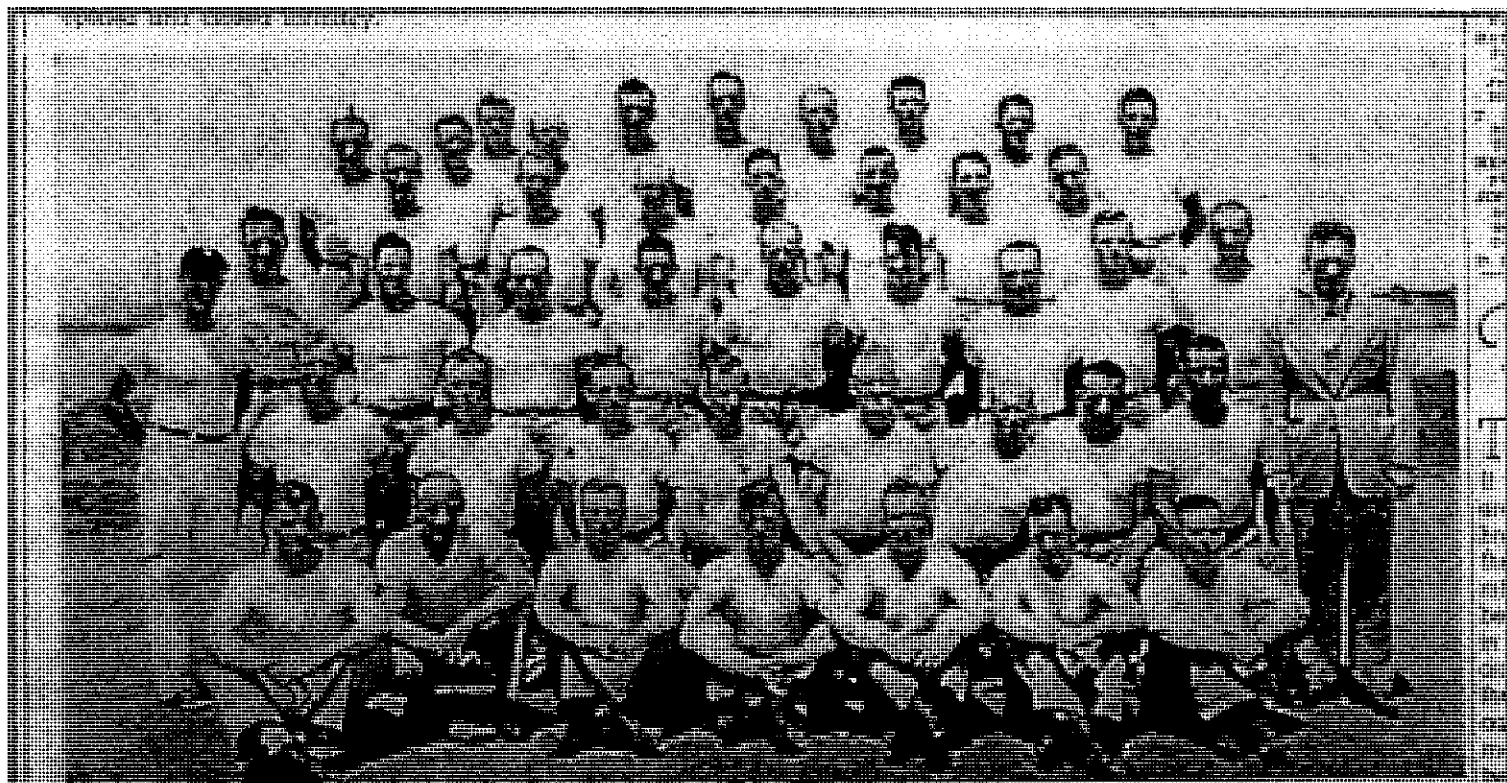
