

Coach Bob Redman

Now in his 2nd season as high school football analyst for GLICODcommunications, Bob Redman served more than 35 years and won over 300 games as a head football coach at five Kentuckiana area high schools before retiring after the 2010 season. Bob spent 18 of those years (1992-2009) as head coach of the Bulldogs at Louisville Male High, where he compiled a 190-49 record, with 3 state titles (1993, 1998 and 2000) in 6 championship game appearances (his first appearance was in 1984 while at Ballard).

Ex-Male coach Bob Redman seeks council seat

The Jefferson County Republican Party has nominated former Male High School football coach Bob Redman to run for the Louisville Metro Council District 10 seat this fall.

The GOP's executive committee made the decision at its meeting late Tuesday evening by a voice vote. No other candidate stepped forward for the nomination, according to Louisville GOP chairman Jim Stansbury.

"At this stage in my life I thought it's time to give back a little bit," he said. "It's been a great community and if there's a way I can serve and be helpful, I'm ready." The district runs from parts of the Highlands, south of Newburg Road to parts of Buechel.

Redman, 66, led Male to three state football championships and was one of the winningest coaches in Jefferson County Public Schools over his 18 seasons before resigning five years ago. He is the father of former University of Louisville quarterback Chris Redman.

Bob Redman said he doesn't see the council as a partisan legislative body as much as Congress or the state legislature, and wants to focus his campaign on youth development, education and public safety. He said there are also major concerns among residents with the Economy Inn along Bardstown Road in the district, which has been in the news for being a hot spot for drugs, prostitution and other illegal activity.

The District 10 seat was left vacant for almost a month after the sudden death of Council President Jim King this year.

The Louisville Jefferson County Democratic Party selected Pat Mulvihill, who is head of the civil division in Jefferson County Attorney Mike O'Connell's office and also served as Mayor Greg Fischer's general counsel, to be their nominee in November.

Mulvihill was also one of the nine applicants who sought to join the council immediately through an appointment. After three rounds of voting, council members ultimately chose former city Alderman Steve Magre, who will serve the remainder of this year. Magre has slammed the local Democratic Party's nomination process as "backroom politics" and indicated he will seek the party's nomination in next year's primary election.

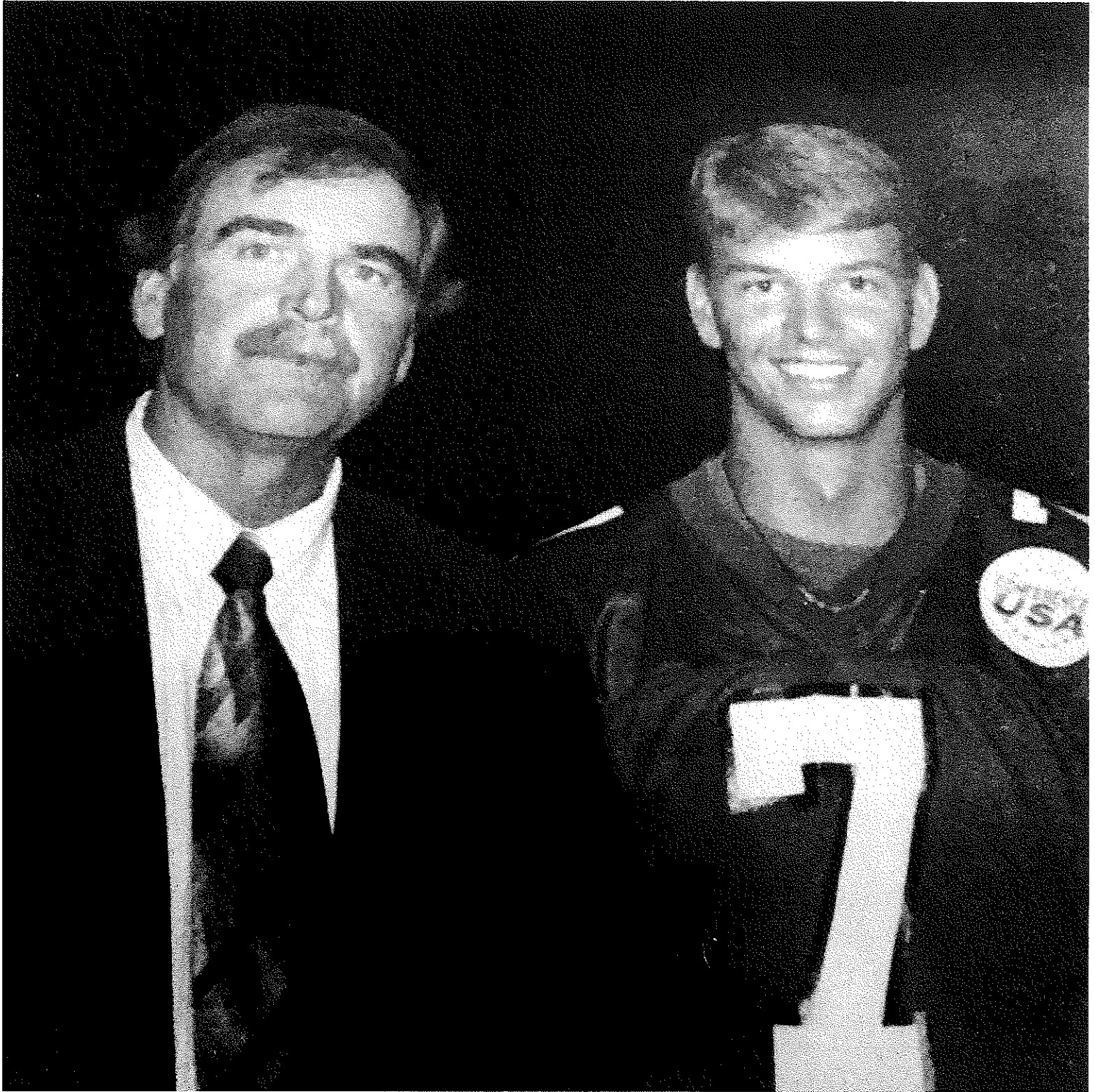
Given that split, local Republicans hope a well-known candidate like Redman can appeal to Democrats, moderates and independents in the district.

"In any political race one of the important things is name recognition, and Bob has certainly got that," Stansbury said. "It's a name known throughout the city, not just District 10. It'll play a big part in his campaign."

The district is a heavily Democratic area that has never been represented by a Republican on the council. It stretches from Bardstown Road and Hikes Lane to the St. Joseph's area at Eastern Parkway and Preston Street. It includes all or parts of Petersburg, Buechel, West Buechel, Watterson City, the Upper Highlands, Audubon Ridge, Camp Taylor, Fincastle, Nightingale, Audubon Park, North Audubon, Schnitzelburg, Parkway Village, St. Joseph's, Germantown, Paristown, Prestonia and Belmar.

KHSAA Hall of Fame Committee,

My name is Curtis Higgins, and I am currently the Principal at Hopkinsville High School where I was hired in July of 2013. I coached several sports during my teaching career including 28 years of high school football in the state of Kentucky. I spent 12 years as an Assistant Football Coach at Waggener High School, South Oldham High School and Male High School. Eight of those years under the direction of Coach Bobby Redman at both Waggener and Male High Schools. I spent 16 years as a Head Football Coach in Kentucky with stops at Oldham County, Trigg County and Fern Creek High Schools.

I believe that Jefferson County has never seen a greater football coach than Bobby Redman and I also believe that Jefferson County has never seen a better Quarterback than his son, Chris Redman. As a member of the Kentucky High School Athletic Association, I would like to take this opportunity to nominate both of these gentlemen into our KHSAA Hall of Fame.

Chris Redman was a Quarterback at Male HS from 1991-1994. He started at the position for three years and led the Bulldogs to a State Championship in 1993. He set National Records in 1994 for most TD Passes in a Season (57) and most TD passes in a half (8) twice. His team was 12-1 his senior year and lost to St. Xavier in the Regional final and he was named Parade Magazine's National Player of the Year. Chris continued his collegiate career as a Quarterback at the University of Louisville, where he became the third most prolific passer in NCAA history when he completed his career. After his career at Louisville, Chris was drafted in the 3rd round by the Baltimore Ravens, where he won a Super Bowl ring in his first season as a back-up Quarterback. Chris played for 10 seasons in the NFL over the next 11 seasons and ended his career at Atlanta in 2012.

Bobby Redman is the winningest coach in Jefferson County Public school history with 317 wins. He is one of only seven coaches in the state of Kentucky to win more than 300 games. He accomplished this task while leading Durrett, Ballard, Waggener and Male High Schools. Three of those schools played in the same district as either Trinity or St. Xavier High Schools, both Catholic private school powerhouses. He won 3 State Championships and was State Runner-up twice at Male High School during his 18 years. He was State Runner-up once at Ballard High School in 10 years. As a head coach, Coach Redman averaged over 9 wins per season and just 3 losses. His record versus Saint Xavier and Trinity High Schools will never be matched with 18 wins against the two schools in 30 of his 35 seasons as a head coach.

I hope that you will induct both of these athletic legends into our KHSAA Hall of Fame, they are both well deserving and the elite of Jefferson County public school football history.
