Hendrick Wins Scoring Title By Record Margin

Bristow High's Rich Hendrick not only won Southern Kentucky's prep scoring championship with a record score and average, but by a record margin as well.

The 4.1 junior finished regular-season play with 1,026 points in 24 games for a 42.7-point a game average. The championship is based on average per game for regular-season play only.

Hendrick's margin over runner-up J. S. McDaniels, a Park City High sophomore, was a whopping 17.8 points a game. McDaniels finished with 499 points in 20 starts for a 24.9 average.

He posed out North Warren senior Luther Lawrence, who fashioned 580 points in 27 games for a 24.4 average.

Trailing were Eddie Whillow of Austin-Tracy with a 23.6 average; Bob Briendine of Franklin Simpson, 22.9; and Rich Tracy via of High Street, 20.9.

The previous records for regular-season play were held by ex-

Bristow ace Darel Carrier, who scored 777 points for a 32.2 average in 1953-59.

So Hendrick broke Carrier's total by 249 points and beat his scoring average by 10.5 points a game.

Hendrick also set single-game Fifth Region records by busting 65 points and getting 29 field goals against Adairville on Jan. 28.

Carrier had held both of these marks with 64 points and 28 field goals against Sunfish in 1957.

For the season, Hendrick earned 352 field goals in 734 shots for a fine 520 percentage.

He connected on 252 of 347 free throws for .714 accuracy. Hendrick scored more than 30 points in 7 games and hit better than 40 in seven other contests.

His low for the season was 36 in the season opener at Auburn. In only one other game did he get less than 30. That was against Allen County in Bristow's fourth game of the season when he was held to 24.

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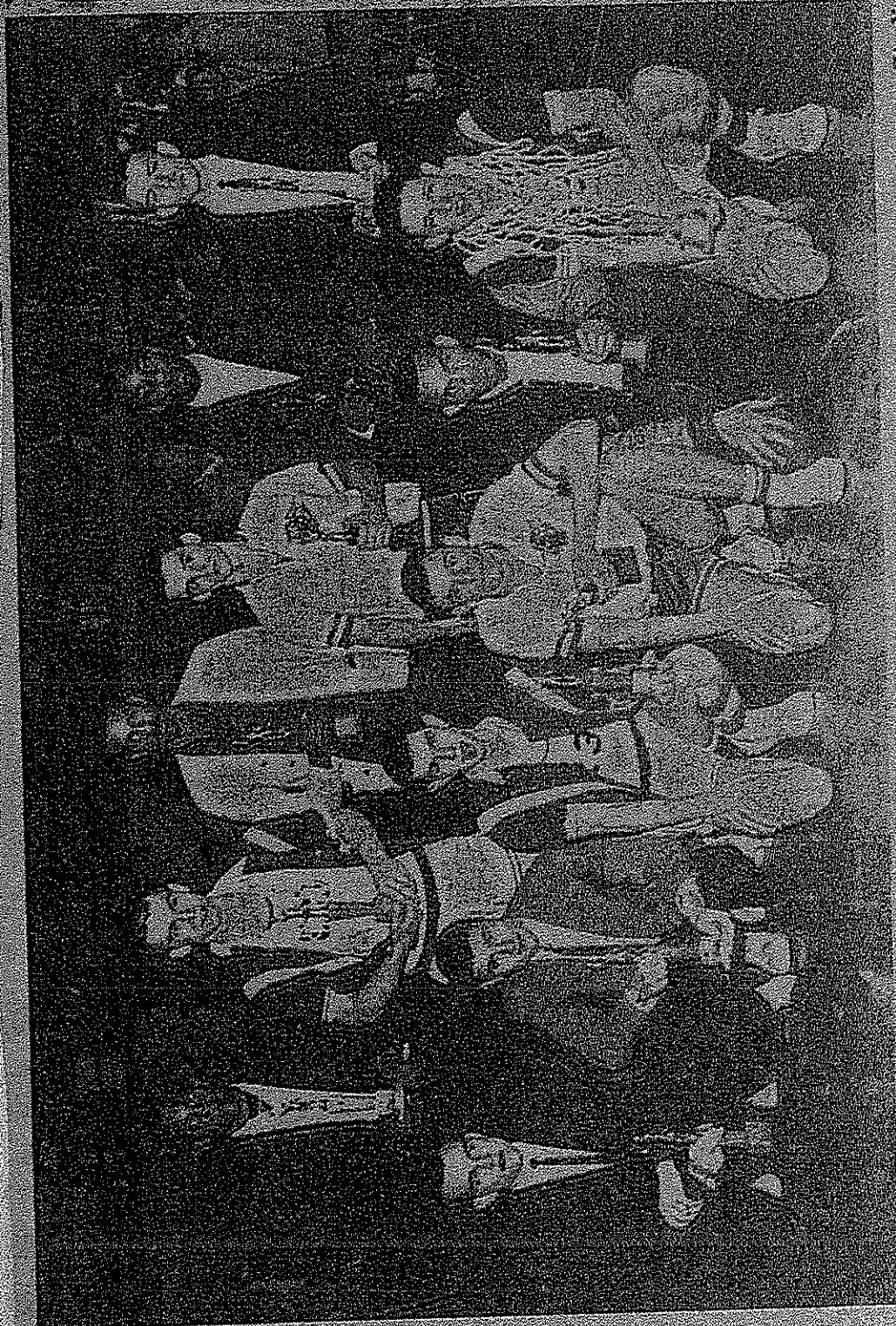

Travis lost it, although he bombed a whopping 38 points.

But the Mustang star had more help, particularly from 6-7 Billy Hunter, who parlayed 15 points with 22 rebounds. It was the fourth straight game in which Hunter has picked off more than 20 rebounds.

The loss snapped a 9-game Bristow winning streak and left the Comets with a 10-3 record. High Street now has won 5 straight and is 8-3 on the season.

Crashing 22 points in the first half and 27 in the last, Hendrick connected on 19 of 37 shots from the field and hit all 11 of his free throws.

He now owns 550 points in 12 games for a 45.8-point a game average.

Travis hit 15 of 25 attempts from the floor and converted 6 of 7 free throws.

Hendrick's 49 points represent an invitational record as do his 132 points for three tournament games.

Both Hendrick and Travis connected from as far out as 30 feet as they staged one of the greatest shooting duels in the city's prep history. The game was very nearly that of Franklin Simpson and Bristow's 86-97 affair in last year's district tournament all over again.

High Street shot spectacularly, hitting 36 of 69 attempts for a fiery 52.1 percentage. Bristow connected on 28 of 63 for 44.4 accuracy.

The Comets hit 26 of 32 free throws for one of the best team marks ever posted in the 17th District.

High Street rushed to an 8-5

lead, hitting 4 of its first 6 shots. But Bristow rallied behind Hendrick and Russell Wilson, who posted 19 points, and trailed by only 21-20 at the end of the first quarter.

It already was obvious that this was going to be an extraordinary game. Hendrick already had scored 12 points and Hunter already had picked off 8 rebounds.

The Comets got their first lead of the game at 26-25 early in the second period on Mackle Miller's 12-footer from the side.

Hunter tied it with a free throw. And then Bristow got what was to be its second and last lead at 28-26 on a 25-footer by Hendrick.

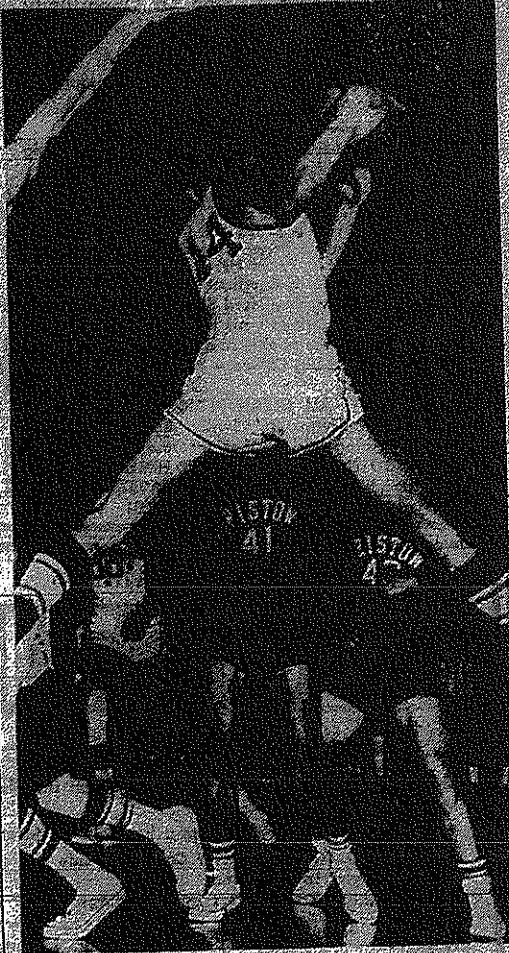
Travis tied it from 26 feet and it was deadlocked again for the last time at 30-30 after Walter Sweat and Hendrick traded baskets.

The Mustangs broke on top to stay at 32-30 on Hunter's loop-er from the lane and led 42-38 at the half.

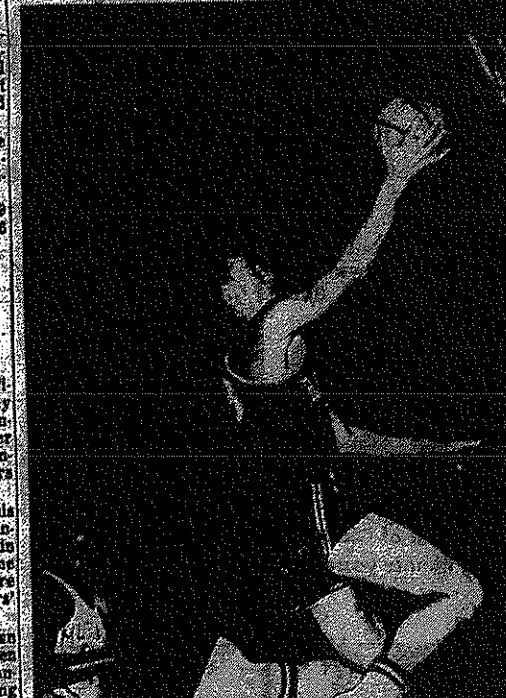

OETA-13 to air one-hour documentary 8 p.m. Tuesday

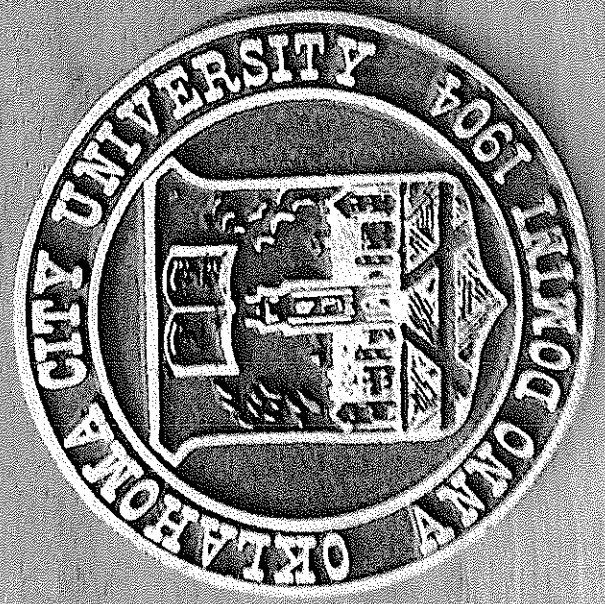
