# Stuart's First Step a Success

It was a moment for breaking open the champagne and toasting whatever gods control the fate of football teams, but ecstatic Ken Voorhis wasn't about to be tempted.

"We're not there yet," said Voorhis, the Stuart High football coach, to a locker room full of sweaty and grimy players who cut out their joking and backslapping to listen to their leader. "We've got a long way to go. So let's all bow our heads now and thank the Lord for looking over us tonight."

Stuart, playing its first varsity football game last night against visiting Pleasure Ridge Park, rolled to a surprisingly easy 27-6 victory. And if there was any help from above for the fledgling Spartans, it was reflected in the flying feet of tailback Jon Snyder and fullback Tim Rickerd, and in the dogged rush of the defensive line.

Snyder, a 5-foot-11, 175-pound junior, scored the first touchdown of the contest midway through the first quarter on a 9-yard run, and finished up the scoring with an 8-yard scamper in the final period.

In between, Stuart tallied on a 50-yard bomb from quarterback Wayne Duvall to end Keith Bryant on the last play of the first half, and got six more points in the third quarter on a one-yard plunge by substitute fullback Jackie Hutton.

Snyder led all rushers with 47 yards, while Rickerd churned out 46. In comparison, Pleasure Ridge could muster only 22 yards on the ground all night.

Sophomore quarterback Rick Rankin was nearly the whole show for Bob Holman's inexperienced club. Rankin scored Pleasure Ridge's lone touchdown from

three yards out late in the second period, but Stuart came back moments later on the Duvall to Bryant aerial and the Panthers went flat after that.

"That pass got us down," said Holman after his unsuccessful debut as Pleasure Ridge coach. "Stuart's strong for a first-year team and we were well aware of that. But I was surprised by the failure of a few of my boys to go out there and hit the way I wanted them to."

**More Work In Years To Come**

"I'm not discouraged, though. Most of my players are only sophomores so I'll be able to work with them in the years to come, I think Rankin is an excellent quarterback. He can throw with the best when he gets set, but our line wasn't protecting him and Stuart had a good rush all night."

Rankin was 7-for-14 in the air for 59 yards, and provided the Pleasure Ridge fans with one of their few thrills when he swept right end for 18 yards to set up his second period score.

"A lot of people thought we'd go the

way of most of the other new schools around here and not win a game all season," said the handsome, dark-haired Snyder after he had showered and dressed. "But we've got good spirit and talent. I think we're going to surprise a lot of people."

"And the spirit isn't just among the players. The players and fans all worked together to get the field together in time for the season. One fellow—I think his name is Jim Chernak—volunteered his help and really went to work on our field."

And last night Snyder went to work on it, too.

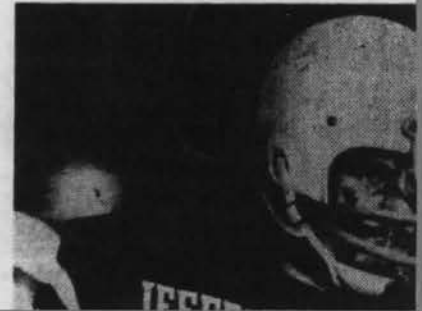

That's also why, after Wolcott's touchdown, Fairdale tried to pass for the conversion rather than kick—but that didn't work, either.

Stuart took a 7-0 lead with 16 seconds

Offensively, neither team totaled more than 100 yards with combined rushing-passing yardage. Stuart netted 82 yards to Fairdale's 67.

"Our offense was tired," Voorhis said. "We played without our starting tailback, Jon Snyder, most of the game. He took a hard shot on the arm and we didn't want to take any chances with it.

"Our man had a shot at Wolcott on that punt return but he slipped, and there went Wolcott. Dennis Minter (linebacker) and Kevin Kuhen (tackle) really did a fine job on defense."

Ken Voorhis, as usual, gathered his players together for a post-game talk in the locker room, and the atmosphere, as usual, was boisterous.

"You got in there and fought him when you had to," said Voorhis, the Stuart High football coach to the accompaniment of players' cheers. "And listen, Tim," Voorhis continued over the uproar, "you came through when we needed you. I told you two years ago that someday we'd win a game on one of your kicks and tonight was the night. There are plenty of colleges looking for a kicker like you."

Tim Rickerd, a 5-foot-11, 178-pound whiz with the right big toe, split the goal posts from 37 yards out last night at Western to break a 7-7 deadlock and present Voorhis and his first-year varsity club with its sixth victory in seven outings this season 10-7.

You've probably noticed that there have been more field goals kicked in high school football this season than ever before.

So far, there have been 20 three-pointers booted in Class AAA, compared to 13 in 1970 and 12 in 1969, according to records kept by Courier-Journal & Times staff writer Jim Bolus.

Only in the past three years has the art of field goal kicking been popular. Just two field goals were kicked during the 1961 season, only one each in 1963 and 1964, just two in 1965, three each in 1966 and 1967, and four in 1968.

Why the sudden rise in the number of field goals?

"Kids see more emphasis placed on the kicking game while watching games on television," coach Ken Voorhis of Stuart High explained. "All the pro teams have excellent field goal kickers and so do most college teams."

"It's a great feeling to know that anytime you get inside your opponent's 30-yard line, you're going to score three or six points," Voorhis said.

**8 for Rickerd**

At Stuart, Voorhis has Jefferson County's all-time leading field-goal kicker in Tim Rickerd. The 6-foot, 186-pound senior, who doubles as an offensive halfback, has kicked eight field goals in his three-year career. That's two more than Jim Rice kicked for St. Xavier from 1955-57.

Rickerd's first two field goals came in 1969 when Stuart played a junior varsity schedule. His kicks then traveled 32 and 22 yards against the Southern JV's and Valley JV's, respectively.

Last season, Rickerd booted three out of four attempts. His kicks traveled 37, 27 and 25 yards against Western, Atherton and Doss, respectively.

This year, Rickerd hasn't missed in three chances, booting field goals of 35, 30 and 19 yards, against Valley, Danville and Pleasure Ridge Park.

Bobby Frizzell, Stuart's other placekicker, missed one field goal attempt each against Western and Atherton the past two games. "Tim had a pulled muscle in his leg then, but he's back in shape again," Voorhis said.

Bishop David has the No. 1 field goal kicker this season. Bob Bickett, a 5-8, 170-pound junior who also plays offensive guard, has booted five three-pointers.

Bickett's kicks, in order, measured 45,

**Ali's brother Rahamann scores TKO over Carter**

CHICAGO (AP)—Rahamann Ali, formerly of Louisville and younger brother of Muhammad Ali, scored a TKO at 2:22 of the third round last night in a scheduled 10-round bout with Harold Carter of Cleveland.

17, 32, 24 and 20 yards. The first two were against DeSales, the others against Trinity, Butler and Valley, respectively. He's missed only twice this season.

Bickett's 45-yarder is the longest in Jefferson County history. Gordon Thompson of Fern Creek booted a 44-yarder against Durrett in 1961. Thompson's kick was reported as being from 27 yards out, but that was the line of scrimmage. He probably stood seven yards behind the line of scrimmage, and given 10 yards for the end zone, his kick now would be measured at 44 yards.

Besides Rickerd and Bickett, there are several other fine placekickers in AAA. Buddy Berry of Fairdale has kicked three field goals, the longest being 27 yards. Jim Rhodes of Western has kicked three, including a 34-yarder in a 10-8 win over Southern. And Harold Selman of Waggener has kicked two, a 30-yarder being his longest.

John Fargen of St. X, Rick Green of Eastern, George Glass of Valley and Dana Dahl of Southern have kicked one field goal apiece.

Kenny Armour of Wheelwright has completed his 10-game schedule with 170 points, tops in the state right now.

Finishing strong, however, is Wayne Jackson of Harrodsburg, who has erupted for 10 TDs in his last two games. Jackson has two regular-season games left plus a possible appearance in the Class A playoffs.

# Stuart rallies past Butler 7-6, attains summit in County West

If you had been brash enough to suggest four years ago that Jesse Stuart High School would be playing for the County football championship in 1971, you might have been ticketed as good material for the funny farm.

It takes time to build a winner, and it looked then as if the Stuarts would need a lot of it before they could muscle into the championship picture with the older, more established brethren.

Why, on that first day of practice when the first squad in the school's history reported, some of the prospects were putting on shoulder pads backwards and wondering what were those funny gadgets on the bottom of their shoes.

But here it is four years later and Stuart is in the final round for the County marbles. And all it did to get there was brush aside Butler, the defending state champion.

## No. 19 for Rickerd

Stuart partisans spent an agonizing 34 minutes last night before their heroes finally came back from near oblivion to nudge Butler 7-6 at Fairgrounds Stadium. There were only two minutes and nine seconds left in the game when Keith Bryant raced two yards into the end zone for the tying points.

Steady Tim Rickerd then kicked the extra point—his 19th of the season—that

erased a Butler lead that had been forged midway in the second quarter.

The victory by the Second District champion over First District titlist Butler brought a County West title and put Stuart into the County Region final Nov. 12 against Thomas Jefferson. The latter downed Seneca 35-14 in the second game of last night's doubleheader to claim the County East pennant.

The first quarter of the opening game was punt-punt-punt by both clubs, with none of the kicking exceptional. Neither team could work into any favorable field position from which to mount a drive.

## Crawley fakes, scores

But at the start of the second quarter Butler began to put it together, mainly with quarterback Tommy Crawley running on the option play. The Bears, who won last year's state Triple-A title by beating Trinity, moved 54 yards in 13 plays. Crawley ran on six of them, picking up 33 yards and three of the four first downs en route to the end zone.

However, it was Dean Meyers who made a crucial gain that kept the drive going. On a fourth-and-three situation, he made a first down on the Stuart 18 by inches. Four plays later Crawley raised up as if to pass and then raced around right end for the marker.

## Statistics

Tommy Benock's kick for the extra point was good, but Butler was charged with illegal procedure. "A guard moved," Butler coach Elmer Collina explained sadly. On the second try from the seven-yard line, Benock attempted a pass, but it fell off the fingers of David Jenkins in the end zone.

Time may have stopped Butler from taking a bigger lead before the intermission. It moved to a first down on the Stuart 10 late in the half, but time was running out when Benock tried a field goal on second down from the Stuart 12 and missed to the right.

Stuart could get no closer than the Butler 38 in the first half. The Spartans reached the 27 early in the third quarter only to falter, then thrust to the 13 early in the fourth quarter but fizzled again. It looked as if Butler's defense was going to hold up.

## Winners switch tactics

And then the game turned around dramatically.

After punching fruitlessly at the Butler middle, Stuart switched tactics. Bryant was moved to flankerback—a not unfamiliar position to him—and quarterback Wayne Duvall began pitching out to him for sweeps. Stuart moved from the Butler 48 to the end zone in five plays with pitchouts to Bryant figuring in three of them. On the last one he zipped two yards around right end almost untouched

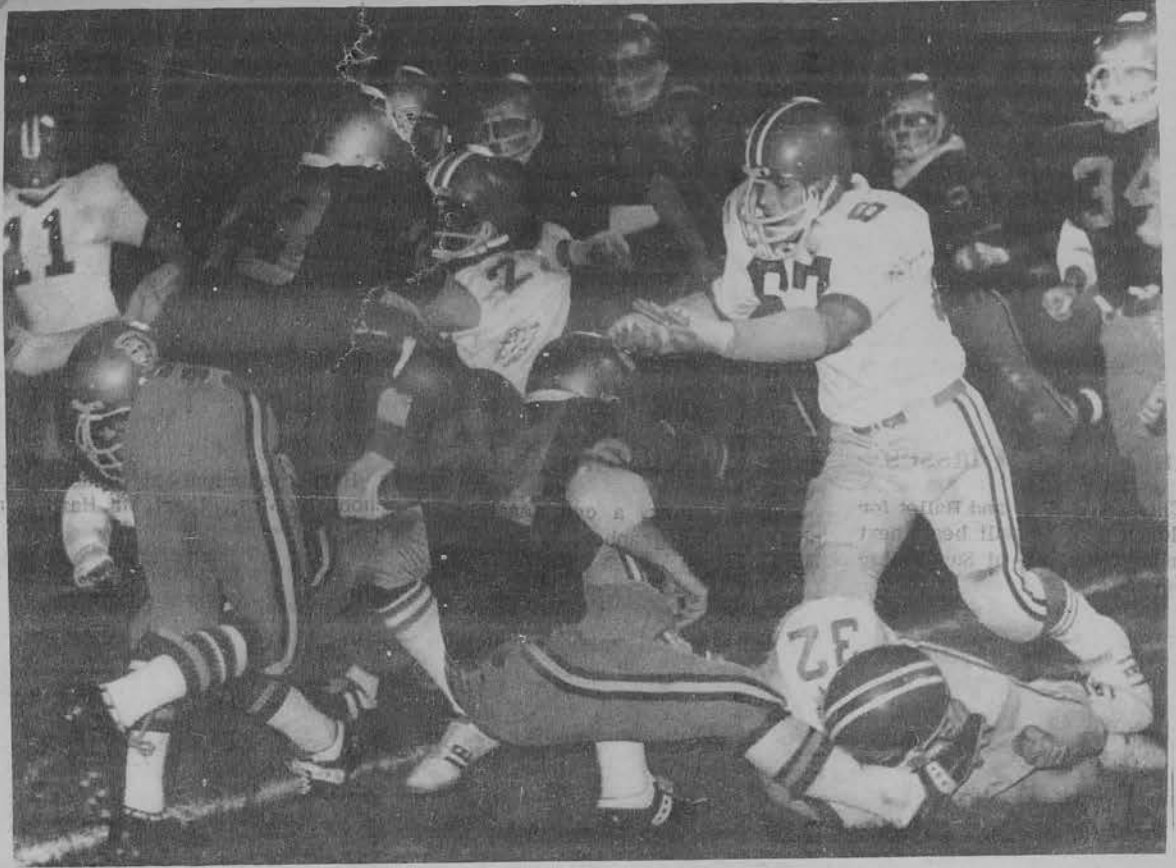
