Clark Burckle Catholic Sports Hall of Fame Resume

Introduction:

Clark grew up competing in any and every sport he had access to. From an early age, he excelled in swimming, in particular. Clark attended grade school at Sacred Heart Model School, where he won numerous Catholic Grade School Meet titles. After SHMS, he moved on to Saint X, where he led the Tigers to 4 consecutive State Championships, losing only one race after his freshman year, becoming one of the most decorated athletes in Kentucky High School Swimming history. He capped his time at Saint X with an individual and relay High School National Title - ranked number one in the country in both. Additionally, Clark was an Honors student at Saint X and a National Merit semi-finalist.

Clark continued to excel in the pool and classroom through college, graduating from the University of Arizona as an 11-time All-American, National Champion and School record holder. After college, Clark's competitive career culminated with a 6th place finish at the London Olympic Games in 2012, swimming for the United States of America. With this accomplishment, Clark become the only male Olympic Swimmer from the city of Louisville, and one of two from the state.

Clark received an MBA from the Stanford Graduate School of Business in 2015 and now lives and works in Louisville, running operations for his father's club management business. Also, Clark was inducted to the Saint X Hall of Fame in the Class of 2015

St. X's Burckle is modest and one great swimmer

Clark Burckle on Clark Burckle: "I guess I've always been pretty good."

Lakeside swim coach Mike DeBoor on Burckle: "Right now, he's pretty close to being the best, most complete male swimmer ever to come out of Kentucky."

Pretty good, my Speedos.

If you want insight into Burckle's athletic brilliance, don't ask him. Ask his admirers. The St. Xavier High School senior is too driven, too laid-back, and when attention comes his way, too forgetful. He didn't tell his folks about this column, so they were surprised when I called to ask them questions. During Clark's interview 10 hours earlier — after a morning swim at the Mary T. Meagher Aquatic Center — friends walked by, poking fun at his stardom, which made his demeanor take on an aw-shucks quality.

"He's just a good kid," said Chris Burckle, Clark's dad. "I wish I'd been that good of a kid."

The father, a former University of Louisville swimmer, could say the same about his son's talent in the pool. Clark leaves for Melbourne, Australia, on Friday to compete with the U.S. Junior National Team in the Victoria State Championships.

His first international competition places him with the world's top junior swimmers from the United States, Australia, Canada, New Zealand and Great Britain. He is the lone Kentuckian among 36 Americans.

"I hope I do well," Clark said. "I really hope I do well."

'A strong family'

Here's guessing Clark will be fine. He'll compete in several events, including the 200- and 400-meter individual medleys, his babies. He already has qualified for the 2008 U.S. Olympic Trials in the 400 IM.

Since the program began in 1989, 47 swimmers, or 10 percent of the junior team's alumni, have become Olympians. Twenty-three made the 2004 Olympic team, which accounted for more than half of the roster.

Yet another great athlete has developed in the Burckle family. Clark's mother, Jill, played tennis at Indiana University. His sister, Caroline, is a sophomore swimmer at Florida. She's a freestyler who was the 2005 Southeastern Conference Freshman of the Year and also has qualified for the 2008 trials. Clark's youngest brother, 8-year-old Collin, is already swimming, too.

"We're waiting on a tennis player," Chris joked.

Said DeBoor, who watched Caroline and Clark grow at Lakeside: "Caroline and Clark are very tight. Caroline has an unlimited amount of talent, and she's helped push Clark to want more.

"Chris and Jill, they develop their children by knowing not to push too hard."

Mr. Know-It-All

Clark, who will soon join his sister at Florida, is a swimming junkie, an Internet surfer who studies everyone's best times and splits. DeBoor tells the story of a 12-year-old Clark coming to him 10 days before a big meet and saying he would beat a highly seeded opponent. When DeBoor asked how, Clark rattled off times and calculations of how much he needed to improve.

"He hit it right on target," DeBoor said. "He had analyzed it out. And he beat the kid."

Said Chris: "He's always just loved the water. And he just has a healthy view of competition."

Clark considered himself a below-average swimmer once. He was 7. Then he turned 8, started competing and the drive to win helped him improve quickly.

He's blossoming on schedule. If he used to get by on willpower and love, now he is gaining the strength necessary to compete at the highest level.

"When I'm in the pool, it's definitely a time to forget about school and everything else," Clark said. "Just swim. I don't think about anything else. As long as I'm working hard, there's nothing else."

Burckles lead Sacred Heart, St. X to titles

If you think that senior Caroline Burckle, Sacred Heart Academy's All-America swimmer, overshadows her younger brother, Clark, a sophomore at St. Xavier, think again.

"He's better than I am," Caroline said about Clark after each won two individual events and led their teams to titles in the Region Two Swimming and Diving Championships yesterday at the Mary T. Meagher Aquatic Cen-

"We expect great things coming from Clark this year and in the next two years," said Caroline, a University of Florida signee who has qualified for the Olympic Trials.

She won the 200- and 500-yard freestyle events and anchored Sacred Heart's 200-medley and 400-free relays that broke regional records. Her performance helped Sacred Heart win nine of the 12 events and compile 419 points to runner-up Manual's 315. Clark Burckle won the 200 individ-

ual medley and 100 breaststroke as St. X, the state champion the past 15 years, grabbed the boys' title with 460¹/₄ points. The Tigers won eight events, including two by senior Kyle Peterson.

Manual, led by double winner Brad Hubbard, took second with 194 points. The first two finishers in each event

qualified for the State Meet Feb. 27-28 in Lexington, along with the 14 best at-large performances from the other regions.

Caroline Burckle, who has won 12 individual state titles, will be seeking her fourth straight victories in the 200 and 500 free when Sacred Heart defends its crown

Clark Burckle finished third in the 200 IM at last year's State Meet but hopes to win it this year. "I think I can if I swim well," he

said.

in the shadows of Caroline? "Not really," he said. "We get along real well. I think we support each other.'

"Clark is a super swimmer and very dedicated," St. X coach Marty O'Toole said. "He loves the sport, just like his sister. They're competitors. It runs in the family.

Caroline's time of 4 minutes, 56.16 seconds in the 500 free was way off the State Meet record of 4:49.38 she set last year. "She wasn't at the top of her game

today," Sacred Heart coach Scott Mill-er said. "She was running a fever several days ago, but as always she pulled through."

Caroline and Clark Burckle both were named the meet's power-point winners, which combines yesterday's times with their national times.

Manual, coached by Gary Webb, won the combined team title (boys and girls), beating Ballard 509-242.

Other Sacred Heart standouts were Abby McGregor, who broke her own regional record with a 1:04.7 clocking in the 100 breaststroke, and Devon Callaghan, who won the 200 IM and 100 butterfly. Callaghan was third and second, respectively, in those events as a freshman at the 2003 State Meet.

"I hope I can (win both) to bring points to our team so we can win the State again," Callaghan said. "It's nice to be a sophomore. You have that ex-perience before, and you're not quite as nervous."

Lindsay Donald, the lone senior on Manual's team, placed second to Burckle in the 200 free but won the 100 free in 53.15

"Caroline is an awesome swimmer, and I love racing her," Donald said, "I train with her every day, and it's fun. She's always positive.

Another thing that excited Donald is that Manual's second-place medley

"I want everybody to know that," she said.

Tigers win just two events but notch 15th title in row

LEXINGTON, Ky. - St. Xavier High School swimming coach Marty O'Toole took one of his most inexperienced teams ever to the State Swim-ming and Diving Championships this weekend at the University of Ken-tucky's Lancaster Aquatics Center.

But those youngsters left a lasting impression.

The Tigers used their superior depth to post an impressive 441 points and claim the school's 15th consecutive title. Covington Catholic finished with 277 points, while Scott was third with 166.

"They grew up and showed what they are made of here," O'Toole said. This one is really special, because

we are so young." Eleven of St. X's 23 swimmers making the event were newcomers, and just two were seniors.

The Tigers won just one individual event and one relay event but had at least two of the top five finishers in all but three of the 12 events.

"These young guys gave us a tre-mendous amount of depth, and they really came through," O'Toole said. "We didn't have a lot of winners, but we were consistent. Everybody just rose to the occasion."

The title was St. X's 39th overall, ranking it second nationally to Hono-lulu (Hawaii) Punahou, which had 40 before this season.

"It doesn't get old," said O'Toole, who has been the coach for all of the past 15 titles.

Perhaps the biggest surprise of the day was St. X junior Kyle Peterson winning the 50-yard freestyle. Peterwinning the bu-yara rreestyle. reter-son, who had the third-fastest qualify-ing time, got off to a blazing start and finished in 21.59 seconds. He beat Covington Catholic's Michael Ander-son (21.62) and teammate Evan Mulliken (21.72). "I knew I had a chance, but I

The senior All-American, a member of the U.S. Junior National team, won the 400-meter individual medley yesterday at the Victorian State Championships in Melbourne, Australia.

'Clark is going to be one heck of a swimmer," USA Junior National team assistant coach Dave Ferris said. "It was a great effort, but I think if he had needed it, he could have come back quite a bit faster."

Burckle's time was six seconds faster than his previous personal best and qualified him for the 2008 Olympic Trials.

"We're really proud of him that's a great feat," St. X swim-ming coach Marty O'Toole said.

Burckle was seeded 23rd in the 200 freestyle but finished 10th in 1:54.60 yesterday Australian Michael Klim, who has won six Olympic medals, was the winner.
