To KHSAA Hall of Fame Committee,

I'm recommending Joey Couch for induction into the KHSAA Hall of Fame. I was Joey's head basketball coach and assistant football coach during his 4 years at Paintsville High School.

Joey's individual stats in basketball and football are certainly very impressive and KHSAA Hall of Fame worthy by themselves however it's Joey's willingness to sacrifice his individual recognition for the overall betterment of the team is what makes him so special and what made the teams he was on so very successful.

In basketball, Joey scored over 2000 points, grabbed close to 1000 rebounds and gave out over 300 assists. In football, Joey rushed over to 2000 yards, had close to 40 TDs and over 300 solo tackles. He was the 1st player to ever play in both the Kentucky vs Indiana All-Star basketball game and Kentucky vs Tennessee All-Star football game; And to my knowledge he's still the only player to ever do both. By the way, was also a heck of a baseball player.

The thing that most folks don't know about Joey is he was our team's leading scorer as a freshman, averaging 22 points, even though he was playing alongside a future KY Mr Basketball (i.e., John Pelphrey). Joey had a silky smooth accurate outside jump shot from any place on the floor as well as incredible body control, ball handling and passing skills. In fact, I've never coached a better and more complete freshman in basketball or football. However in order to help position us to compete with the top teams in the state and nation, beginning his sophomore year, Joey willingly transitioned from being primarily a perimeter player to a physical inside player that took many less outside shots and scored fewer points per game but focused more on strengthening our interior defense & offense, rebounding and passing to others on the team that could score as defenses collapsed on Joey. That change made us an immediate legitimate contender for district, regional and state championships. His sophomore, junior and senior years we won 24, 29 and 32 games respectively with three straight district and regional championships

in basketball. He also won a district and regional championship in football and scored a TD in the state football championship game.

His senior year, we were the #1 ranked team in the state in basketball, winning the Begley's Hillbrook tournament in Lexington over #4 Henry Clay. We then defeated the nation's #1 ranked team (DeMatha, MD) and top 10 team (Binghamton, NY) in the Beach Ball Classic in South Carolina. Joey outplayed, outmaneuvered and frustrated a future NBA 1st round player, 6" 10" Jarrod Mustaf in the DeMatha game. While we defeated the eventual state champion (i.e., Clay County) in the regular season, we didn't get to play them again in the state championship game after our loss to Louisville Ballard and future NBA all-star Allen Houston in the state semi-finals. However Joey deservingly made the KHSAA All-State Tournament team for his outstanding play throughout the tournament.

It's worth mentioning Joey's incredible durability, reliability and leadership in physically and mentally demanding roles for our basketball and football teams. Joey started every high school basketball and football game he played in for 4 years. He was our team captain in both sports. Joey would later go on to play in 44 straight college football games at UK, including 33 straight starts from his sophomore through his senior year. He also became UK's team captain in football and an All-SEC football team member his senior year.

Joey was a fierce tough competitor but at the same time was able to be beloved and respected by everyone that played with him and against him for not only his athletic skills and how hard he played on every play but the appropriate and fun loving way that he played while in the heat of battle. This balance won us many games and him multiple Sportsmanship awards (e.g., ST Roach award) during our tournaments.

Last, but just as important, Joey was also an outstanding student in the classroom. He had a 3.5 GPA in high school and then at UK became a Dean's List student and regular member of the All-SEC academic team.

Joey Couch is definitely one of best all-around student-athletes that KY has ever had....or ever will have.

There are few Kentucky high school athletes that stand the test of time. Joey Couch's accomplishments and lore do just that. as He personifies the term "legend". Joey starred in football and basketball at Paintsville High School while catapulting the Tiger's basketball and football programs onto the state-wide stage. Individual statistics and accolades support this claim. However, Couch remained the consummate teammate and program-first competitor.

Therefore, I'm honored to endorse my friend, opponent, teammate, and roommate Joey Couch to be inducted into the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Joey was simply the best athlete I had the privilege to compete against at the high school level. Scoring over 2,000 points, Joey was also one of the Commonwealth's leading rebounders and defenders.

He diligently worked to become a three-year starter, All SEC defensive lineman, preseason All American, six-time All SEC Academic Team, and finished his career ranked 2nd in tackles for a nose guard.

Joey Couch was and remains a KHSAA legend; a description that is infrequent. It is without hesitation that I endorse Joey Couch to be inducted into the Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Letter of Recommendation for Joey from JR Vanhoose

To whom it may concern,

I am writing in support of the recommendation for Joey Couch for the Dawahares/Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame. Joey had a tremendous impact in the community of Paintsville and Eastern Kentucky, and I even consider him "Mr. Paintsville." A four-time All-57th District selection, a three-time All-15th Region selection and a four-time Honorable Mention All-State selection in basketball, Joey helped lead Paintsville High School to three 15th Region basketball championships and the school's first ever trip to the KHSAA "Sweet 16" Final Four in 1987 where he was named to the "Sweet 16" All-Tournament team. Also an All-State football player, Joey helped lead Paintsville to a Class A runner-up finish in football in 1985. To

show you the type of athlete that Joey Couch was, at the end of his senior season he was selected to both the Kentucky-Tennessee All-Star football game and the Kentucky-Indiana All-Star basketball game! After high school, he went on to have a great football career at the University of Kentucky, lettering in 1988, 1989, 1990 and 1991, where he was an All-SEC selection. I know him so well because of his basketball accomplishments and know that his name is still spread across many of the records at Paintsville High School. In his basketball career Joey scored 2,034 career points (6th all-time), grabbed 1024 career rebounds (3rd all-time), ranks 4th all-time in FG attempts (1,659) and FGs made (764). He saved some of his best performances for the "Sweet 16." In 1985, as a sophomore, he had back-to-back games of 14 points and 12 rebounds (vs. Washington County) and 18 points and 12 rebounds (vs. Hopkinsville). Two years later, as a senior, in 1987, he scored 23 points and grabbed 12 rebounds in a first round victory over Monticello. I remember seeing a quote from his (and later mine) high school coach Bill Mike Runyon when asked about Joey's basketball career, "As far as I'm concerned, Joey was probably the best football/basketball freshman athlete I ever coached. As a freshman, he had every attribute. He could shoot it. He could handle it. He could pass it. He could play defense. He could rebound. He did a lot of things you just don't see out of a freshman. The thing people don't realize about Joey wasn't afraid to give up some of his scoring to make damn sure we won. He was more concerned about playing defense and rebounding." Now that's the type of player you want to see be recognized in the Hall of Fame!

Joey had a tremendous impact on my athletic career as well. After winning the 15th Region Tournament in 1987, Joey, John Pelphrey, Jeith Adkins and Mike Minix made a trip to Paintsville Elementary School to sign autographs and interact with the students. At the time I was in the 1st Grade and I recall Joey being very friendly and fun to be around. After that, watching the police escort the bus out of town for their trip to Rupp Arena, I just knew that I wanted to be like those guys, especially Joey. It helped put a "drive" in me to work hard, play hard and make Paintsville proud, like they had all done. Before we made our run a a state basketball title (in 1996), Joey's former coach and the one I played for, Bill Mike Runyon, brought Joey in to speak to the team about what it took to get to the Final Four and what it meant to represent our area down at the "Sweet 16." I never forgot that and what it meant to us to know that Joey was cheering us on.

Joey was a great athlete but more importantly, he was also a great person. He never hesitated to offer help to those in need and that is one of the lasting things I will remember about him. I will forever have a special place in my heart for Joey Couch and I hope that he will be inducted into the Dawahares/Kentucky High School Athletic Association Hall of Fame.
